A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



I am writing this letter on a most beautiful autumnal day. The sun has been shining all day and the sky is beautifully blue with not a cloud to be seen. These bright days before we enter the shorter days of winter always seem a bonus. And especially surprising is that we have this good weather despite it being half term! It is nicer today than it was through most of the summer holidays!!

And that reminds me of my recent holiday when Bertie and I enjoyed walks in better weather than in the summer. It was not all bright sunshine – we got soaked as well, but a holiday in England would not be so without the odd soaking! And what does Bertie mind as long as we are out walking!



There was a feast for my eyes to behold as I lapped up the countryside – moorland and hills, coastline, and villages. An array of wildlife – hare, deer, pheasants, grouse, birds of prey and a tiny wren; farm animals close at hand, listening to them eating the grass in the otherwise silence of the evening; watching shepherds with their dog moving sheep across the rough terrain, an absolute delight to behold. And then I take in the



changing colours on the trees, the berries in the hedgerows, the ever-changing sky as weather fronts move swiftly through on the strong breeze – bright sunshine one moment, followed by moody grey clouds bringing heavy rain, dried up quickly as the wind whistles through.

Remembrance Sunday, a week later, on 12 November this year, we remember those from our communities who have died serving their country in the world wars, as well as those who have died in more recent conflicts. For details of the services throughout the benefice see page 5. You may also like to join us for the concert in Forest Hill in the evening. This is always an excellent opportunity for reflection on the horrors of war.

It seems even more poignant than ever as we listen to the news, especially currently around the conflicts in Ukraine and in the Middle East, how precious peace is, and how horrendous is the human cost of war. As we gather to remember once more, may we also be earnest in our prayers for peace. These prayers may be said in our own homes, but if you want to gather with others, please do remember the twice weekly prayers throughout the benefice (see page 8 for more details).

In darkness, it is always important to remember the hope of Christian faith. Hope that out of darkness there will be light, out of despair there may be joy, out of hatred there may be love. The picture on the front cover should encourage us to remember this hope. May Gary and Alona have a long and happy marriage — what a delight to have been part of their journey.

Please do get in touch if life is hard and you need someone to talk to. Take great care and God bless you and your loved ones.

Obituary – Jonathan (Jonny) Hill Horton-cum-Studley and Forest Hill

Born in Highgate, Jonny grew up in Saffron Walden with his brother, sister and then two step brothers. After a grammar school education spent at least partly hiding under tables, he went to the Royal Academy of Music to study clarinet and guitar. His professional life included performing and teaching. He was lead clarinet for the Oxford Symphony Orchestra and played in several clarinet and guitar groups, as well as a folk duo with John Thompson. His teaching was inspirational, and he taught several pupils who went on to musical prominence.

He also became an expert woodwind restorer and it was a joy to watch him turn a rectangle of metal into a shiny, smooth clarinet key.

Jonny found his estranged mother in adulthood, and had the chance to know his feisty Georgian mum, from whom his more spirited traits were undoubtedly inherited! He married another musician and raised several Siamese cats, one of his main loves. His other passions included Riley cars, running, and the renovation of the Lynton & Barnstaple Railway (he mapped out and photographed the overgrown track bed, much of which is now back on track). A competitive marathon runner when younger, after meeting me and moving out to these villages he was a familiar runner (never call it jogging) around Horton-cum-Studley and then Forest Hill.

Like many, Jonny had burdens to bear, which eventually caught up with him and his last years were difficult. The very best of Jonny – his musical talent, hard work and intellectual curiosity - lives on in his two amazing daughters, who miss him very much.

Bird Flu by Lyn Ebbs

As well as being informative, I like my articles to be generally upbeat, but I felt I had to tackle a topic which is rather depressing. A few people recently have mentioned that they have seen sick or dead pigeons locally and asked if these could be cases of bird flu. The short answer is yes, they could. Bird flu is an informal version of the name, avian influenza, a disease of both domestic and wild birds. It's similar to the flu virus that infects humans but is one of a number of strains that have evolved over time to mainly infect birds. Bird flu has been a topic of news reports and articles for over two years now because the strain that is currently circulating worldwide is particularly contagious and lethal, and is therefore known as 'highly pathogenic avian influenza' or HPAI. One of the properties that makes it more dangerous, is the range of bird species it has been able to infect.

Once established in wild birds, HPAI spread via migration routes within and



between continents. An outbreak began in the UK in November 2021 and during the summer of 2022 there were many reports of HPAI in seabird colonies. The distressing television images of the bodies of birds, such as gannets, washing up on beaches vividly showed the impact as the disease took its toll on thousands of birds. Sadly, many breeding colonies experienced a second summer of disease in 2023. This year the outbreak began inland in Black-headed

Gull colonies, including amongst these gulls on Otmoor, where the tern raft was removed to prevent its spread to the Common Tern colony.

These recent series of bird flu outbreaks have killed tens of thousands of

birds in the UK alone and has spread through more than 70 bird species. Bird flu mostly spreads from bird to bird through direct or indirect contact with infected saliva, nasal secretions or droppings, making birds that nest colonially or feed in flocks more susceptible. The virus also spreads through predation or



scavenging. As well as seabirds, fatalities are obvious in larger species such

as geese and swans but other smaller wild bird species like pigeons have been found to be infected.

Some of the noticeable symptoms of HPAI in birds are:

- Unresponsiveness
- Lack of coordination and loss of balance, tremors
- Drooping wings and/or dragging legs
- Twisting head and neck.

Human infections with HPAI are rare, mostly occurring in people such as



poultry workers, in close contact with infected birds. You're very unlikely to catch bird flu by feeding garden birds. Even so, it's sensible to maintain good hygiene at bird feeding stations, cleaning bird feeders every week and changing birds' drinking and bathing water regularly. There is a small risk to cats or dogs if they

catch wild birds infected with bird flu. HPAI has been found in mammals such as foxes and otters so it wise to prevent your pets from having close contact with any dead or sick wild birds, as they may be infected with bird flu. Common garden birds have a lower risk of being infected with bird flu than ducks, geese, swans and gulls. So, when walking your dog, keep them under effective control so they stay away from wild birds.

There is a glimmer of hope from research carried out in June last year. Scientists studying the impact of HPAI on the largest Northern Gannet

colony, on Bass Rock, found that some of the birds had black or mottled irises instead of the usual pale blue ones. The team took blood samples from 18 apparently healthy adult gannets with both normal and black irises. These were then tested for presence of bird flu antibodies — indicating recovery from



infection. Eight birds tested positive, of which seven had black irises. The study, therefore, provided evidence that at least some wild birds could survive this deadly virus.

The structure of Government, national and local, can be confusing. When someone needs help with something it can be difficult to know just who is responsible for what, and therefore who can help when things do not go as they should. I often receive requests from people to help them with issues that are not Parliamentary matters and with which I cannot help. I appreciate that this can be frustrating and so I thought that it might be helpful if I set out who does what.

It is often thought that an MP sits at the top of a hierarchy of Government and has power to direct local councils. This is not the case. Local councils are autonomous, and MPs do not have any jurisdiction over local council decisions. Hence local councils have their own elected representatives in the form of councillors. People elected to these councils have direct access to officers at the respective councils and so are better placed to take up relevant issues. I have found that referring to local councillors is the quickest way to get action.

So, to help steer through the hierarchy let me set out who does what. Essentially as an MP I can help with issues and concerns that relate to central government departments. In Oxfordshire we have three tiers of local government, the County Council, District Councils and Parish Councils or Parish Meetings. Oxfordshire County Council is responsible for local services such as education, social services, transport, roads, rights of way, libraries, the fire service, and bus subsidies. The constituency is served by two district councils, Cherwell and South Oxfordshire. They are responsible for local services, including planning, housing, rubbish collection, environmental services, leisure services, some car parks and council tax collection. Parish Councils and Parish Meetings deal with very local concerns and can influence the other councils on behalf of residents.

Whilst on the topic of what I can and cannot do it may also be helpful to comment on requests to attend specific events. When Parliament is sitting MPs are expected to be in Westminster from Monday to Thursday, unless on other parliamentary business elsewhere. During a week in Westminster there are many competing demands such as scrutinising legislation, attending debates, committees, and other meetings. These competing demands mean that it is not always possible to attend a particular debate or drop-in session that a constituent may ask me to attend. When I cannot attend something it does not reflect lack of interest, simply that I cannot be in two places at once.

I hope that setting this out is helpful and answers several questions that I have been asked of late. If there is a particular issue that concerns you, please do share your thoughts. My contact details are on my website - www.johnhowell.org.uk.



Horton-cum-Studley Parish Council News

Much attention is being paid to the effect of the 20-mph speed limit introduced earlier this year. Whilst there has been some improvement in road safety over the last few months, there are reports of less considerate drivers 'tailgating' vehicles observing the speed limit and others parking in places which could increase the risk of accidents. A recent example was a lorry at the junction of Church Lane reducing visibility for other vehicles and road users. The Parish Council has discussed with our County Councillor, how to work with delivery companies (whose drivers may be under pressure to achieve targets) to adapt to the lower speed limits in our village.

The Parish Council operates with limited income each year (mainly from the 'precept', a part of council tax) to deliver specific local services. Amongst these, we budget to spend nearly £1k each year on the provision and emptying of dog waste bins. Thus, the Parish Council would like to remind dog owners to clear up after their pets by using the dog waste bins provided, and to keep dogs on leads around livestock and crops.

Parish Council meetings, open to all in the village, are normally held on the second Thursday of the month, the **next meeting being on Thursday 9 November, 7.30pm in the Millennium Village Hall**.




