A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



This morning the Vicarage feels odd! I have a friend staying for a few days, and as I am working, they are at a loose end, so, as they are a great dog lover, and love the outdoors, they have taken Bertie for a walk. That may sound insignificant, but it feels odd being here in the Vicarage on my own, knowing that Bertie is not either behind me in his bed or in his place on the sofa, or lying at my feet, under the desk. Of course, I know

he will be home soon, and I know he will be having a ball, running around the fields, splashing in the puddles, getting covered in mud, perhaps meeting old and new friends, without a care in the world. But I can feel his absence! I cannot hear his gentle breathing. Or his not so gentle breathing! There is no sound of his flapping ears as he has a shake. There is no warmth of his body as he lies on my feet.



I am fortunate, as I know this absence will soon pass. I know that he will soon come bounding home. Probably caked in mud, tired, but delighted to see me, and me him. But this brief absence has triggered in my mind the pain of loss of loved ones. I think I have made this connection subconsciously as I have on my mind a funeral I went to last week, a funeral I am involved in arranging, and as I think ahead into this month, a month full of 'remembering'.

The loss of loved ones is on my mind, and Bertie's absence, brief as it is, brought into my mind the feeling of emptiness, the feeling of loss, and some of those little things we miss - the unconscious knowledge of the loved one's presence, the gentle sound of their breathing, together of course, with the big things, as we lose those we love. We miss the everconstant knowledge of their presence, whether they are in the room with us, whether they have popped out to do something, or whether they live far away, and we see them only rarely. We have comfort, knowing that they are there, somewhere. And it seems a reminder to me to cherish our times together.

Losing our loved ones is painful and long lasting. It is nothing like them popping out for a while – my reference to Bertie on his walk simply sparked the thoughts in my mind. I am delighted he is back home, wagging his tail, covered in mud and delighted to see me, just as I imagined. When a loved one dies, we no longer have that 'happy ending' to their absence to look forward to. We spend the rest of our lives adjusting to their absence. Hopefully, the raw pain begins to diminish, but this can take time, even years. Hopefully, we can begin to get through the deep, deep sadness and loss, and begin to remember the good times shared. Hopefully, over time, we can begin to adjust our lives to bear the weight of loss – never forgetting, always having a 'that person shaped hole' in our lives, but not being so borne down by the sheer pain of loss.

On 3 November we have service at 6pm in Stanton St John Church where we have an opportunity to remember our loved ones who we see no longer. This is a special time when we remember them by name, when we light a candle in their memory, and perhaps when we begin to dare to speak their name, amidst the pain of our loss. For more information about this, please see page 8. All are welcome, whether your loss is recent or long ago. May this provide a special place for remembering.

As we continue our 'remembering', we also have our Remembrance Sunday services around the Four Parishes (see page 5 for more details), and the 'Far from Home' concert in Forest Hill (see page 25 for more details).

Please do get in touch if you need someone to talk to. Take great care and God bless you and your loved ones.

All Souls': Stanton Church, Sunday 3 November at 6pm

Celebrating Harvest across the Four Parishes

Thank you to all those involved in decorating the Churches across the Four Parishes for the harvest services, making them look especially beautiful and festive. Thank you also to all those who donated harvest gifts which went to food banks or a soup kitchen.

Beckley School celebrated harvest in Beckley Church while it was still beautifully decorated. It was lovely to have the whole school together, and to have parents and grandparents there as well. The children brought harvest gifts which were added to those already collected in Church. These were all given to Kidlington Food Bank where they were gratefully received.

Tufted Ducks (Reception Class) sang a favourite harvest song they had learnt, Little Egrets (years 1 and 2) read an acrostic poem for harvest,

Lapwing (years 3 and 4) showed some harvest art they had done, and Hobby (years 5 and 6) read harvest poems they had written. The whole school had learnt two harvest songs which they sang beautifully. The Acting the Bible team acted out the story of Ruth and involved the children as usual. The service finished with prayers and a blessing, and everyone joined in singing a well-loved traditional hymn ('We plough the fields and scatter'), accompanied by the church organ. This was a delightful occasion.

Advent challenge and beyond

I hope you are still journeying with me, as we really are nearly there now. We are doing really well. Please do not give up now!

For November, for the Old Testament, we need to finish Jeremiah, read the whole of Lamentations (only five chapters!), and up to chapter 39 of Ezekiel. For the New Testament we need to finish Titus, read Philemon (one chapter only!), the whole of Hebrews, James, and 1 Peter, and up to chapter 2 of 2 Peter.

As I have said before, whilst I appreciate this probably sounds rather daunting, it is no harder than any other month we have already conquered. Let's keep going and continue to encourage one another. We can do this! Only one month to go after this! Please do let me know how you get on.

'Crossing the Red Sea' at Beckley School

It's 8.30 on a Thursday morning and the 5 members of the 'Acting the Bible' team, led by Betty Dye, are arriving to set up in the hall at Beckley School. The children who come to Breakfast Club are sitting at a table eating or playing games and the team has a quick discussion about the stage layout for this week's performance. The 'Crossing of the Red Sea' is an epic story on a very wide canvas, which we haven't dared attempt before, but we have put a lot of thought into writing and reviewing the script, and we trust that the children's imagination will supply the rest.

Adults will play the parts of the Narrator, Moses, Aaron and Miriam. God will be read by an older pupil who has acted with us before. There are small parts for up to 8 Israelites, and a seated Chorus, all of which are written for pupils. We manage to recruit some children from the Breakfast Club, including one from the youngest class, who is given a non speaking part. Betty has brought two pieces of blue/grey cloth for the Red Sea and enough costumes for everyone except the Chorus, most of whom will arrive on the school bus with minutes to spare.

The scripts are handed around and Betty gathers everyone together for a short prayer. Then we start the first run-through. We only have one person in the Chorus so far and there is a lot of moving around for everyone else. 'Aaron' and 'Miriam' need to convey to the watching children that they are being pursued by a mighty and terrifying enemy and now they are trapped between the soldiers and a huge sheet of water. As potential Chorus members gradually arrive, they are handed a script and asked to join in with their lines at the right place "Trapped, trapped etc...!". The parts in the scripts are colour coded, which helps a bit, but it is still quite a tall order. We still only have 4 'Israelites' so they will have to say 2 lines each. There are also some complicated logistics to sort out, involving Flash Cards to trigger wind noises from the children and 'God' parting the Red Sea at exactly the right moment!

We are part way through the third run-through when the 'audience' starts to arrive. Everyone retires to their starting places and gets ready to immerse themselves in the story. The children watch with rapt attention and we are reminded yet again why we put ourselves through this.

Beckley Village School's Recent Historical Discoveries by Helen Weinstein with photos showing the Headteacher, Rick Houston, and Teaching Assistant, Kate White, holding up Victorian school records.

Local historian Helen Weinstein has been doing detective work to help Beckley Village School uncover their history, and has found school log books at the school plus a wealth of accompanying old photographs and plans in the Oxfordshire History Centre at Cowley.



The log books about Beckley Village School are written by the Headteachers and are fascinating. They show that the teachers and children were often inspected and examined and they were obsessed with attendance, with 96 children enrolled for the school year 1894 to 1895 but the Headteacher was upset if pupils were absent because of bad colds, or wet weather prevented pupils from walking distances, or school attendance was bad at harvesting time as this meant many children were helping in the fields instead of coming to school.

What is wonderful to see in the beautiful handwriting of Mr Tossell, the Headteacher in 1894/95 is how broad the curriculum actually was, with arithmetic and grammar lessons enriched with songs and poetry chosen every term for each class, plus "Object lessons" for children to learn about nature like "British Birds" and the "Grains Grown" locally but also "Mountains and Volcanoes of the World" and even "Rivers of Russia".

It was really touching to read about the preparations for when the new school was being built with a special day of celebration when the Bishop of Oxford came to lay the foundation stone for the "new" school on 18 April 1895. The children processed from their old school building to the new one and "each laid one brick at the east end on each side of the foundation stone".



It is lovely to see the stone now at the front of the school hall and know that the children of 129 years ago were involved in the building of their new school room!

The Many Colours of Autumn by Lyn Ebbs

The autumn colour of our deciduous trees is one of the compensations of the transition from summer to winter, but why does it happen? Because the leaves are dying is an over-simplification and doesn't explain why the leaves go from green to yellow and red. And why do trees need to drop their leaves at all?

The fall in sunlight and the drop in night temperatures is what triggers autumn colour to develop. And trees have more complicated lives than you might imagine. Like other plants, they use photosynthesis: the conversion of energy from the sun's rays into food by making sugars from carbon dioxide and water. As days shorten, the amount of sugar generated by photosynthesis drops off, and hormones in the plant trigger the leaf sealing and shedding process.

A green leaf is green because of the presence of the pigment, chlorophyll,

which enables photosynthesis to take place by absorbing light from the opposite, red end of the spectrum. There is a continuous turnover of chlorophyll during the growing season, so its level stays high, the leaves stay green and its abundance masks the colours of any other



pigments present. In environments where resources like sunlight, water, and nutrients are plentiful, building lots of thin leaves which can collect large amounts of solar energy is a good strategy. In these conditions, deciduous trees thrive and only need to shed their leaves once the growing season ends.

As summer comes to an end, the leaves are less of an asset to other parts



of the tree and become a liability. Another leaf function is to draw water from the roots to the top of the canopy, but as temperatures fall, low water is wanted in twigs and branches to reduce the risk of wet tissues freezing. Many tree species start lowering their moisture

content as early as July. Though shedding leaves every year seems costly both in loss of carbon and nutrients, by discarding leaves trees also avoid

the damaging force of winter storms.

As well as this traditional belief that trees shed their leaves in autumn because the costs of keeping them outweigh the benefits from photosynthesis, there are newer theories for why they switch colour before they fall. In autumn, as the days shorten and temperatures fall, chlorophyll is replaced at a slower rate. This reveals other pigments, that were hidden by the presence of the dominant green chlorophyll, to show through. These include yellow flavonols and orange carotenoids.

However, there is another group of pigments called anthocyanins, which

are actively made at the end of the season, and are red and purple in colour. The theories are that these pigments have beneficial effects. Among them is that light is more damaging in the fluctuating temperatures of autumn and these pigments absorb damaging blue



and ultra-violet wave-lengths. Another is that they protect against overwintering aphids and act as a warning signal to the insects – a common function of red colouration. Another signal theory is as an attractant – a message to birds that the tree has nutritious berries.

Other, hormonal, changes are taking place in autumn. During the



active growing season, production rates of a hormone, auxin, are spread throughout the tree. But with shorter, cooler days, auxin production in leaves starts to decrease. This in turn produces changes in the layer of cells where the leaf stalk joins the stem. A steady

level of auxin keeps the leaf attached to the stem, but its loss creates fractures in this layer allowing the leaf to break away from the plant.

A combination of factors dictates how showy autumn colour will be. Warm and dry with colder nights is the best combination. In a mild, wet autumn, the whole process is much slower, so leaves are often completely brown before they fall and individual trees, even single leaves, change colour at different times, reducing the whole spectacle.

Oxford Bus Company: Bus 108

This submission is from the 108 Bus Support Group in The Four Parishes made to Oxfordshire County Council regarding the tendering for the new contract to run the 108.

Firstly, the group would like to express their delight and thanks that we have been fortunate enough to have this new service in our area.

All local reports indicate that this route is extremely popular and well used. This is also borne out by the figures of passenger numbers. From the four villages we have traditionally represented, the numbers showed a steady increase in use by 458 passengers (with 1,351 passengers for the whole route) in the month of June. (In fact, we know that this may be an understatement because at times the card reading machine does not work properly, possibly due to a weak signal, and so some counts may be missed). With proposed changes to traffic access in Oxford this take up is likely to increase.

We hope that this local support for the 108 stands us in good stead.

There are a few points we would like to raise that we hope will be taken into consideration in decision making.

- Concerns have been raised at the size of the bus, both in terms of the number of passengers that can be catered for (the bus is fairly often full), but also about the cramped nature of the bus which makes it extremely difficult, as a large number of passengers are elderly with shopping trolleys in hand and there is no storage on a small, compact bus. It is difficult for a less able person to access the current small bus because there is not a step to help them get up into the bus, and this also makes exiting the bus particularly difficult. Since the current 108 is such a lifeline for many older people it is a shame that some struggle to use the bus. A larger bus (which we understand might be a possibility) would solve all of the above problems and would be very much welcomed.
- There is also a bit of a gap in the middle of the day meaning that people from these villages do not have the option of a later more 'middle of the day' trip into Oxford that would be quite popular with those less able to make an early start or be away from other duties for a longer

time. Anything to help in this respect would be very welcome - maybe the 11.20 from Bicester could visit other villages as well as Hortoncum-Studley, and possibly the 15.50 from Oxford could stop in Hortoncum-Studley.

- Apparently, the bus company would prefer not to have to go into Stanton St John village, but rather use the bus stop on the B4027. Passengers in Stanton St John have said that if the bus no longer picked them up at the village shop, they would not use it because this would necessitate them having to walk up the hill and cross a busy road. More passengers have said they would continue to use the bus from its current pick up and drop off point at the village shop. Surprisingly, the bus currently uses Cox Lane to leave the village and get onto the B4027 - this involves a very tight turn into a narrow lane, and is avoided by most motorists!! The usual road to use is Pound Lane which is much simpler and safer and joins the B4027 at Rectory Farm corner. This would be a far easier route and would accommodate a larger bus if available.
- Speed, on occasion, has been a problem (usually due to the bus getting behind its schedule, often due to the traffic in Oxford) but we feel passenger safety is the most important factor here.

Any help with these issues will be greatly appreciated.

However, mostly our thanks are for supporting this popular and useful bus and we very much hope to see it becoming even more well used.

Land north of Bayswater Brook (LnBB): Planning Committee Decision

All the local Parish Councils/Meeting and communities - Elsfield, SSJ, Barton and Wick Farm attended and spoke at the SODC Planning Committee meeting on 9 October.

The 3 LnBB applications were on the agenda – Outline - for whole site; Full - for roads and bridges; Listed Buildings - for Wick Farm. The meeting went on for 3 hours and only the first, outline application was considered.

We had previously gone through the Planning Officer's Report (320) pages and sent him and the Planning Committee a number of serious errors and omissions, but the report had not been corrected.

At the meeting the Planning Officer reported that a letter had been received from the Environment Agency who objects to the application, and it contained 2 conditions which could be used as a Grampian condition for the foul water problem, which SODC intended to amalgamate. (Thames Water does not have sufficient capacity to treat any more sewage until 2031, even if it has the finance to build it.) This condition stated that the development can be built but not occupied or connected to the sewage system until there is assured capacity. SODC had added that alternatively sewage could be stored temporarily and then taken away, but no stipulation of how or any standards. The letter was not circulated to the committee and only part of it was shown at Tim Bearder's insistence. It, in fact, contained 10 conditions, 8 of which the committee were not told about. As well as going through our objections we also reminded the committee that the Lib Dems and Greens had promised to scrap or change the current Local Plan when elected, but had not felt able to do so. They could do so now.

Despite this and with objections from Tim Bearder and Ed Salter (Lib Dem - Chinnor) the Chairman David Bretherton and Vice Chairman Peter Dragonetti said they had to approve the planning application as it was a strategic development site, not only in the current Local Plan, but also in the emerging Joint Local Plan which they had agreed. They did not have to approve it. It was passed by 5 votes to 2 (Tim and Ed) and the 2 Greens abstained. We were all shocked about the way this was done and the outcome for local residents.

There will be another planning meeting to decide on the roads and bridges and Wick Farm, applications, date as yet unknown. We will be writing to Rt Hon Angela Rayner, Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government asking her to overturn the decision and have made the Environment Agency aware of the conduct of the Officers and Committee. We will keep on fighting to get the other applications rejected.

PS Some good news – the Inspectors threw out Oxford City Council's Emerging Local Plan, which would have demanded that surrounding districts take more of their 'unmet' housing need. It was rejected on the grounds that they did not use the 'standard' [Government approved] method to calculate housing need and lack of co-operation with surrounding districts apart from Cherwell.
