#### A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



I wonder if any of you have watched any of the television series 'Pilgrimage'. First broadcast in 2022 there have now been four series, each following a group of celebrities, taking what the advertising calls 'a journey of a lifetime'. In each of the series, 'the pilgrims will visit key places of worship and rural communities, but will this journey of a lifetime change the way they think about themselves and their

beliefs?' The most recent series reminded me of having watched the first, so I decided to start at the beginning once more.

## Does this make sense? by Lyn Ebbs

We don't rely on our sense of smell to the same extent as we do sight, hearing or even touch. But during Covid, where its loss was one of the frequent symptoms, we became more aware of how much we depend on it. Combined with our sense of taste, it's essentially a way of getting information about airborne chemicals to our brains. How does our capacity to detect these signals, odours, compare with other animals? I don't have space to provide detail about how we detect smell. It involves the obvious organ, the nose; the olfactory nerve, which sends smell-related messages to the brain, and areas of the brain where we recognise odours that we have smelled before.



The European Mole is high on the list of British animals with a really good sense of smell. If you spend most of your life in an underground tunnel, unsurprisingly, sight and hearing are not going to be your go-to senses for finding food, compared to smell and touch. Like us, it takes air in through its nostrils and processes the scent

molecules in the brain. It can follow scent trails to their source, a real benefit when following earthworm tunnels underground. In the absence of a trail, they obtain stereo cues from their two nostrils, giving them directional information with each sniff, as they hunt for prey. They use similar methods when it comes to finding a mate: both males and females mark their burrows with urine containing odorous substances – lovely.

Fish, of course, have the added challenge that they need to detect smells

– chemical signals – under water. Salmon, in particular, have the reputation that they can detect their birthplace, and, remarkably, tracking studies have shown this to be true. Their life cycle in itself is remarkable: they hatch in shallow gravel beds in freshwater streams and spend their juvenile years in freshwater rivers. They



then migrate to the ocean as adults and live like sea fish, and return to their freshwater birthplace to reproduce. And this homing behaviour has been shown to depend on their olfactory memory.

Which brings us to birds. For some reason, early ornithologists seemed to be reluctant to accept that birds have a sense of smell. Over time researchers showed that they had functioning olfactory systems similar to other vertebrates and some had a very acute sense of smell indeed. An

American species, the Turkey vulture uses smell as well as sight to detect carrion. Field researchers were able to demonstrate this by showing that the birds were able to find concealed carcasses. But it was oil-pipeline engineers who were key to identifying the chemical attractant. To help them



detect gas leaks, they added a substance that smells like rotten cabbage, ethyl mercaptan, to the gas. It's also released from decaying organic matter and is detected by vultures, and the engineers were able to home in on the leaks because of the vultures flocking overhead.

At this time of year when evenings are warm enough to sit out in our gardens until after dark, it is noticeable that some flowers, such as honeysuckle, smell stronger at night-time than they do during the day. This makes them very attractive to moths which, while they have similar



neural pathways carrying the chemical messages, in the absence of nostrils detect scent using other body parts. Moths "smell" these cues with sensitive receptors on their antennae. The insects can thus distinguish countless plant and insect chemicals carried on the wind in a process

called chemoreception. As well as detecting food sources, female moths produce scents called pheromones to attract males, and the males use their antennae to pick up this scent. This is why the antennae of many male moths are feathered so as to increase their surface area and make them more sensitive. Recent studies have established that moths are important, but often overlooked, nocturnal pollinators of a wide range of plants.

Councillors are elected to represent the local community, so you must live or work in the parish or town council area. Becoming a councillor is a rewarding experience as you can make a change in your community to help improve residents' lives.

A councillor's role has three main areas:

**Decision-making** - Councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered, and what policies should be implemented by attending meetings and committees.

**Monitoring** - Councillors ensure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by monitoring how well things work.

**Getting involved locally** - As local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. These responsibilities often depend on what a given councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available.

#### Ragnall's Lane, Horton-cum-Studley: advance notice of work

During June and July work will be carried out on Ragnall's Lane involving the use of machinery and restricting normal use.

The work has been commissioned by RSPB, after consultation with Oxfordshire Council (Rights of Way), Horton-cum-Studley Parish Council, relevant landowners and some interested local parties.

## 1. Restricted byway and track repairs (2-13 June subject to weather conditions)

The work will regrade the existing stone track to its original condition to a width of approximately 3 metres. The track will be topped dressed, following guidance recommended by the British Horse Society.

The section between Otmoor Farm and the overhead electricity line will be completed first. The grips will be cleared out to facilitate drainage, but the width will not be increased into field entrances.

The contractor is MP & KM Golding and the plan has been agreed with OCC Countryside Access Officer (Northeast) tracy.sutton@oxfordshire.gov.uk.

## 2. Installation of power line by SSEN (16-20 June and 2-5 July subject to weather conditions)

The work will involve the section between Otmoor Farm and the entrance to the SSI/firing range (by the pump house on Otmoor).

Signage along the entire track will show how access is affected, summarised as:

**Access on foot** – It will be possible to pass on foot. Please be prepared to wait and then follow the advice of the machinery operator in order to pass.

**Vehicle access** – At the end of each day, the track will be left suitable for access on foot and for permitted 4x4 vehicles. Vehicular use of the track during reconstruction is at the risk of the individual.

#### **Vehicle Weight restrictions**

We have raised with Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) concerns about the number of vehicles going through the village which appear to exceed the permitted weight limit of 7.5 tonnes. OCC has confirmed the location of weight restriction signs which for our village start at the top of Horton Hill (the junction of Oakley Road and Brill Road) and continue towards and including large parts of the B4027, including Forest Hill, Islip and Barton. The locations are shown on Google maps below.

Whilst vehicles can travel to access addresses within the restricted area, they are otherwise prohibited in the interest of safety for residents and other road users or to protect weak structures (e.g. bridges). If you have witnessed a suspected breach of a highway weight restriction by a vehicle you can report it to Oxfordshire Trading Standards Service online at: <a href="https://service.oxfordshire.gov.uk/reporthighwaysbreach">https://service.oxfordshire.gov.uk/reporthighwaysbreach</a>.

#### **Annual Parish Meeting**

The Annual Parish Meeting was held on Thursday 8 May 2025 and we were fortunate to have two speakers this year on themes of conservation:

**Olivia Field – Vice-Chair CPRE Oxfordshire** (Council for Rural Protection of England) ) outlined the vision for the CPRE and several campaigns within

Oxfordshire where CPRE are active. These included: the Botley Solar Farm; the Abingdon Reservoir; Hedgerow Heroes; and the Green Belt Way. Information was shared about a community Audit, the Noke Solar Farm, the 'Ox/Cam Arc' and a New Towns Taskforce.

**David Wilding – RSPB** (Otmoor Reserve) illustrated the positive results of work by RSPB volunteers and staff to improve the population of curlews on Otmoor. Amongst the activities was that of a fast reactive team deployed to erect a 20m fence around the nests of curlews, protecting eggs from local predators and thus contributing to an increase in the curlew presence on Otmoor.

Parish Council meetings, open to all in the village, are normally held on the second Thursday of each month, 7.30pm in the Millennium Village Hall, although an August meeting is not usually held.

#### Stanton St John Parish Council

At the Parish Council meeting held on 22 April, several local matters were discussed of interest to residents.

Highways officers met with councillors and a resident in March to review issues including potholes, flooding and ditch maintenance. The council continues to press for restoration of trees at Shepherds Pit and is progressing a lighting review.

A public meeting to discuss traffic calming measures was held on Thursday 22 May at 7.30pm in the Village Hall, following work by the Traffic Working Party.

Councillors have formally joined other local parishes in opposing the proposed creation of a large Oxford Unitary Authority. A joint letter was submitted to the Minister for Devolution outlining local concerns about the impact on services and representation.

In response to resident feedback, the Council has written to Oxfordshire County Council requesting that the 108 bus continue to stop at the Village Shop, highlighting its importance as a local service point.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 16 June at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.


