# Dame Elizabeth Holford's Charity Applications for Bursaries welcomed

The Charity was set up in 1720 when Dame Elizabeth Holford left £500 to establish a school for the children of Stanton St John and Forest Hill. The Charity came into being in 1988, following the closure of the school at what is now the Holford Centre, in Stanton St John. The Charity's area of benefit now includes Stanton St John, Forest Hill with Shotover, Beckley, Horton-cum-Studley and the ecclesiastical Parish of Elsfield. Applications for grants are invited from school aged children and young people up to the age of 25 who are or who have parents resident in the area of benefit, for help in their educational needs.

In the past bursaries have been granted for computer software, sporting equipment, residential courses, text books, laptops and other electronic equipment, college courses not funded by Student Finance and music lessons. Applications are not means tested and funding is granted on a case-by-case basis.

# Land North of Bayswater Brook (LnBB) Update

During February and March SODC received over 150 responses from the public, parishes and community groups objecting to the three recent planning application for Land north of Bayswater Book and in addition 2 petitions one of 3,200 signatures and another 63 from most Wick Farm residents, who will be surrounded by the development. These responses were in addition to the statutory consultees e.g., Highways, Natural England, Historic England etc.

Some of the responses from the statutory consultees showed clear dissatisfaction with the information provided in the over 550 planning documents submitted.

**Natural England** - "the application could have potentially significant effects on Sidlings Copse and College Pond Site of Special Scientific Interest. Natural England requires further information in order to determine the significance of these impacts and the scope for mitigation .... Without this information, Natural England may need to object to the proposal."

National Highways - "CTMP: No development shall take place until a detailed Construction Traffic Management Plan (CTMP) has been submitted to and approved in writing by the Local Planning Authority (in consultation with National Highways)".

**The County Council** - "as the Local Highways Authority, is currently objecting to planning applications ...... further information or points of clarification required by the applicant, which can be reviewed by OCC."

There has been a significant victory. An additional listed building application

to move ancient listed boundary stones in the former Oxford Preservation Trust field between Lower Farm and Wick Farm was objected to by Historic England. This is thanks to Mark of Headington Heritage, who carried out extensive research on the boundary stones to get them listed, to show that they had not been moved and their position is of historical significance. This means that Christ Church and their development partners will have to move their



proposed bus road through this field. Please do look at the Headington Heritage website - www.headingtonheritage.org.uk.

There is no news about timing on when the LnBB applications will go to the SODC Planning Committee or how it will be divided up so it can be considered and we can comment.

Beckley and Stowood have developed a Neighbourhood Plan which contains mitigation policies to help address some of our concerns about LnBB. SODC and the Examiner wish to delete all our mitigation policies, probably due to fears of litigation. They may carry out a further public consultation on this. If this happens, we would be very grateful for your support and we will circulate details.

# **Elegant Egrets** by Lyn Ebbs

Oxford's network of rivers, canals and streams, plus nature reserves like RSPB Otmoor, give us plenty of opportunities to study members of the heron family. Three attractive white heron species are providing us with good views on Otmoor at the moment. In increasing order of size, they are Cattle Egret, Little Egret and Great Egret. In 1997, when the reserve was created, Little Egrets were rare in Oxfordshire, while both Cattle and Great Egrets were regarded as rarities throughout Britain. Now all three occur regularly on Otmoor and other parts of the county. Though none of them have yet bred on the reserve, Cattle and Little Egrets have bred on the island in Blenheim Lake.

It's not just the size difference that distinguishes them, they all have other easily recognisable features and different feeding techniques.

Cattle egrets, as the name suggests, like being with large grazing animals, so that they can grab the insects that their hooves disturb. Their plumage colour varies with age and the season but at this time of year, adults still have the orange-yellow head and chest plumes of the breeding season. They have yellow-buff legs and a yellow beak. Juveniles are all white, but the bill colour and their stocky build distinguishes them



their more elegant cousins. Their arrival was very recent; there was a big influx of them into the UK in the winter of 2007-8 after which a pair bred for the first time in Somerset. In 2021, a first for Oxford, three nests were seen at Blenheim fledging at least 10 juveniles.

The Little Egret is all white throughout the year, also having attractive white plumes on crest, back and chest. But it has a black bill, black legs



and yellow feet, used to flush prey when feeding in shallow water. Until the 1980s the Little Egret was a very scarce migrant to Britain. It appeared in significant numbers in 1989 and first bred in Dorset in 1996. Its UK colonization followed on from range expansion across northern and western France in previous decades. By 2001 the number of breeding

pairs had passed 100 and in 2015 it passed 1,000 pairs for the first time. They've bred in Oxfordshire in previous years and, while they haven't bred there yet, are seen in varying numbers, up to 20 plus, on Otmoor.

As the name suggests, the Great Egret is the largest of these three species.

They can look similar to Little Egrets, but they are the same size as the familiar grey heron. Other notable features include black feet, yellow beak and a different fishing technique. Herons' necks have a permanent kink, the result of an elongated vertebra (the sixth from the skull), which attaches to its neighbours at a right angle



instead of end-to-end. The kink forms a kind of hinge mechanism, enabling the bird to lunge forward at lightning speed and with astonishing precision. The shock of impact is absorbed by ligaments between the vertebrae.

You can find them over the summer months at Otmoor, usually just in ones and twos, but five were seen there at one time this year.

The elegant feathers of their breeding plumage almost proved the egrets' downfall. The fashion for extravagant styles of hat drove a trade in feathers. Between 1870 and 1920, bird skins were imported to Britain by the ton for the plumage trade. At its Edwardian peak, the trade was worth some £20



million a year (around £200 million in today's money). Thousands of bird species around the world were being hunted to extinction for the millinery trade, including the Great and Little Egret.

Emily Williamson bravely called out the insatiable slaughter of birds for millinery. She pushed back against the relentless tide of fashion. Together with Eliza Phillips and Etta Lemon, she grew her fledgling Society for the Protection of Birds to become, eventually, the UK's biggest conservation charity: the RSPB.

#### Voyages of Discovery - my work behind the Iron Curtain

[Editor's Note: "There are plenty of well-travelled people in the Four Parishes with interesting stories to tell, so we thought it might be interesting to explore some of these. Here is our introductory article from Stanton St John resident, Karen Draisey."]

In the late 1970's, soon after leaving drama school, I was offered an acting role in an English language teaching series for East German television. I played Jenny, opposite an actor who played Dave, in a series of episodes that was shown in East German schools 8 times a week for the next 10 years and was intended to give the students a taste of what life in the UK was like. The first foreign language they learned in school was Russian and English must have been something of an academic exercise. In our TV series Jenny and Dave travelled around the UK, filming on location in England and Wales. Thus audiences saw, for example, the beauty of

the Welsh countryside juxtaposed with the plight of coal mining communities. They joined Jenny and Dave on a sightseeing tour of London that took in the sights and then ended up at Karl Marx's tomb in Highgate cemetery. This was the means whereby an entire generation of East Germans learnt English with no opportunity to see for

themselves how reality matched up to what they were watching - until 1989 and the fall of the Berlin Wall. After that they could travel, see the West for themselves and put into practice what the series had taught them. I had many memorable encounters, and still do, with East German viewers who were forced to watch Jenny and Dave every week in school and are able to reference the episodes. Nearly everyone finds it hilarious to remember us paying homage at Marx's tomb!

The television company (known as DEFA) was dissolved after German reunification in 1992, but the time I spent working there was the start of a journey that has taken me back to Berlin repeatedly. In 1978 I found it hard to disabuse people in East Germany of the ideas they had about what life was like in the West, just as we in the West only knew of the oppressive aspects of the communist regime and nothing at all about how people went about their daily lives. In East Germany, for example, there

was no unemployment, the elderly and the young were very well looked after, homosexuality was not illegal, and women had a much greater significance in the workplace than was the case here.

On a trip to Berlin in 2011, I visited the Stasi offices and had the existence of my Stasi file confirmed. Copies of internal documents in which I was

named were sent to me from Berlin with the promise to let me know if more information turned up in the future. I feel strangely relieved that nothing more has been found. Most likely my file was among those that ended up in the shredder in the weeks after the Wall came down. I prefer to keep memories of friendships intact and I don't

feel the need to know who was reporting on me. I do, however, enjoy dining out on the fact that I was an actor working behind the Iron Curtain in the 1970's and have a Stasi file to prove it!

I visited Berlin again this year and met with the DEFA archivist, Mirko Wiermann. I was keen to find out what happened to the TV studios and to my colleagues after reunification. Mirko was an East German in his teens when the Wall came down. He spoke of the way in which, during the 40 years of the GDR, propaganda had worked both ways. Like most people he thought that German reunification was a good thing. But he also observed that the country he had grown up in was not one where people lived their lives in black and white. Yes there were privations, but people laughed and played, went to work and studied, had parties and looked out for each other. People in East Germany lost their jobs as industries and institutions were taken over by West German companies and authorities. Many felt that their lives were rendered insignificant by these changes whilst they were considered fortunate to have been saved from living under an oppressive regime. The latter was true, he freely admitted. But their status within the new Germany was now that of second class citizens. The country that they had grown up and lived in had disappeared.

My interest in the changes that have taken place in Europe over the past century remains strong. Now that I am 'retired' I find myself drawn back to Berlin, the city which holds endless fascination for me, and aim to continue my voyage of discovery!

# A day in the life of a local beekeeper by Maria Keenan

September is generally the time to test and treat your hives for varroa



varoa mite

mites. The varroa is a tiny mite the size of a pin head that breeds in cells of larvae and deforms their growth. So we have to get this under control if you are to have a colony that can survive the winter. You can treat varroa with a variety of methods, vaping with oxalic acid, Apilife Var tablets which are placed into the hive and removed after a certain time, oxalic dribble

(using a syringe to drip solution into the hive), or Apiguard - a tray of gel which the bees transport all over the hive.

By now the beekeeper will have taken off the summer honey crop leaving enough for the winter bees. Alternatively, you can now feed the colony approx 15kg of syrup so that they have enough stores going into winter.

The queen will start laying the winter bees which will live longer than the spring/summer bees whose lifespan is only about 6 weeks. Winter bees can live for around 4-5 months, long enough to sustain the colony and get them through the winter months.

In September the queen may stop laying for a few weeks. This is known as a brood break. You may be fooled into thinking that your hive is queenless especially if you can't find her! So now is not the time to be hasty. There may be a few drone bees left in the colony which will soon be booted out of the hive as their use has expired and they will be depleting the honey stores.

Some beekeepers chose to requeen at this time of year so that the colony can go into winter with a new, young queen. Occasionally the bees will also decide to supercede the existing queen if she is old or not a very good layer.

During the next few months the queen will slowly decline her egg laying until it is almost non existent in Dec/Jan compared to the 1000's that she may lay at the peak of Spring/Summertime.

It is during these months that the beekeeper must check that the colony has enough stores to get them through the cold, wet spell. The hive may have a 'super' (storage box) of honey above or below the 'brood box' but if the colony is small and weak then they may not be able to reach those stores and will starve and die.

September and October can also be a time to unite colonies if they are weak and low in numbers. This is done by simply laying a sheet or two of newspaper across the brood box and placing the other colony's brood box over the top. Make a few tiny pin pricks into the newspaper to allow pheromones to transfer across. Don't forget to remove the queen that you don't want from one of the colonies. After all, you can only have one queen!

Autumn/Winter is a good time for the beekeeper to check stocks of items and re-order and make up frames, wax foundation and jars, not to mention cleaning up equipment. Apart from a blast of oxalic acid in Dec/Jan to kill any varroa, that is all we need to do with the colony. You can also check that they have enough stores by hefting the hive and, if needed, add some fondant on top of the crown board. There's no need to inspect during this time as you may do more harm than good. They should be left alone now until the spring when it all starts again......

#### The Wider Rookery:

#### **Ground Management for Development**

[Editor's Note: "In February 2021 we published a gently satirical account by Malcolm Leeding of the imaginary proceedings of a "parliament" of rooks. Malcolm has recently retired as a Parish Councillor after many



years of service and we thought we would publish this extact from a follow-up article he sent us. His original story can be found at <a href="https://www.fourparishes.org.uk/magazine.">https://www.fourparishes.org.uk/magazine."</a>]

**1.** Having established, in an earlier report, a basis for action in matters of nest allocation, the Senior Rooks Working Party thought that this was an opportunity to clarify some guidance on other issues which could arise from time to time.

#### 2. Feeding Areas

Creation of graded feeding areas for various age groups, extending the principles of the nest case. Factors to be taken into account:

(a) Ease of access from normal flight paths viz amount of vegetation,

size of trees;

- (b How many areas would need to be provided to enable pecking in comfort, with not too many rules which work against community feeling.
- (c) How to ensure that not all of the best food ends up in the area of those birds with high-profile, assertive, large beak sizes. This would probably need a separate Pecking Party and take some time.
- (d) How to discourage other groups or species from "dropping in". This was a problem for all species, and an element of pressure would be needed. What levels would be appropriate?
- (e) Older rooks would recite tales of yore when they had seen off, for instance, jackdaws, who had a reputation for cleptocracy. They did not give details of their methods, but they are, of course, the larger species!

#### 3. Cawing Practice

This was a vital part of the general pattern of life, and all rooks were expected to have the skill. However, there needed to be protocols:

- (a) General silence in hours of darkness, apart from emergencies.
- (b) Some regard to seniority do not "caw" across a senior rook.
- (c) Any choir practice to be held on the edges of the rookery.

# 4. Protection against Intruders, especially against ambitious hawks, ravens, egg collectors (rare)

All proposals to be approved by the appropriate Working Party.

#### 5. Rearing of Young Rooks

The rookery expects parents to exercise reasonable control of the young, discouraging any ideas of "borrowing" sticks from other nests.

#### 6. Visits to Other Rookeries

These are encouraged, especially to learn about other working practices, but not necessarily adopt them.

#### 7. Implementation of these Rules

Any issues arising (as with the recent matter of nest allocation) are to be determined by the Council of Senior Rooks.

Shelley Edwards, Senior Community Engagement Officer for Oxfordshire County Council's trading standards team, explains "If the condition of a blanket is allowed to deteriorate there is the possibility it could become faulty, risking injury and fire. We want to ensure that electric blankets are still safe for use. So, come along and encourage any elderly neighbours to attend too. It is better to be safe than sorry. The tests are free, as are the refreshments but remember to pre-book!"

Testing electric blankets has taken place in Oxfordshire for over 20 years. The failure rate is still around 30 per cent, emphasising the importance of regular checking.

# RSPB planning application - Otmoor Farm

Cherwell District Council has approved the application from the RSPB to develop Otmoor Farm, despite the many concerns raised within the village and presentations at the Planning Committee in Banbury by Parish and District Councillors.

RSPB again gave assurances that this will not become a visitor centre. They have also stated that: "they take the safety of 'Rights of Way' (ROW) users seriously, and will instruct staff to drive slowly and give way to ROW users. Where additional space is required, there are passing places (gateways) which can be used. This is the RSPB Otmoor team's current approach and will be continued. The approach will also be used to inform the Construction Traffic Management Plan to instruct construction workers. The site manager has encouraged the Horton-cum-Studley Parish Council, and others in the village, to share details of any incidents so that he can deal with any problems."

The Parish Council has proposed an extension to the 20-mph speed limit, and the RSPB support this. We will share details of the construction plan and any other relevant matter as these become known.



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
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
