A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



I have written previously about my dislike of the long dark days over wintertime. But I am already pleased to report that my heart has been gladdened with the observation that the daylight hours are lengthening, albeit perhaps only by a small amount. Already I can walk Bertie slightly later in the day. We are over the worst of the dark days, and we are on the up!

I have also been cheered as I have spotted nature waking from its winters rest – the first primrose flowers, and others with

buds reaching up towards the light; violet flowers just beginning to open; bulbs bursting up from the solid, frozen ground; my first daffodil flower bravely unfurling from its bud, facing the ever-changing weather from deep frost to gusty winds and more heavy rain. Today I saw my first snowdrop. Spring is springing!



I loved the few days of heavy frost, accompanied by bright sunshine and clear blue skies, when the fields could be walked across once more without your feet completely sinking in the mud as the ground was frozen. They soon returned to something resembling a paddy field as the next storm arrived along with the next deluge. And just as that one passed, the next is due to land imminently.

There have already been some fantastic sunsets to admire, with the sky looking as if it is on fire.

As ever, Bertie runs around, seemingly oblivious as to whether it is wet and windy, or cold and frosty – ever happy to be out in the fresh air – hoping to meet a friend or two to run around with. Sometimes delighting in the



deep water laying in the fields, joyously splashing his way around, sometimes deep in mud, but never perturbed – until that is, we get home to the hose pipe! And then happy to be snuggled up after a busy day! Not too keen to get up in the morning unless he thinks we are off out somewhere if he is

nicely settled in the warm. It is a dog's life!

And as the seasons of the year change, and we notice differences around, so the Church seasons change. We have had the 'looking forward and waiting time' of Advent, followed by the celebrations of Christmas. It was wonderful seeing so many in our churches and across our communities as we celebrated the birth of Jesus once more. As I write this, we are in the season of Epiphany, that time when Jesus is revealed to us through the retelling of the stories of the wise men finding him in the manger, of his baptism, his first miracle of turning water into wine at the wedding at Cana in Galilee, and then his presentation in the temple. That final story leads us towards the change of season into Lent, which we enter on Valentine's Day.

As we enter the season of Lent, it would be wonderful to journey together if you are able. You may wish to join us as we 'Come and See' The Way of Love (see pages 12 and 13). There are several ways you might get involved which might suit different lifestyles. Or you may like to read a book – I have suggested some that may be of interest on page 9. As we approach Easter, on Holy Saturday, it would be wonderful if you took part in, or came to watch, the Passion Play in Beckley, open to all across the Four Parishes (see pages 10 and 22).

However you might mark the season of Lent, I look forward to conversations about what you have done – it is not just a season for 'giving things up' – taking something up is a good thing too!

Advent challenge and beyond

How did you get on with my Advent challenge? Did you manage to make time for it amongst the festivities? There is always so much going on, that finding a quiet moment may not have been easy. I wonder whether you managed to read through the Gospel of Mark, and if you did, did you notice anything that had not struck you before? I would love to hear how you got on.

For our 'beyond' part, I suggested you might wish to join me in reading the Bible in a year in 2024. It takes consistent dedication, and we are in the very early days. I confess that I would usually already be playing catch up, but surprisingly I am a little ahead — very unusual for me! If you have not started yet, it is not too late. I encourage you to start. By the end of

January, we should have conquered Genesis, and be up to chapter 26 in Exodus, and chapter 20 in Matthew. If you are not, please do not give up.

For February, we need to finish Exodus, read the whole of Leviticus, and get up to Numbers chapter 19. For the New Testament we need to finish the Gospel of Matthew and get up to chapter 8 in Mark. If you read Mark in Advent, I wonder if you spot anything new this time around.

It would be a great achievement if we can manage to do this, so let's have a go and encourage one another. Please do let me know how you get on.

The **Benefice Children's Service at St Nicolas** is led by Anthea along with Julia Stutfield from Forest Hill and aims to encourage children to become familiar with the essential elements of a service in church, by presenting them in a brief and relaxed format which includes dramatic story telling, with scripts specially written by Betty Dye and Julia Stutfield, and songs led by members of the St Nicolas Choir, together with some simple prayers.

Messy Church is led by Anthea together with Betty Dye, who leads the 'Acting the Bible' team in Beckley School. There is a short drama which the children are involved in, a story from a children's Bible, related to the drama, prayers, a craft activity, some songs, and food and drinks. We chat together as we do the craft activity and eat and drink.

Family Church is led by Laura Mermet-Burnet from Horton-cum-Studley, along with Anthea. We meet in Bernwood Forest as **'Forest Church'**. Worship is intermingled with outdoor play, woodcraft, a walk, and an opportunity for appreciation of the natural world. Our relaxed get togethers always end with refreshments of cake and fruit. Attendees can bring their dogs along. Worship and learning through play and walking is a family friendly activity and the children really engage with it. All ages and not just families are warmly welcome!

Children's craft workshops are led by Betty Dye along with helpers, including from the 'Acting the Bible' and 'Messy Church' teams – but you do not need to have attended either of those to come and join in the fun. The workshops are aimed at primary school children and the crafts relate to the church season e.g. Lent, Mothering Sunday, Easter, Harvest, Remembrance and Christmas.

Come and See: Lent 2024



What it is: this is the fourth year the Diocese of Oxford has been running 'Come and See' during Lent. It is their big, warm open invitation to an adventure in faith and trust, and is for everyone in the local church and the whole community – searchers, drifters, thinkers, everyone – whatever stage of life you are at, whether you are a regular churchgoer or have never been before – and I am hoping that many of us in the Four Parishes will join in this Lent.

The theme for 2024: in three of the four gospels, Jesus is asked which commandment is the most important. He answers not with one commandment but with two: you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and soul and mind and strength, and you shall love your neighbour as yourself. This Lent, 'Come and See' shows how these two commandments can give a rhythm and a shape to our lives.

How to be involved:

- in person: we will meet in Stanton Village Hall on Wednesday evenings from 7.30-9pm during Lent (with the exception of Holy Week), and one week afterwards, so six sessions on 21 and 28 February, 6, 13 and 20 March, and 3 April. We will watch a short film from Bishop Steven, Bishop of Oxford, on the topic for the week, and then have a chat about the film in a friendly informal space, with refreshments to keep us going. There is a small booklet, Pilgrim Journeys: The Way of Love with 40 days of reflections on the commandments by Bishop Steven, that we can use to accompany us through Lent. Please do let me know if you are coming along, and I will ensure we have a book ready for you.

• 'Come and See' for families: these resources are designed for households with primary-aged children, but they are accessible or adaptable for slightly younger or older children and young people. You can sign up for these resources here and you will receive a (free) email each Sunday throughout Lent with a film and links to the materials you can use as a family throughout the week: https://mailchi.mp/oxford.anglican.org/come-and-see-for-families.

I look forward to us journeying together through Lent using the 'Come and See' resources as we seek The Way of Love. Please do get in touch if you have any questions.

The Aliens have landed by Lyn Ebbs

It's easy to tell what defines an alien species when you live somewhere like the British Isles, and you think of land mammals. It was either here before the last ice age (native) or someone brought it, deliberately or accidently (introduced). It's more of a problem when it comes to classifying birds, as the majority are capable of getting here by their own efforts. How do we decide if they arrived by natural spread, were introduced deliberately, escaped or even just turn up sporadically? Let's look at the evidence for four species.

There are fossil records from Derbyshire of Little Owls, so they were once



native to Britain, but that population has since died out. The current population is descended from introductions in Kent and Northants in the 1800s from where they spread out to other parts of England and Wales. Now the Little Owl is classified as a naturalised introduced

breeder. Their diet is mostly invertebrates and small mammals, and their preferred habitat is a mixed one of farmland and hedgerows, with suitable old trees to provide nest holes. Though the scientific name, Athene noctua, implies that they are nocturnal, they can often be seen in daytime. Having previously become extinct in Britain, their numbers are again declining, and they would be on the red list of Birds of Conservation Concern if they were classed as native. It's not just here but also in their native range in Europe that numbers are falling, mainly driven by low food availability due to intensive farming.

Collared doves, familiar locally as a garden bird, and preferring a range

of open lowland habitats, has definitely come here by natural movement. The species began spreading from its Eastern Mediterranean homelands in the 1930s, reached Britain in the 1950s and Oxfordshire in the 1960s. They only have two eggs per clutch but can



nest several times a year, which accounts for their dramatic long-term increase in numbers and range. However, their population appears to have peaked in the early 2000s with the emergence and spread of the disease, trichomonosis.

There are few birds that look more alien to the UK than Ring-necked



Parakeets, with their bright green plumage, rose-coloured neck ring and flashes of blue and yellow in the tail. There are some urban myths that account for their presence here: they were released from the set of the 1951 film The African Queen or that Jimi Hendrix released a pair in Hyde Park 1968.

More prosaically, they have been escaping from captivity over a long period and now have a breeding population of around 12,000 pairs. Their status changed from rare non-native breeding bird to a commoner one in 2008. They are most common in the south-east of England where they are frequent visitors to bird tables. Sightings peak during winter months when they form noisy roosts; in December 2023, a local one on the edge of Florence Park in Cowley contained 56 birds.

Then there are birds that appear and disappear, like the Waxwing. They

only come here in winter, and only then if crops of berries closer to their breeding grounds in Russia and Scandinavia are running low. These variable conditions make their appearance difficult to predict; they can come in ones or twos or in sizeable flocks, and at any time during the winter. They are



Starling-sized, with pinkish-buff plumage and touches of yellow and bright red on the wingtips, which give them their name. Coming from across the North Sea, they are most likely to be seen on the north-east coast but if the berry crop there is poor, they will spread south and west. A flock of 50 birds was seen in Thame in mid-January; if you still have rowan berries (their favourite food) in your garden keep your fingers crossed that these exotic visitors could pay you a call.

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John Howell MP writes...

Even before the Christmas decorations were down, or perhaps before they went up, speculation on the date of the General Election has been hotting up. It could actually be as late as January 2025, but whatever the date, the campaigning is already underway. Not just in the battle for media attention and getting messages out, but also in more subtle ways. In Parliament the increase in emails on specific issues referring to the next Party Manifesto is noticeable. In parliament the use of mechanisms to promote specific issues, such as Early Day Motions and Westminster Hall debates appears to be increasing.

.... I have already made public that it is not my intention to put myself forward as a candidate for the next General Election. I have served the Constituency since initially being elected in 2008 and have been returned to Parliament in four subsequent elections. I continue to take an interest in the views of constituents and, with the support of my team, assist those constituents wanting help. However, I am in the happy position of being able to sit tight when an email tells me that the senders vote at the next General Election depends on my reply to their email. Such emails often spring from campaign groups and, whilst I will continue to reply with my view, it is really the views of the various Parliamentary Candidates for the Constituency that should be of greater interest. I will have moved on to pastures new.


Shotover, they will be doing it again on **Sunday 17 March from 2 - 4.30pm**.

Botley West Solar Farm, the Ox-Cam Arc and East-West Rail

By the time you read this magazine the first and only statutory consultation on the Botley West Solar Farm (BWSF) proposal will be over. Despite requests from CPRE and others to delay the consultation until after the holiday period, the promoters, PhotoVolt Development Partners (PVDP), chose to run it over the Christmas period, the last open display meeting being on 19 January. Relatively few members of the public turned up at most meetings. Were people too busy, uninformed or simply not interested that nine square kms of agricultural land just West and North-West of Oxford may soon be covered with over 2.5 million very large metal and glass solar panels, delivering their maximum power for no more than three hours each day?

Boundary changes mean that Horton-cum-Studley falls within the new Bicester and Woodstock constituency for the national elections due this year. Much of BWSF is within this constituency and so should be an election issue for at least one of the Four Parishes.

Horton-cum-Studley Parish Council News

Several parishioners have raised concerns about the effect of building work in Church Lane: access for vehicles and pedestrians; the deteriorating condition of verges and general safety along this narrow road. The Parish Council and our District Councillor challenged Cherwell District Council (CDC) (which approved the planning application), about the lack of a proper construction and traffic management plan. CDC's response included the following:

"There were no planning reasons...which required a Construction and Traffic Management Plan. The Council understands the grass verge is the responsibility of Oxfordshire County Council Highways Dept. and it is outside the red line plan which accompanied the planning application. Once a planning permission has been granted, the Council cannot amend or alter the permission. As such, the matters raised are not breaches of planning control and planning enforcement has no powers to intervene."

Obstruction of the highway is usually a matter for the police and a report may be made to them via their website: https://www.thamesvalley.police.uk/.

The damage to the grass verge would be a matter for OCC Highways and this may be reported to them for any action deemed appropriate via their website: https://www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/."

It is good to see the new bus service (Route 108) is being supported by villagers, connecting us with Oxford and Bicester. Whilst the Oxford Bus Company endeavours to keep to a complex timetable, there may be the occasional wait given some of the narrow roads and access issues involved along the route, so patience is sometimes required.

Within the Parish Council, Councillor Kim Brown has established a working link with Age UK to support any villager with practical advice and guidance, especially during winter months. Please contact Kim at hcspcbrown@gmail.com if you know of anyone who may welcome such information.

Parish Council meetings, open to all in the village, are normally held on the second Thursday of the month, the **next meeting being on Thursday 8 February at 7.30pm in the Millennium Village Hall**.

Elizabeth Harrison 1942-2023



Elizabeth Harrison was born in New Zealand and worked for several years in Papua New Guinea (PNG) before eventually moving to the UK, where she lived in Stanton St John for many years.

Her first marriage was to the swashbuckling Graeme Galbraith who led her from Sydney to PNG and the enchanted social life of an ex-pat there in the 1960s.

However, it was through this move to PNG and her work that she met the great love of her life, Geoffrey Harrison. Geoffrey was much taken by this rather chic and yet strong woman and once she decided to visit the UK, he was there at Heathrow to meet her and Elizabeth's chapter in the UK began.

Throughout her varied and interesting life, she had two burning drives:

- The first was to educate herself and she assiduously focused on using her intelligent mind to gain understanding, challenge ideas and develop intellectual insight on the broadest range of themes from the judiciary to the arts. She was extremely well read and loved debate.
- The second drive was an ambition to improve opportunities and life chances for others and this is reflected in her work as a civil servant in public health in PNG and in Oxford and her 21 years as a magistrate.

All of this was underpinned by a forensic ability to organise – creating structure and programme management were strong competencies for Elizabeth and all of these were oiled and facilitated by her natural charm and persuasiveness.

Elizabeth's and Geoffrey's was a happy relationship of 34 years of marriage. Their greatest joy was adding Clare to their family and the subsequent delight of Clare's own family in Brett, Paul and Josh. Trips to Australia were a source of great pleasure to visit them over there and in meeting up with other friends there.

Elizabeth became Honorary Secretary to the Friends of Christ Church Cathedral in 2006, assisting with fundraising for Cathedral projects and widening awareness of the Cathedral's presence, ministry and mission. A Requiem Service was held for her at the Cathedral on 10 January 2024.

Elizabeth's daughter, Clare, has written to say just how immensely grateful she has been for the support from many people in Stanton St John. "They, along with others, really held Josh and I together in a most difficult time."

Christopher Bulstrode 1951 - 2003



Christopher Bulstrode moved to Stanton St John in 2001 with his partner (later wife), Victoria Hunt. They fell in love with the area and its surrounding countryside and have remained here ever since.

Chris was just 16 when he was awarded a scholarship to Oxford to read medicine. To fill the year before he was 17 he was offered a junior post at the Max Planck

Institute in Bavaria under Konrad Lorenz studying animal behaviour. He was fascinated. When he started in Oxford the following year, he found the labs and thinking not to his taste, and within a term he changed to Zoology specialising in ornithology and in marine biology. At a loss what to do after his degree, a wise tutor advised him never to make a career out of what you love most. So, he decided to start again in Medicine, this time in Cambridge after which he returned to Oxford for his clinical studies.

Following a spell in Africa he returned to Edinburgh to take his FRCSs and start his training in Trauma and Orthopaedics. He was appointed to Oxford as Clinical Reader, then Professor, specialising in hip and knee replacements where he remained for the rest of his working life, only doing NHS work, never private practice which he disapproved of.

After a spell on the General Medical Council, where he found it almost impossible to bring about change, Chris joined the Territorial Army aged 56 as the oldest recruit ever, went to Sandhurst, and was immediately deployed to Afghanistan where he worked for seven months in the field assessing medical and refugee problems with the local Afghans. On his return he joined Médecins du Monde (MDM) and was deployed to Gaza to perform re-constructive surgery on the injured Palestinians, later helping in Haiti, Ukraine and setting up and running the UK's Ebola Hospital in Sierra Leone. He received a CBE for his humanitarian work from his old classmate, Prince (now King) Charles at Buckingham Palace.

Remaining a keen ornithologist throughout his life he took great pleasure in developing the Stream and feeding area for the birds at The Stream House. Chris died on 7 December 2023 from complications associated with a degenerative neurological condition. He leaves two families and a wide circle of friends and colleagues who will miss him greatly.

Stanton St John Parish Council

The parish council consists of six councillors, all unpaid, who voluntarily give up their own time for the overall good of the village. Councillors come from all walks of life; however, they are generally very busy people, who have full lives and roles and responsibilities outside of the parish council. Councillors meet once a month in the evening (except for August) for a full council meeting and may attend other ad-hoc meetings from time to time. Members of the public can attend these meetings and speak in the public forum.

The parish council has responsibility for and makes decisions that affect green and open spaces, annual events in the village, memorials, recreation and play areas and neighbourhood planning. In addition, the parish council helps local groups and advocates for better services and facilities. The parish council is also a statutory consultee for planning applications.

Since I've been a Clerk in the parish (approximately 18 months) the main tangible achievements I've seen are:

- Electric chargers installed in the Village Hall car park
- Millenium Green lights installed
- Co-ordination of a successful litter picking day in March 2023
- Provided support for Jubilee celebrations

Work In Progress:

- A second defibrillator
- Traffic Working Party
- Neighbourhood Planning

Although there are currently no vacant councillor positions, the village needs people to become involved in planning its future. Three people have so far expressed an interest in participating in the Neighbourhood Planning process, which is a great start, but more are needed.
