#### A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



Alleluia Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, alleluia! The stone has been rolled away, and the tomb has been found empty. The initial distress and disappointment of the first disciples has been replaced by their joy and celebration, from the time of their discovery, to the time they gradually, individually, met the risen Lord – as he was recognised having opened up the scriptures on the road to Emmaus, as he broke bread

with them; as he stood amongst them in the locked room; as they saw the holes in his wrists and believed it was him, and so on.

The story might sound unbelievable, but we know it to be true – the fulfilment of the scriptures! Why would the first disciples have made up the story? After all, most of them suffered awful deaths for continuing to follow Jesus. We are fortunate in this country not to suffer persecution for our faith.



We are joyfully continuing our celebrations, as our churches still look resplendent in their Easter glory. And we look forward to Ascension Day, when once again we celebrate receiving the Holy Spirit, the comforter Jesus promised to leave with us, before ascending to be with his Father.

Before we get to Ascension Day, we have a wonderful event in the life of our country, the Commonwealth and indeed the world, to look forward to – the Coronation of King Charles III. I appreciate that for some, it is an irrelevance, but for many, it is a significant event. Anyone under about seventy-five will have no memory of the Coronation of the Queen in 1953, so this is a unique event in some of our lifetimes to date. There are various celebrations planned around our communities, shared lunches, talent shows, street parties etc, as well as special services in our churches (see page 8). It is an opportunity for communities to come together in joyful celebration.

The Coronation marks the formal beginning a new era. For the Church of England, we will have a new Supreme Governor, but Charles as our King,

will serve all his people, of all faiths and none.

I am sure many of us will be glued to television screens, whether in community settings or at home with family and friends on 6 May to watch the coverage. How much of the solemn parts of the service from Westminster Abbey will we get to see? There is much speculation – will the anointing of King Charles be seen – the Queen, whilst adamant that her Coronation was televised, indeed, the first to be so, requested that her anointing be private. These are solemn and significant moments.

Whatever you might be doing that weekend, I hope you have a lovely time. You might just be enjoying some extra time with family and friends.

As we think of Charles, we think of the enormous shoes he has to fill. Whether republican or royalist, many respected the Queen, and her service to her people. Like any human, mistakes were made, but the outpouring of love at her funeral showed how much she was loved by many, many people. News of difficulties within the royal family, as there often are within any family if we get a glimpse inside, has cast shadows over the occasion, but may these be put aside for this special day. My prayer for Charles is that he recognises his risen Lord, and that he calls upon him for guidance and support, and may the Holy Spirit guide him in wisdom and truth.

I wish you all a wonderful month of May. I hope the Bank Holidays provide you with special and precious time to spend with loved ones, relaxing, enjoying each other's company and having fun. Please do get in touch if life is hard and you need someone to talk to. Take great care and God bless you and your loved ones.

# Other wings by Lyn Ebbs

What do you know about moths? They fly at night, they are drab, especially compared with butterflies, and they eat your favourite woolly sweaters. Actually only two of the 2500 UK species of moth eat natural fibres. Many moths are just as colourful and eye-catching as butterflies and you can see a surprising number of different species of moth before dark, some of them in our gardens. Like butterflies, moths have four different life stages. During their short lifetime they undergo a complete change, or metamorphosis. They begin life as an egg, hatch into a caterpillar, pupate, often within a cocoon, and emerge as adults.

The garden tiger is one of the dramatic looking moths. Its forewings

are chocolatey-brown with cream patterns. But if disturbed the moth displays its orange hindwings with blue-black spots. Bright colours in the insect world act as a warning to predators that the prey tastes unpleasant. Adult garden tigers drink nectar from flowers and fly in July and August. Garden tiger caterpillars, brown



and black and exceedingly hairy, are often called a "woolly bear" and eat low-growing vegetation such as nettles and docks. The hairs are irritant and protect it from predators, such as birds. They can be seen from August onwards and the moths overwinter as caterpillars.

Another striking tiger moth, the scarlet tiger is a metallic green-black colour



with white and yellowish spots, and bright red (or very occasionally yellow) hindwings with black markings. This rather exotic-looking moth can also be found in gardens. It flies in sunshine, particularly in the late afternoon and early evening and can also be found during the day resting on leaves. Its flight season is

May to July. As a caterpillar it also feeds on vegetation such as nettles and brambles. It favours damp habitats like riverbanks and fens and, while most common in the south-west of England and Wales, this one was photographed in our garden.

Hummingbird hawk moths cannot survive the British winter, so migrate to

and from southern Europe in autumn and spring. It can be easily mistaken for a hummingbird - the wings beat so fast they make an audible hum. But is smaller than any hummingbird as it hovers, probing flowers such as honeysuckle and buddleia for nectar with its long proboscis. It is



hairy with a dark, white-spotted abdomen, mousey-grey forewings and golden-orange hindwings. While not the most colourful of the day-flying moths, this behaviour makes them very noticeable. They fly only during the day and can be seen throughout lowland Britain in the summer. The caterpillars, about 50mm long, are colourful. They have a green or reddish-brown body with white dots, white, dark and yellow horizontal stripes and a blue, yellow-tipped horn. They eat bedstraws; I once found one feeding on goose grass (cleavers).

There are six similar species of burnet moth in the UK but, as the name



suggests, the six-spot burnet is the only one with six red spots on each forewing on a background of iridescent greenish black. (The other common species have five spots.) The red spots indicate to predators that they are poisonous: they release hydrogen cyanide when

attacked. They fly from June to August. The adults feed on the nectar of knapweed, thistles and other grassland flowers, and females lay their eggs on the caterpillars' foodplants: bird's-foot trefoil. The caterpillars hatch and feed, hibernating over at least one winter. They emerge in spring and pupate in a papery cocoon attached to grass stems. This is the commonest of Britain's day-flying Burnet moths and is found throughout Britain.

Moths, like much of our wildlife are in decline, maybe a result of spraying of weedy areas and the general tidying of hedgerows. Recently evidence also indicates a link between lower numbers of adults and mild, wet Januarys followed by colder weather in February. The caterpillars succumb to fungal infections in milder, damp conditions.

#### St Nicolas Anniversary Celebration (1272 - 2023)

Our observant Assistant Editor, Jonathan Barker, emailed the magazine in March with the following message: "Cycling past the church the other day I noticed it was founded in 1273 - 850 years ago - not a major anniversary but probably the best we will get in our lifetime!".

Typically, those of us who visit the church on a regular basis had not really paid much attention to this particular milestone, but, thanks to Jonathan, we are now giving some thought as to how to celebrate it!

Meanwhile, we are delighted that David Radford from Forest Hill, who is working on an archaeological dig at Osney Abbey in Oxford, has presented us with a fascinating article about St Nicolas which you will find overleaf.

#### Forest Hill Church: An Appreciation

As a planning archaeologist I get to visit wet and muddy trenches for a living. This March I have been visiting an archaeological excavation taking place at the site of medieval Osney Abbey at Gibbs Crescent near Osney marina. Here, a new housing development will sit over a small part of the extensive medieval monastic precinct. Water pumps have been running around the clock to allow archaeologists to investigate before new piled foundations are constructed.

The area appears to have been part of the abbey from its inception as a priory in 1129. At this time the Norman knight Robert D'Oyly was persuaded to establish a priory by his wife Edith. With the foundation came gifts of estates to help sustain it. There remains some debate over whether this included the estate and chapel of Forest Hill, or whether the 'capella' was gifted to the abbey by the holder of one of the two local Forest Hill manors, Hugh de Tew in the 1140s. Either way, there is a historic link between the excavated remains and Forest Hill's beautiful 12th-13th century church.

At the time of writing (April 2023) the archaeologists had found a massive

precinct wall at Gibbs Crescent, thankfully located beyond the footprint of the new development and to be preserved in-situ. The thick perimeter wall is in keeping with the recorded power and wealth of the Augustinian Abbey. This became an important banking and financial hub, whose church, now sadly



demolished, was once described as 'one of the first ornaments of this place and nation'. Other exposed remains at the Gibbs Crescent dig include fish ponds seemingly relating to a 14th century change of heart when the monks decided that this part of the 12th century precinct site was too wet from seasonal flooding to support buildings and working areas.

In contrast the simple late Norman church at Forest Hill has survived and served as an iconic landscape feature for over 800 years. The chancel arch and relocated carved doorway in the later porch being some of the surviving features of Norman transitional architecture, i.e. the transition from Romanesque to Early English Gothic.

My favourite feature is the 13th century bellcote (see photograph on front

cover), supported by two large buttresses that were added just before the English Civil War. The church was originally a simple cell or nave, with the chancel likely added under the sponsorship of the abbey. The north aisle was added in the 19th century. The simple bellcote is in keeping with the modest status of the village. No doubt any surplus wealth produced locally was effectively extracted by the abbey. In fact, there is some documentary evidence to support the idea that the abbey did indeed 'neglect' Forest Hill: in 1296 the bishop was obliged to order the archdeacon to arrange for the proper serving of the church (i.e. by a priest). In 1520 it was noted that the graveyard 'was not well kept and the font and holy oil were not kept locked'.

Thus, whilst other nearby churches found sponsors willing to construct more impressive church towers, Forest Hill kept its bellcote which retains its simple beauty with two pointed-arch openings for the tenor and treble bells (dated to 1652) and with a smaller opening above for the sanctus bell. Various repairs are visible, along with putlog holes for scaffolding, but the integrity of the fabric is clear. The Oxfordshire Sherwood and Pevsner volume notes that stone bellcotes are relatively common in Oxfordshire but that 'the most striking is the massive gabled double west bellcote at Forest Hill'.

St Nicolas the Confessor has only been subject to one archaeological investigation, in 2003 by Oxford Archaeology before the northern vestry was added. This revealed 23 graves of 18th-19th century date with associated finds including copper shroud pins, bone buttons and jewellery. The remains of one highly decorated coffin were identifiable from a breast plate that commemorated 'Mrs Mary Mickle, died 20th Feby 1811. Aged 64', the wife of William Julius Mickle, a Scottish poet, after whom Mickle Way is named. The archaeological investigations produced only hints of medieval activity; a couple of post holes that were perhaps used for wooden grave markers and 15 sherds of medieval pottery. Thus the question of when the first chapel or church was established on this spot remains satisfyingly unresolved and the mystery of this magical place remains.

Warm and dry on this well drained calcareous hill, I look towards Oxford and hope that the ground water levels at Gibbs Crescent drop before the archaeologists have to return. Hopefully they will uncover more of the story of Oxfordshire's most wealthy monastery whose temporal power and spiritual influence shaped the lives of Forest Hill villagers for generations.

#### Bryan Stearns, 9/2/1932 – 27/12/2022



Bryan was born on 9th February 1932 in Ealing. He was educated at a prep school in Windermere and then at Bedford school which was followed by two years national service.

After two years training with an accountancy company in Bedford he joined AC Nielsens, an American market research organisation in St Aldgate's, Oxford. Three years later, Nielsens moved to new premises on the London Road, Headington where he met a secretary called Ann Little.

Ann and Bryan were married on 1st March 1957 in St Andrew's Church, Old Headington. They bought a plot of land on Horton Hill at the end of the year. Whitecroft was built in 1958 and it was to be their home for 61 years. Their children, Paul and Lucy arrived in 1960 and 1964 and were christened in St Andrew's Church, Old Headington.

Bryan and Ann were always very happy living in the village. Bryan first took part in helping Mrs West and Gerald Coyne with the gymkhana for the Pony Club at Warren Farm. This was a charity funding event and was followed by the Otmoor Challenge.

When Bryan retired, he pursued his hobbies - first he took an open university course in the history of art. Painting (water colours), gardening, reading and travelling were his hobbies. He was invited to teach art history at Audley House and Ashford schools. He joined the Medley Sailing Club and was commodore for a short time.

Bryan was asked by Gorden Curtis, with many others, to help with the installation of the new church organ in St Barnabas where he was also church warden. Bryan served as a Trustee for the Horton-cum-Studley Alms Houses from March 1987 until March 2003, serving as Chairman from April 1992 until February 2002.

He organised the British Legion poppy collection with Ann for the Four Parishes for over 25 years.

Bryan was a loving and giving husband and father to Paul and Lucy. As expressed in the letters of condolence, he will be remembered as a lovely man, easy to talk to, being intelligent and interested and knowledgeable about many things and always interested in everything around him. And his lovely smile. I miss him so much.

#### In Celebration of Philippa Badger: Lands End to John o' Groats

Editor's note: Laura from Horton-cum-Studley emailed us in mid April about her brother James, who was about to undertake the LEJOG cycle ride with hopes of financing a research project into treatment of the type of leukaemia which killed his wife in 2022. James Badger grew up in Horton-cum-Studley, and attended Beckley School. His parents/relatives still live in the village. The following information is taken from James' JustGiving page

"My wife Philippa was diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukaemia (a Blood Cancer) on 20 April 2022 and very sadly died on 22 April 2022 while being treated with Chemotherapy at St James's Hospital in Leeds. Leaving three young children aged 12, 10 and 6.



We are raising funds for research into treatments of Acute Myeloid Leukaemia. Currently the survival rate for the type of Blood Cancer that Philippa had is just 10%. Research can make a real difference: through the work of BloodCancerUK the survival rates for childhood Leukaemia has improved from just 10% to over 85%. We want to support the same for Acute Myeloid Leukaemia.

With BloodCancerUK we will be funding a specific research project into Acute Myeloid Leukaemia. A 3-year fully funded research programme will cost £300,000.

In April 2023 to mark the first anniversary of Philippa's death I will cycle 1,600kms from Land's End to John o' Groats in just 8 days: 200kms a day, 2000m of climbing and around 12 hours of cycling every day for 8 days in a row."

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
