Dame Elizabeth Holford's Charity:

Applications for Bursaries welcomed

The Charity was set up in 1720 when Dame Elizabeth Holford left £500 to establish a school for the children of Stanton St John and Forest Hill. The Charity came into being in 1988, following the closure of the school at what is now the Holford Centre, in Stanton St John. The Charity's area of benefit now includes Stanton St John, Forest Hill with Shotover, Beckley, Horton-cum-Studley and the ecclesiastical Parish of Elsfield. Applications for grants are invited from school aged children and young people up to the age of 25 who are or who have parents resident in the area of benefit, for help in their educational needs.


In the past bursaries have been granted for computer software, sporting equipment, residential courses, text books, laptops and other electronic equipment, college courses not funded by Student Finance and music lessons. Applications are not means tested and funding is granted on a case-by-case basis.

Update on 'Land north of Bayswater Brook' (LnBB)

Developers submit Planning Application: your opportunity to comment Christ Church, and Dorchester Residential Management, the developers of the Lower Elsfield and Wick Farm part of the site Land north of Bayswater Brook (LnBB) submitted their planning application for their site just before Christmas. We have been told that SODC Planning Officers have now been through all the documents and validated them. The application planning can be viewed on the SODC www.southoxon.gov.uk/ using reference P22/S4618/O. This will give all local residents who will be affected by this development the opportunity to have their say.



We have yet to be given details by SODC of how this planning application will be processed, but this is a public consultation, when parish councils and local residents can submit their comments. It is important we convey all our concerns to SODC. We are trying to negotiate a longer deadline as at the moment it is 18 February and there are a huge number of documents.

It is then likely to be considered by SODC councillors at a number of Planning Committee meetings at which people will be able to register to speak and give their views.

The links for the public consultation have been posted on the Beckley and Stowood web site, and on local Facebook pages, and your Parish Council has been sent details by SODC. Please do have your say and give your views to SODC. We will have to live with this development and this is likely to be your last opportunity to help shape changes to it.

We have heard no news about the smaller part of the LnBB site to the east at Bayswater Farm, which is in Forest Hill with Shotover Parish.

'Colourful Corvids' by Lyn Ebbs

I wrote about two of our black corvids (members of the crow family) last summer, but they do have more colourful cousins. Three of them are locally common.

Let's start with the jackdaw. It could be called 'jack' because it's small,



because that's a pet name, like Robin Redbreast, or because its call sounds like 'Jack!', or it could be all three. They are about the size of a pigeon, with black plumage on the body that fades to a soft, silvery grey over the back of the head. Their eyes have pale, almost white irises. Jackdaws are hole nesters and will commonly nest in chimneys, buildings, and tree holes, and are a familiar sight perched on chimney pots in our

villages. With its jaunty walk, the jackdaw seems to have avoided the more intense persecution campaigns waged against other corvids, although, along with the magpie, it has a reputation for being attracted to bright, shiny objects.

Magpies are jacks of all trades - scavengers, predators and pest-destroyers,

and their challenging, almost arrogant attitude has won them few friends. They are highly intelligent and very adaptable; they are omnivorous, eating mainly insects, but will also take carrion and store surplus food. They used to be heavily persecuted by gamekeepers, but their numbers recovered greatly in the late 20th century. This coincided with a decline in numbers of many songbirds, such as the song thrush, and despite long-term studies proving



them not guilty, magpies continue to be blamed for their loss. It's true that they will take nestlings and young fledglings but the dramatic fall in insect numbers is a far more important cause of songbird decline.

With its noisy chattering, black-and-white plumage and long tail, the magpie is hard to ignore and an easy target for people who like their birds a bit less self-confident. They have given their name to sports teams whose colours are black and white, but close-up the magpie's black plumage takes on an altogether more colourful hue with a purplish-blue iridescent sheen to the wing feathers and a green gloss to the tail. They are also associated with many versions of the folk rhyme that starts: "One for sorrow, two for joy" and some people still treat the sight of one magpie as unlucky, unless you address it by wishing it "Good day".

The shyest but also the most colourful member of the crow family is the

jay and at one time "Jay" was used as a dismissive term for a flashy dresser. It has a body colour of warm greyish pink, a speckled crest and a white rump. Most eye-catching of all are the blue striped wing coverts which were once used to make anglers' flies. In spite of their flashy plumage, jays are actually quite difficult to see. They are very much woodland inhabitants, rarely moving far from cover. Its screaming call will let you know a jay is nearby



and it's when a bird is on the move that you catch sight of that distinctive flash of white on the rump. They have attracted some of the hostility levelled at magpies for their nest-raiding, suffering persecution as a result, but are primarily vegetarian.

Jays are famous for their acorn feeding habits and, in the autumn, you may see them burying acorns to retrieve later. An individual jay can store around 8,000 acorns each year. In winter the birds visit their scattered larders to feed, exhibiting remarkable powers of memory in retrieving their stores. Some 'lost' acorns can then germinate and develop as new oak trees.

These three species are smart birds in both senses of the word - stylish and intelligent. And it may be their intelligence that makes them unpopular, we feel slightly threatened by birds that can outsmart us.

How are the mighty fallen! Planting Trees for The Queen's Green Canopy

In February 2022, the high winds of Storm Eunice felled a handsome,



dead-yet-still-standing oak in Mill Field near Stanton Great Wood. Stand-alone field trees, once emblematic of the English landscape, have been lost at an estimated rate of up to 84% in recent times (Woodland Trust, 2021).

Meanwhile awareness has grown of their further key role as habitat, vital stepping stones for wildlife between patches of woodland and as shelter/shade for livestock.

Amongst local field trees already lost were those in Stanton St John below Millennium Field and Hillcraft, where older residents may recall a large mid-field stump and where other remains are still extant (clue: thorny surrounds). I had dreamt of restoring one for the Millennium but rather missed the deadline. The Queen's Green Canopy initiative (see below), together with the special chance of being given a Windsor oak for the purpose, revitalised the idea, and the Parish Council welcomed it.

Last winter, two young English oaks were generously lifted from Windsor Great Park for Stanton, one as a spare; we chose to plant both. Construction of essential livestock protection, planting and watering were all kindly undertaken by Julian Money. One didn't stay the course, the other was knocked back during this summer's drought but seems well on its way as a new resident beside the lower footpath to Mill Field.

The old oak, Stanton's last freestanding outrider of the Great Wood, had been brought down just days before planting took place. It was a pleasure and a comfort to give a kindred successor a start straightaway. We hope that it will thrive and that future creatures of all sorts might enjoy and be sustained by its presence.

Note: there's still time for individuals, schools, villages, businesses, and community groups to plant trees for The Queen's Green Canopy initiative. 'Everyone across the UK is invited...' and the invitation has happily been extended to the end of March to include the full planting season. https://queensgreencanopy.org/get-involved/.

Christmas in Beckley Church

Very many thanks to everyone who helped with our Christmas celebrations, including the ever popular 'Carols and Claret' on 18 December and a 'Messy Crib Service' on Christmas Eve, which was much enjoyed by adults and children alike. The collection from 'Carols and Claret' was given to the St Martin-in-the Fields Charity.

Repairs to the Beckley Church Organ

Some parishioners will know that the organ, which was already making extraneous noises because of problems with its 'pneumatics', was further damaged during storms last year, when rain leaked through defective flashing on the vestry roof. The repairs relating to the storm damage will be covered by insurance, and the other necessary work (patching of the leathers, and overhaul of the front pipe action, as well as cleaning and partial overhaul of the remaining parts of the organ) will be carried out at the same time. The additional work not covered by the insurance is costing in the region of £22,000. We have received two anonymous donations of £5,000 each towards this, for which we are exceedingly grateful but there is still a further £12,000 to find. Whilst we do have the finances for this work, it does mean that this money is not available for other valuable activity of the PCC, so if you would like to donate towards the repair of the organ, please do get in touch with Susy Jepson susy.jepson@gmail.com. The work is due to start in the next 2 weeks, and will be completed well before Easter, as long as all goes to plan. Once completed, we very much look forward to welcoming you to the Church to hear the fully refurbished organ in its full glory.

The organ is thought to have been built by Charles Martin for an Oxford College around 1880, apparently as a single manual instrument. Martin

was very active as an organ builder in the Oxford area from the late 19th century and he also built the single manual church organs in Forest Hill and Stanton St John around the same time. The firm became Martin and Coate in the 1890s, based in Pembroke Street, and was still operating in the 1930s. According to the National Pipe Organ Register, the organ was rebuilt in 1934, when it is thought to have been moved to Beckley Church and converted to a two manual instrument.

Nick Meyjes 1930 - 2022

Nick was born in 1930 in Gerrards Cross, a good vintage year he always



said! He was 8 years old when war broke out. His father, an engineer, was asked to be an Armaments Inspector, so the family moved to Birmingham, not a good place for an 8-year-old boy. An evacuated prep school was found in Puddleston in Herefordshire. His parents took him to see the school. The Headmaster explained the school was really full but added "does the boy sing?" Nick's mother, having no idea if he could sing at all, said with great enthusiasm, "Oh yes," the Headmaster replied, "If he will join the choir, I will take him." Fortunately, Nick found he

could sing, and became a chorister, singing solos in the village church. He also sang in the Three Choirs Festival. It was a happy time.

At the end of the war, the family returned to Gerrards Cross and Nick went to school in London. At school Nick had been persuaded to take part in a play. He found he really enjoyed acting and this continued all his life.

Nick studied photography at the London School of Printing. He then joined the Field, a country sports magazine as a staff photographer. He had 12 wonderful years, photographing landscapes, agricultural shows and country pursuits and meeting many interesting people from all walks of life.

Nick joined a choir in London, and one evening after rehearsals, on the way to the pub, crossing the Marylebone Road, he was introduced to a new choir member, Jill, and the rest is history! They were married in 1962 and bought a house in Surrey which needed a lot of work. Nick enjoyed DIY and was good at it, so with Jill as mate, they set about the house. In 1964 their first daughter Rebecca was born.

After 12 years at The Field, Nick was ready for a change, so they decided to leave London and Nick joined a firm in Headington to work as an official

photographer for the University of Oxford. In 1966 they bought a house in Horton-cum-Studley. One week later, Joanna was born rather earlier than planned and three weeks later, Nick decided that unfortunately the job was not going to work out. So there they were, new baby, new house, no money, no telephone and no job! After much thought, Nick decided he would become a freelance photographer. He had continued to freelance for The Field. Jobs would come in by telegram - it was all very different from today! In a couple of years, he had built up a good client list, mainly by word of mouth.

Nick and Jill joined the Studley Singers which brought many years of fun, enjoyment and companionship. Nick also joined the Horton Players, the Islip Players and latterly the Limewalk Players. Many happy hours and some excellent productions followed, not forgetting Gilbert and Sullivan. In one of Shakespeare's plays, Nick, as the Duke had to open the play. As the curtain rose on the assembled Court, a messenger arrives who hands a scroll to the Duke. He opens it, to read "Your flies are undone" - Nick's thought was I'll kill him!

The Otmoor Challenge was always a great day. From the early days Nick did the commentary. On one occasion, a visitor was heard to say, "I only come to listen to that chap" so he was dubbed the voice of the Otmoor Challenge.

He had two stints as Chairman of the Gardening club which he much enjoyed. On retirement he became a National Trust tour guide at Boarstall Tower taking parties round the tower and telling them about its history which he loved doing. Every year Rob Dixon, who was the tenant and his wife Pam, gave a wonderful lunch party on the terrace for the volunteers and partners. Lunching in the sun with a lovely group of people eating and drinking was wonderful.

Nick loved meeting people and having friends and family come to the house. Nick and Jill felt they were so lucky to have come to such a lovely village with a strong community, where lifelong friendships were forged.

Nick has left us all with so many happy memories and we were very blessed to have lived the remainder of our marriage here.

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
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
