A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



Oh my goodness! Is it possible for there to be yet more rain to come? Looking at the forecasts it seems the answer is yes! We have had quite a deluge over, what seems like quite some time now. It is a while since I was chatting with people who said there is more water lying on Otmoor than at any time over the thirty years they have lived here. Others have spoken of flooded roads in places never experienced

before. Ditches, rivers, and streams have all overflowed in many parts.

I know the areas around Gloucester and Worcester well and travelled

around them much over the years, but the sense of driving on a causeway around them seems more prevalent this winter than ever before. There are flooded sports pitches, the racecourse and cricket ground at Worcester are under water – not unique events by any means, but ongoing longer than



usual it seems. Fortunately, I have not heard of houses flooding locally – that must be a dreadful experience.

Bertie has decided he is not keen on the hose pipe to clean him off when we return from our walks, so getting him out of the car if we have driven a short distance in the hope of slightly drier conditions to walk in has become a little tricky. I think he got the idea from his best friend who refuses to be hosed down however muddy he is. Play dates can be quite a nuisance, giving unhelpful ideas!! I bet parents suffer from this! But just like children, he loves splashing through the puddles, and wallowing through the mud!

Just as the ground begins to dry up, another onslaught comes – so I would not be surprised to hear of a modern day 'Noah' building an ark if it carries on like this!

Despite this, one of my recent delights was watching a two-year-old (child not dog!) in colourful wellies and an all-in-one suit to keep them dry, splashing away in the puddles as they walked down the road. There is something quite delightful seeing the innocent enjoyment of such a

simple activity – they were having a ball! And fortunately for the parents, the child kept dry! It is always good to try and find some positives when things are not looking so great.

As I write this we are in Lent, preparing ourselves for remembering the events of Holy Week and Easter. I would love to hear what you have been doing as Lenten disciplines if you have. I know many have engaged with the Come and See – The Way of Love materials from the Diocese of Oxford. It has been great meeting with some on Wednesday evenings, but some have been reading the booklet or daily emails so it would be good to hear how you have found them. You may have read one of the books I suggested or done something of your own. As you read this, there is still a while to go in Lent, so maybe this is a prompt to take a little time each day to think about the purpose and meaning of Lent.

There is much going on at the end of the month as we get to Holy Week and Easter. Please do take a good look at the magazine which details the activities and think about what you might like to join in with. If you have never been to a service on Palm Sunday, maybe this is the year to come along as see what goes on. There are gentle reflective services each evening during Holy Week, together with times for reflection on Good Friday and Holy Saturday, helping us to remember the story of the cross between the celebrations of Palm Sunday and Easter Day, reminding us of that critical part of the Christian story. Maybe you might like to join in the Passion Play in Beckley on Holy Saturday. Whatever might attract you, I look forward to once more making this journey with you all across the Four Parishes.

Come and See: The Way of Love: Lent 2024



A reminder that we are meeting in Stanton Village Hall on Wednesday evenings from 7.30-9pm during Lent (with the exception of Holy Week), and one week afterwards, so the remaining sessions are 6, 13 and 20 March, and 3 April. We will watch a short film from Bishop Steven, Bishop of Oxford, on the topic for the week, and then have a chat about the film in a friendly informal space, with refreshments to keep us going. Whilst the sessions do link together, each stands on its own too, so please do come and join us if you have not been before. A friendly welcome will greet you!

Holy Week and Easter

Holy week begins with **Palm Sunday** when we celebrate Jesus triumphal arrival in Jerusalem. Crowds met him, throwing palm branches on the road. There was a celebratory atmosphere, but we must not forget that Palm Sunday sets before us the suffering of Jesus, and the cross. We receive Palm Crosses during our services across the Benefice, which we take home as a reminder. Palm crosses from this year are burnt to provide the ash for next year's Ash Wednesday service.

To help ensure we do not go straight from the celebrations from Palm Sunday to those of Easter Day, and are once again reminded of the Cross and the suffering of Jesus for us, we observe Holy Week, through services, times of reflection and readings of the story of God's people. We look forward to welcoming you to services of Holy Communion from Monday through to Maundy Thursday at 7.30pm (see the rota on page 5). On Maundy Thursday we leave the Church in silence. On **Good Friday** we have a service of reflection on the 'Hour before the Cross' in Stanton Church, where we spend time thinking about Jesus' death on the Cross, remembering his suffering for us, his agony, his death, and then his burial. It is essential that we come to the Cross and face it squarely, in all its horrors – this time of reflection helps us do that.

Holy Saturday is a time of desolation and emptiness as we remember the reality of Jesus' death –his life was over! His death was every bit as complete and final for him as it is for us.

At 6pm we meet in church in Beckley to bring to mind the story of God's people, through readings from Genesis to the Gospels, from the Psalms, and through prayer.

On **Easter Day** we gather across the benefice to celebrate what many consider the most holy day of the Christian calendar: the astonishing good news of the empty tomb and the risen Lord. We look forward to celebrating this special day together, when we say 'Alleluia, Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, alleluia!'

Beckley Passion Play, Saturday 30 March, 2pm

As we revive this fabulous village tradition, we're still looking for some more performers from across the Four Parishes, so please do think about joining in. The Play begins at the Church, and will be performed principally in Beckley High Street on 30 March, starting at 2pm. We don't have to be great actors. We don't have to learn any scripts. We don't have to dress up unless we wish to!

We need to find key characters in the Easter story, as well as others to make up the crowd and bystanders, so there are lots of opportunities to be involved if you don't want a main part. We need help in setting up the scenes – props are all there ready. And of course, it would be great to have people watching on too.

This should be a wonderful way for us to experience Easter this year, so please do think about volunteering to be part of it or come along and watch. All are welcome from across the Four Parishes – and further afield too! Madness and Deception: Hares, Rabbits and Easter Eggs by Lyn Ebbs

We expect hares to display seasonal craziness, why else do we describe people as being mad as March hares? But if we want an example of eccentric behaviour, rabbits secretly leaving decorated eggs around at Easter is odder than anything we see hares getting up to. And rabbits or hares have also set a visual riddle that has existed for hundreds of years and spread thousands of miles – see what you make of it.

Our fastest British land mammal, the Brown Hare, relies on its acute



senses and running speed (up to 45 mph) to evade predators. The March madness that we associate with hares is a part of their mating behaviour. You can see these normally elusive animals chasing each other across fields or standing on their hind legs apparently engaged in boxing bouts. You might think that

the boxers are rival bucks competing for the attention of a doe. However, when a buck has been too persistent in pursuit of a doe, it is she that is boxing to fend him off if she is not yet ready to mate. Brown Hares have been in Britain since the Iron Age, when they were introduced from across the North Sea.

Rabbits arrived with us a little later; there is evidence that they were

brought over in the 1st century by the Romans. They are smaller than hares and lack the black tips to their ears. They have brown eyes (Brown Hares have noticeably lighter, amber eyes). They have a more obvious white tail and hop rather than lope. They can be found almost anywhere they can burrow;



their ideal habitat being light soil in areas of short grass. They avoid damp conditions which is why you are far more likely to see a hare than a rabbit on Otmoor.

A further difference between hares and rabbits, is their sleeping arrangements, hares don't use burrows; they make a small depression on the ground in long grass, known as a form, to shelter in during the day. Both

rabbits and hares are associated with springtime, fertility and rejuvenation in many religions and cultures. At this time of year, other creatures are making use of similar grass-lined depressions in wet meadows – lapwings. So, when children were sent out at Easter time to look for another symbol



of fertility, the egg, left in grassy nests, they may have startled hares from their forms. And those forms that did contain eggs were possibly really lapwings' nests. The Easter bunny may therefore not be a rabbit at all, or even a hare, it might actually be a deceiving bird. (A group of lapwings is known as a

deceit, for their habit of pretending injury when their eggs or chicks are threatened.)

The Easter Bunny tradition is clearly not based on any observed activity of rabbits but, along with hares, they have mystical reputations. Hares have associations with witchcraft – witches were believed to be able to transform themselves into hares. Rabbits are associated with the moon in Chinese culture. Where we see a man in the moon, Chinese legend locates a rabbit there, which is believed to be pounding herbs with a mortar and pestle, creating the elixir of immortality.

One further piece of deception is in an ancient image that is shared by


many religions and cultures, from the Far East, across northern Europe, and is even found in Devon. This pictorial riddle shows three hares interlocked in a circle. If you look at a single animal, as you would expect, it has a pair of ears. But look at the group as a whole, and they have just three ears between them. In Devon churches they are known as Tinners' Rabbits and



are found in tin-mining areas. In other images they look much more harelike. The explanations of the symbol are many and varied but I think it ties in with the mystery and deception associated with these animals.

LnBB 'Land North of Bayswater Brook': Update



A new planning application has been submitted by Cilldara Group (Headington) Ltd, for the other part of the Land north of Bayswater Brook (LnBB) site – Bayswater Farm. Please see map above. The application is for 121 dwelling and an 80-bed care home. This brings the total for the site to 1,691 dwellings + 80 bed care home. This is a 54% increase to the Local Plan 1,100 dwelling allocation. This increase will impact roads, congestion, flooding, the environment and local facilities and also destroy more former Green Belt countryside.

The developers of the larger part of the site – Christ Church and Dorchester Residential Management have recently threatened SODC with legal action for non-determination of their planning applications. This is surprising as the developers continue to add amendments to their planning applications and have not addressed the very serious objections made by the statutory consultees such as the Environment Agency – objecting to development in flood zones 2 and 3, the County Council on roads, English Nature and BBOWT on the SSSi. The threat of litigation has since been withdrawn. Dates for the SODC Planning committee meetings to consider the applications cannot be agreed until the statutory consultees are satisfied. Our concerns remain the same – SSSi, wildlife and the environment; flooding; health of the local residents and roads. The construction phasing plans submitted show development starting next to the crematorium and between Wick Farm and the Bayswater Road. New access roads will be created to the Bayswater Road x 2, A40 northern ring road and Elsfield Road.

The proposed transport infrastructure changes will affect local residents severely. The Bayswater Road and all its junctions will be narrowed and the mini-roundabout removed. This is to allow a 2-way cycle path and pavement to be constructed beside the road. Two new access roads to LnBB will be traffic light controlled, to give them priority. The Headington roundabout will have the eastern and northern junctions increased to 4 lanes, although one of the lanes on the northern junction will be a bus lane. The Bayswater Road junction with the roundabout will have traffic lights. The capacity of the roundabout will not be increased. The western access from the Elsfield Road will reconfigure the junction with the Elsfield and Woodeaton Roads and the ring road. This will be hugely disruptive to all.



Helen Paige (née Gill) 1932 – 2023



Helen was one of four children born to Kate and Alfred Gill in Beckley, East Sussex. She attended the village school and then went to Rye Grammar School in 1943. This was during the Second World War and the entire school had been relocated to Bedford; consequently Helen started her secondary education away from

home, as an evacuee. The school moved back to Rye in 1944, and Helen sat School Certificate exams in 1948 and Higher School Certificate in 1950.

After leaving school Helen moved to London where she started working for the Invalid Children's Aid Association. She lived in a hostel in Chelsea, attending Chelsea Methodist Church and enjoying the Proms at the Royal Albert Hall. She worked in London until 1953 when she married Ted Paige, who she knew from childhood days. They lived in Reading while Ted completed postgraduate research at the University. In 1955 they moved to Malvern, where Ted took a post with the Radar Research Establishment.

Helen and Ted lived in Malvern for 22 years during which time their four children - two girls and two boys - were born. In 1977 the family moved to Horton-cum-Studley when Ted took up the post of Professor of Electrical Engineering at the University of Oxford. During this period, Helen completed her training as a Local Preacher, becoming fully accredited in 1980. She retired as a lay worker in 2000, but continued to be involved with church groups and pastoral care.

After Ted died in 2004, Helen remained in Horton-cum-Studley where she continued to be an active member of the community and a busy hostess.

Helen enjoyed music in all of its forms, especially opera. Every January, when the rest of the world were booking their summer holidays, Helen was making plans for the upcoming Glyndebourne season. She was also an enthusiastic supporter of the England cricket team. She and Ted shared a common interest in the natural world and this would shape their holiday destinations and mid-week day trips; Helen always with a pair of binoculars dangling around her neck.

Helen lived independently until she was admitted to John Radcliffe Hospital, where, after a short illness, she sadly died on 27 November 2023, aged 91. Sadie Paige

The Parish Council has confirmed that, given continuing pressure on the cost of living for residents, the Parish Precept will not be increased this year and it will be £9,455 for the 2024/25 fiscal year, changed only to reflect the latest population data. Do you want to live longer? - Take up Tennis



Did you know that people practicing tennis have been found to increase their life expectancy by as much as nearly 10 years?

Tennis is the Best Over a period of 25 years, from the early 1990s to 2017, researchers from the Copenhagen City Heart Study looked into the link between practicing different sports and overall life expectancy. Tennis came out well ahead of other sports with increased life expectancy of 9.7 years. Badminton was in second place with 6.2 years and football was 4.7 years.

Interestingly, the more social sports ranked higher in the study than the more individual ones, suggesting that the benefit is not only in the physical activity but possibly also in the social aspect. It is mightily difficult to play tennis with yourself!

Should you like to take a stab at tennis, there are plenty of opportunities in and around Oxford. Check Tennis Oxfordshire's webpage for options. But also, you don't need to go very far. The next season for **Horton-cum-Studley Tennis Club starts on 1 April, offering 1-year memberships for children, adults, and families with some of the lowest fees in the county.**

Over the past year, including during winter, the club has kept active with lots of coaching happening thanks to Christina Russell and our head coach, Bart Wisniewski, and his team. Anyone from 6 to 106 years old has been able to find a coaching offer. We will continue to strive to offer coaching opportunities to address most needs.

In the coming season, we will start doing "pop-up club hours" where members can come over to the courts and meet others for a fun game of tennis. Since these are driven by volunteers and subject to availability, they will be published through email to members, in WhatsApp groups and through our Facebook page.

Jamie Brown 1945 - 2024

Jamie Brown has left us now, but we remember him fondly as part of the



Four Parishes community. He moved to Stanton St John late in his career as a writer and film producer.

Jamie was a writer and storyteller. While working on his degree in English Literature in Canada, he edited his university's weekly newspaper. Jamie wrote plays and novels, and was introduced to the great and the good

at the Middlebury Bread Loaf Writers' Conference in the United States. Later, the National Film Board of Canada coaxed him to come to them as an expert in script writing. He then went on to found one of Canada's biggest film and television production companies, producing projects in both French and English. Over the years, he published five novels and produced over forty feature films. His final film just wrapped this month in London at the iconic Abbey Road Studios.

Jamie also had a life-long passion for motor racing cars. He plotted his yearly calendar around motoring events. His vast knowledge of cars spanned the eras, but he had an especially keen interest in pre-war racing cars. Over the years he owned many interesting cars and motorcycles. Jamie travelled extensively with his career and always looked out for interesting motors. Living in England gave him occasion to enjoy its rich history of motor racing, motor cars and famous motor racing circuits.

Jamie grew up in a family of writers, politicians, ministers and journalists in Canada. He was born to James E. Brown (a local MP and later judge) and Elizabeth Eedy in Brantford, Ontario. His two sisters – Cathleen Morrison and Sarah Brown – have both visited and enjoyed Stanton St John. Jamie's great, great maternal grandfather was a newspaper publisher, his paternal grandparents were church ministers, doctors and farmers.

Jamie married his wife, Lorna, in 1972. Together, they raised their children in Montreal and moved to the UK in the 1990s. They lived for many years in London, before moving to Los Angeles and then on to Stanton St John. Their children, Jean-Pierre, Alexandre (Alex) and Elizabeth have visited the parish many times over the years. Elizabeth now lives in Oxford where she is raising her three children, Willow, Rudy and Frankie. Jean-Pierre's son, Amiel, is a men's velodrome medallist in Canada and part of the Canadian National Cycling team.

Having moved to Stanton St John in 2013, Jamie loved village life. Many will remember him walking round the village three times a day with his beloved dogs, and locking and unlocking the church. Working from his home office over the years necessitated routine walks "to clear the mind". It also gave him a chance to stop and chat with his neighbours.

Shortly after moving here, Jamie quickly became involved in the village church. His Christian upbringing is reflected in his regard for faithful stewardship. He regularly attended church and became a member of the PCC. He was keen to fundraise for church – he wanted the church to be well-used and the fabric to be preserved so it would be there to be enjoyed for the next 900 years.

Jamie was genuinely interested in building community and was instrumental in setting up a village film club five years ago. The first film we showed was one of Jamie's 'Shadows in the Sun' and he talked about it at the screening. The film club continues to thrive and attracts villagers from the four parishes at its regular screenings.

Jamie has left us with wonderful memories of his kindness, his zest for life and his dedication to pursuing acts of service to make life better for those around him. His many friends and colleagues remember him as an exacting leader, a creative thinker and a bon vivant.

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
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
