## A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



I am writing this on Shrove Tuesday! I wonder if you had pancakes. These days I think people have them because they rather like them and it is traditional, rather than to deliberately use up ingredients before the onset of Lent. I enjoy pancakes, with an old-fashioned squeeze of lemon juice and a sprinkling of sugar – but I am too lazy to make them just for myself. Sadly, I did not get to the lunchtime meeting where pancakes were on offer. And I was not cheeky enough to invite myself to my neighbours when I heard they were having pancakes! I hope you enjoyed yours if you had them.

So now we are in Lent. I wonder, have you given anything up, or taken anything extra up, to mark the season? I have known many people over the years, who have given things up for the season. Out of interest, I have often wondered why. I think for some, it has been a helpful period of time when they could abstain from something and live more healthily, as they perceive it – giving up biscuits, or chocolate or alcohol, for example. It can be a ‘kick-start’ to a ‘healthy living regime’.

There have been years when I have given things up for Lent. I found these times quite testing – they were tests of my self-control, and will and determination, to keep going. I do not recall them as especially ‘spiritual’ experiences, although I think it was only through thinking about it being Lent, and the suffering of Jesus during his time in the wilderness, that kept me going. I gave up television for Lent one year. I spent my new found ‘spare time’ reading my Bible and spiritual books, and praying. If my memory serves me correctly, I treated myself to watching the rugby internationals though – so I was not overly pious!!

I am not sharing these with you to show off – I did these things for myself, to test myself, as a discipline for myself, to mark the period of Lent for myself, not to gain a badge of honour. These were personal things, and people only knew about them if they noticed I was not, for example, drinking or eating chocolate. These days I tend to try to ‘take something up’, rather than ‘give something up’, but I think it is for each of us to

consider for ourselves. What might be beneficial to us individually? For some, observing the period of Lent is a good discipline. I would encourage doing something, as otherwise the period passes, and it is no different to other times of the year.

Regular readers of my letter know that I love walking in the countryside with dear Bertie, my Labrador. It is a chance not only for both of us to get some exercise, but also a special time for me to think, to mull over things on my mind, to pray, and to marvel at God's creation. It is also a great time to bump into people and have ad hoc conversations, with us putting the world to rights as we chat.



I find there is always something beautiful to see, whatever the season, whether it is stunning sunrises or sunsets, frost on the hedgerows, dew on the grass, birds soaring in the sky, birdsong, livestock in the fields, or the herds of deer standing stock still, hoping not to be noticed. Maybe this Lent might be a time to marvel at the beauty of creation around us, to take that in, and be renewed by it.

I know life continues to be difficult for many. Please do get in touch if you need someone to talk to. Take great care and God bless you and your loved ones.

## Aerial Hunters

When I moved to Stanton St John 30+ years ago, the biggest bird I'd be likely to see in the skies over the village would have been a crow, a wood pigeon or the odd gull. Now raptors, birds of prey, are present in our skies; it's a rare day when I don't see at least one red kite; buzzards, too, have greatly increased in recent years. You need to make more of an effort to see a marsh harrier, another of the successes of the RSPB's Otmoor reserve. And, as I am typing this, our garden is getting one of its regular afternoon visits from a sparrowhawk.

These birds are all members of a big group of hawk-like birds of prey that hunt in daytime. Although different sizes, they share the same basic body shape of short necks, broad wings and longish tails. Their eyes are proportionally huge, giving them excellent vision. Their hearing is also good, but their sense of smell is poor. There is a noticeable difference in size between males and females, but it is the female that is invariably bigger.

They hunt a wide variety of prey, from small mammals and birds, reptiles, amphibians, to invertebrates. In breeding pairs, the parental roles differ sharply, the male provides for both the female and the young, with the female hunting in the later stages of nesting. The size difference between the adults may come in to play here as they won't be competing with each other by hunting for the same size prey.

Red kites, the most accomplished flyers of all raptors, are probably the easiest to recognise by sight. They are strongly patterned, graceful and noticeably fork-tailed. Even from a distance their angular silhouette and buoyant flight is always obvious. They are usually solitary hunters but will flock, for example, at harvest time when small mammals are easy prey, or in communal roosts in winter.



Buzzards are the largest species in our group of local raptors but with a compact shape: a short round head on a thick neck, a thickset body,

relatively broad wings and fairly short tail. In colour their plumage is typically warm brown above with pale underparts, but it can be very variable from almost uniformly dark to mainly white. They are mostly active predators but can be seen on the ground taking earthworms and, like red kites, they often scavenge.

Marsh harriers (the clue is in the name) are particularly at home in wetlands. They've nested successfully in the Otmoor reed beds for several years recently, having been missing from the county as a breeding bird for over 200 years. Here you will get the opportunity to see not just marsh harriers but buzzards and red kites, and can compare them for yourselves. Harriers are bulky birds, with a slim head and body, long wings with parallel edges, long tail and legs. They soar and glide with wings in a distinctive V shape. When provisioning the nest, the male calls the female; she flies out, flips over and catches the prey as he drops it. Called a food pass, this is quite dramatic to watch.



The sparrowhawk is the smallest species of our group and the one with the biggest disparity in size: the female is up to 25% bigger than the male. It's a fierce, dashing hawk that feeds almost entirely on birds, as indicated by its long legs. It's a woodland bird, preferring woodland edge, clearings and rides for hunting. It also hunts along hedges and shelter belts. It has rather short, rounded wings and a long square-ended tail. Its plumage is grey above and barred below, brown in the female, orange in the male. Its open flight is often described as 'flap, flap, glide'.



I hope to write about another group of raptors, the falcons, later in the year.

**At these elections, voters will need to bring photo ID with them to be able to vote at a polling station.** A wide range of photo ID will be accepted, including passports, driving licences, a disabled parking blue badge and proof of age PASS ID cards. You can still use your photo ID if it's out of date, as long as it looks like you. If an elector does not have an accepted form of photo ID, they can apply for a free voter ID document

known as a Voter Authority Certificate. The deadline to apply for voter ID for this election is 5pm on Tuesday 25 April. Information in respect of this requirement is available on the South Oxfordshire District Council website and via the Electoral Commission website.

## Daffodil Day at Shotover House, Sunday 26 March, 2-4.30pm

St Nicolas Church, with the support of the Shotover Trust who owns and manages the house and grounds at Shotover, is delighted to be joining once again with The Maple Tree Children's Centre in Wheatley to organise another 'Daffodil Day'. As many people from Forest Hill will know, Laura Spencer from The



Maple Tree, along with two regular volunteers from St Nicolas (among others), runs the Thursday morning Baby and Toddler group in Forest Hill Village Hall, and we have welcomed over 50 local families since these sessions re-opened in June 2021.

Last year's Daffodil Day event coincided with an afternoon of stunning weather at the end of a Covid 'Lockdown', which attracted an overwhelming number of people. Bob and Marjorie Taylor, who lived in a small cottage in Main Street, she moved at the age of 8 to the newly built house, 3 Wheatley Road, where she remained until her marriage in 1950, to Ken Champ, from Stanton St John. She and Ken then moved to The Nook in Wheatley Road where Andrew and Claire were born, with

the help of Nurse Stevens, the village resident Midwife. Sadly Ken died in 1982, aged 53. Andrew and Claire were both married and living away, which left Esme alone at The Nook. This she coped with over time, enjoying the company of her dog and the love and care of her son and daughter and their families, plus many friends.

School was at Stanton St John, after which she worked for The Ministry of Food in Marston Road, followed by Nielsen's at Sandhills, where she met Annette Parrott (known as Anne), with whom she spent many enjoyable holidays, never venturing outside the UK, for fear of flying or sailing. The thought of the Channel Tunnel almost turned Esme 'green' with fear.

Esme had many gifts, including a brilliant mind for maths (one of her great-grandsons has inherited this talent!). Other gifts were knitting, sewing, gardening, cooking, especially coffee cakes, and caring for her family and extended family and a great love for her Church, Saint Nicolas.

After retirement, spare time was taken up with regular visits on the village bus to Oxford, meeting up with Anne to share their friendship, and working together to help run The Headington Cancer shop. Esme delivered the Four Parishes Magazine to her end of the village for many years and she hugely enjoyed collaborating with Jane Walker to produce the third Forest Hill Village Book "Memories of the 1940's."

In later life Esme sustained a left sided stroke, which curtailed her movement, so moving to a bungalow around the corner made things much easier. Carers visited three times per day and many friends helped to keep her

amused. Riki Grandi was a very good friend along with many others. She always wanted to know about “any news of Forest Hill?”, and she was especially excited when her neighbour, David, would check his mobile phone on “any house moves in the village”.

Esme was blessed with 2 children, 8 grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren as well as many, many friends. Her funeral took place in a packed St Nicolas Church on 10 February. Esme’s wish was that any donations in her memory should be made to her beloved St Nicolas, and the generosity of her friends and family is greatly appreciated.

## Horton-cum-Studley Gardening Club news

By the time you read this, we will hopefully be welcoming the familiar colours of Spring, with crocuses, daffodils and drifts of wild primroses announcing the promise of longer, warmer days.

The starlings will have stopped murmuring – a breath-taking spectacle darkening the evening sky during winter months if you are lucky enough to live close to their reed-bed roost on Otmoor.

With so much that is unpredictable in the world at the moment, closeness to nature is an incredible comfort and, for me at least, brings a reassuring sense of permanence that some things can be relied upon: the sound of the first chiff-chaff heralding the true start of Spring (though increasingly they seem to stick around during the winter too); the odd plant that you thought had not made it through the bitter frosts miraculously showing tiny green shoots; and, of course, buds bursting into life and candyfloss blossom appearing on blackthorn and crab apple.

A friend with a large garden in the Chilterns told me that he neglected a large patch of grass last year and was rewarded with a profusion of wildflowers, including clover, bird's foot trefoil, yarrow, and even orchids. Inspired by this, and being lucky enough to have a long stretch of lawn in front of my house, I've been reading up on how to create patches of wildness. The jury seems to be out on exactly when / whether to mow the lawn to encourage grasses and wildflowers which are invaluable to a range of invertebrates, insects, pollinators, birds, reptiles, amphibians, and even mammals such as hedgehogs. I've decided to experiment by cutting various patches to different lengths at different times, allowing things to find their natural place. Planting yellow rattle (*rhinanthus minor*) will attract pollinators, weaken grasses and allow wildflowers to establish.

The Gardening Club is a great place to learn about all aspects of gardening, from visiting speakers or from other members. Membership, at £10 a year, is a real bargain, bringing with it discounts on seed catalogues as well as the chance to meet fellow lovers of horticulture. You are also most welcome to come along as a guest for £5 to see if you'd like to join us.

## Launton & Otmoor District Update February 2023

### The Local Plan

The Local Plan went to the Oversight & Scrutiny committee before it went to the CDC Executive in January. Below are the recommendations that the Executive will investigate more thoroughly, which will result in further delay to the next stage of a further public consultation.

- The balance of affordable housing included in the plan is not ambitious enough or adequate.
- It is important that all infrastructure keeps pace with development as well as ensuring satisfactory integration between new developments and established communities.
- The importance of farming has been recognised in the draft, but it should be given more prominence.
- In reference to Bicester Strategic Corridors, consideration should be given to creating a formal Green Belt around Bicester.
- Rural allocation of housing should be equitable.
- Executive to assure itself that the wording of policies included in the plan is strong enough, particularly in relation to Climate Action and viability.
- Members be given more opportunities to engage, provide feedback and comments during the Regulation 18 consultation.

District (South Oxfordshire) and Parish Council elections will take place on Thursday 4 May.

Nominations for parish councillors must be submitted by 4pm on Tuesday 4 April; the required nomination forms are available from South Oxfordshire District Council.

## Voter ID

The May 2023 local elections will be the first time that voters in the UK will be required to show photo ID when voting at a polling station.

A range of photo ID will be accepted, including passports, driving licences, disabled parking blue badges and cards with a PASS Mark. Expired ID is acceptable, as long as the photograph is still a true likeness of you.

If you don't have an accepted form of photo ID, you can APPLY NOW for a free voter ID document, known as a Voter Authority Certificate. If you need to apply for ID, you must do so by 5pm on 25 April, in order to vote in this election.

## Stanton St John Churchyard

Spring is finally in the air, and with it come lovely bulbs, blue skies and birdsong! Where better to appreciate our village conservation area than from the churchyard? It is an important village amenity with all year round open access and an exceptional unblemished Grade 1 church at its heart, offering us all a sunny peaceful corner and moment of quiet, with far reaching views looking out over the Millennium Field toward Stanton Great Wood to the Chilterns beyond.

By March the churchyard has come alive with a carpet of primroses. They are quite a showstopper, and are carefully left to set seed well into July in order to encourage more. Into April we have bluebells, and then swathes of marguerites under a shower of overgrown dog roses along the raised bank up toward the church door. By Summer we have wild cranesbill geraniums, champions, an everlasting pea, buddleia, honeysuckle, and knapweed to name a few. Butterflies and moths abound. Some open areas of grass are deliberately left to grow tall and set seed (behind the war memorial) whilst other areas around graves are kept trimmed and mowed for ease of access. The aim is to keep the churchyard as relevant and uncontaminated as possible in order to achieve a place of quiet reflection and enjoyment, and to keep it open to everyone all of the time. It is a country churchyard which might yet inspire a modern day Thomas Gray, John Donne or John Clare, reminding us of Time immemorial, as well as of two celebrated Stanton St John incumbents: John White and John Milton.

Our wildflower policy was started by June Schultz in 1985 in response to the Diocesan Living Churchyard initiative. We continue today with Nature Conservation uppermost in our minds. The aim is to encourage native wildflowers, grasses, lichens, mosses etc, and a wildlife habitat for butterflies, bees, moths and other insects, reptiles (lizards, grass snakes, frogs and toads) and mammals (bats, moles, field mice and shrews etc) and increase the local biodiversity. Stanton St John is set on a limestone ridge. The churchyard has a good fine tilth and 'free' fertilizer (bodies!), so we try to nurture what grows naturally and to compliment what's here. This means we do not allow acid loving plants such as heather, or anything that might change the nature of the soil or wildlife habitat. Since the churchyard is neither garden of remembrance, nor arboretum, shrubs,

new roses, and trees are all considered inappropriate because they easily become overgrown and shade our native species.

For the churchyard to remain relevant and sustainable, and above all easy to maintain, we ask everyone to be mindful of the churchyard policy to keep gravestones simple and planting minimal. The choice and type of gravestone, and the inscription, must always be approved by the Vicar before commissioning, and can only be approved if in line with the Diocesan churchyard rules. We are aiming for a certain uniformity and cohesion to the whole, and new headstones should have a honed finish, as opposed to polished or reflective, and preferably be of limestone not granite.

We are trying to uphold the Diocesan guiding principle of keeping the churchyard free from ornament and fanciful exotica, opting for wildflowers and native spring bulbs over garden centre cultivars. We also want to discourage exotic dominant species such as Spanish bluebells and coloured primula because they interbreed and overtake our native bluebells and local primroses. Our recommendation is for perennial native wildflowers rather than large plants or garden centre hybrid species. The Diocesan Churchyard Regulations are available at <https://d3hgriq6yacptf.cloudfront.net/61f2fd86f0ee5/content/pages/documents/20211104-doc-parish-support-churchyard-regulations-v01.pdf> to help clarify and advise.

Where Christmas wreaths are acceptable during December into January, stone ornaments, glowing lights, toys, and plastic flowers and other such decorations are unwelcome additions to graves. These will be removed as a matter of course, as will all dead flowers after they have gone over.

That said, whether local or just visiting, we would like **everyone** to feel that they are welcome in the churchyard: it is our historical backdrop and our continuum, and we are incredibly fortunate to have such a well tended community asset as the core of the village.

The churchyard is supported by Stanton St John Parish Council and the Gresswell Environment Trust for which we are very grateful. Suggestions, and offers of help are always welcome, especially during the summer months.

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
