A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



I absolutely love how we can often get a huge amount of joy by simply watching others having fun, enjoying themselves, learning new skills and being with each other. Today saw us have the first Children's Craft Workshop of the autumn in Beckley Church. It was an absolute delight to welcome 11 children aged 4-10 from Beckley School into the Church, along with parents and grandparents, to look at the theme of

harvest – obviously very topical as we are celebrating harvest in each of our churches in the Four Parishes over September and October. Fabulous Lay Minister Betty Dye had once again come up with a story and activity to share with the youngsters, to hopefully grab their interest and give them something fun to do. It was wonderful watching on as they learnt to make a bread dough – although some knew quite a bit about it already – and then make a savoury and a sweet roll.

It was wonderful watching on as the older children helped the younger ones; the younger ones gradually grew in confidence; the adults had fun chatting together and helping the children as they all worked together initially in making a batch of dough, and then individually as they crafted their rolls (I think they were perhaps called swirls as the dough was flattened and then rolled up once the 'tasty bits' had been put on top).

At times it was chaotic! It was a little messy – some parents were grateful for second sets of school uniform at home ready for the next day! The truth is the children were far better than the adults at being quiet when we were asked to be, so Betty could give the next bit of instruction.

It was great seeing three generations working together having fun and learning something new. It was great hearing some adults say they had never made bread, and also having a nine-year-old professionally demonstrate kneading the dough, without being shown how first.

Younger siblings watched on attentively. Conversations flowed. Tea, coffee, and squash were drunk, and biscuits munched. By the end, each child had two swirls to take home to bake, and we look forward to hearing how tasty they were when eaten.

One of the volunteer helpers declared at the end that she had not had so much fun in a very long time. That was wonderful to hear — it is so true that we can get enormous joy from the most unlikely place — helping out with a group might not be where we expect to get great enjoyment — and yet, as we help others, we can so often get great pleasure too.

This is a delight of doing things in community, across generations. They may be activities outside our comfort zones, but working as a team, we can lean on the strengths of each other.

There was peace and harmony, joy and laughter, and a sense of achievement as the youngsters went home with their swirls to bake.

Would it not be wonderful if this were a model for how the world is – generations working together towards a collective common goal which does no-one else harm, having fun and enjoyment whilst doing it. I am writing this the day before the International Day of Peace 2023 – the 42nd such day (if I have got my maths right). It is with sadness that I reflect that this day is needed, but it feels more necessary now than perhaps at any other time in my lifetime – a reminder that there is not peace in the world.

We continue our prayers for peace in the Four Parishes – in our weekly Morning and Evening Prayers, as well as the twice weekly Prayers for Peace. Do come and join us if you can. And if the Children's Craft Workshop sounds like fun, do bring your children along in November and December if you can.

Please do get in touch if life is hard and you need someone to talk to. Take great care and God bless you and your loved ones.

Acting the Bible

What's in a name? This is an interesting question and might well depend on what the 'name' is for. I recently had the delight of meeting my new great nephew who was then just a few days old. His middle name is my Father's name. I have not discussed this with my nephew, whose son it is, but he had a very special and close relationship with my Father, his Grandfather, so his name is being handed down in honour and memory of him.

When thinking about groups, the name is often used to describe 'what they do'. For this reason, the 'Open the Book' team, is changing its name to 'Acting the Bible', to more readily 'explain' through its name, what they do.

The team take stories fresh from the pages of the Bible, and make them into mini dramas, to be acted out by themselves, together with Beckley schoolchildren. Through this, it is hoped that the Bible stories are brought alive, and remembered by the children, especially as they too are involved in the acting.

Do wasps deserve their bad image? by Lyn Ebbs

If you have ripe fruit in your garden or went out for a cream tea in the warm September weather, you might have been unhappy about the fact that wasps wanted to share these treats with you. We have been in meteorological autumn for a month now, regardless of what the thermometer has said recently, and wasp nests are actually closing down; wasp colonies don't last the winter in our climate. You might see individual large wasps on warm days in autumn - they are recently mated queens looking for somewhere sheltered to hibernate.

Not all will survive the cold but those that do will set out to form new



colonies as the weather warms up in spring. By May, the queen will have built a small nest made from chewed up wood and saliva to create a paper-like material, in which to lay the eggs of the first workers. Initially she divides her time between feeding the larvae and nest building. Once the eggs have hatched

into sterile female workers, the colony will start to grow. The workers take over nest building and collecting food for the developing larvae.

Nest locations traditionally used natural cavities, but they also thrive in manmade structures such as sheds and lofts, another situation where they come into conflict with us. Though the mated queen may survive for up to a year, most worker wasps will only live for a few weeks. Colonies only last one year and once the new queens depart, all the other wasps in the colony die.



With respect to their diets, wasps are a bit of a contradiction. Though the adults look fierce, they mostly feed on nectar but they are voracious predators, catching largely insect prey. These prey items include flies, aphids, caterpillars and other invertebrates.

But the worker wasps don't eat the prey they kill, they chop them up and carry parts back to the nest to feed to the larvae. The larvae produce a

sugary liquid that the adults consume and, as they are relatively short-lived, the adults don't need protein. While the nest is growing in the warmer months, and they are taking large amounts of insect material to



feed the young, their sugary reward is readily available. Later in the summer males and fertile females hatch. These mate, the females becoming next year's queens. By September, the nests are at maximum capacity, with lots of adults and few larvae. This is when wasps are most visible and, without their supply of

larval honeydew, they need to get their sugar fix elsewhere. Nectar is one natural source, along with overripe fruit, but jam scones or fizzy drinks are also an easy target.

If wasps have a scary reputation, their larger cousins, hornets, seem even more formidable. They have similar warning colouration but instead being yellow and black, they are chestnut-brown and yellow. But hornets' fearsome reputation is unwarranted, they will only sting humans if attacked.

Like common wasps, they are social insects with a similar life cycle. Both adults and larvae eat mainly insects, adults also take spiders. The queens may supplement their diet with tree sap (as they are doing in this picture) and windfall fruit. They also stock up on nectar before hibernating.

The fearsome-looking hornet may not be a well-loved insect, but it is

actually much less aggressive than the common wasp. It is also an important pollinator and a predator of species that feed on plants and crops. Each summer, social wasps in the UK capture an estimated 14 million kilogrammes of insect prey such as caterpillars and greenfly. Perhaps we should be calling them gardener's friends instead of trains to such as trans them.



friends instead of trying to swat or trap them. Either way, by maintaining harmony in the ecosystem, they play a crucial role. We certainly would not be able to cope in a world without them.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES: Pens, pencils and sharpeners, crayons or felt pens, stamps & ink pad sets, writing pads or notebooks, solar calculators, colouring & picture books etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS: Toothbrush, bars of wrapped soap, comb or hairbrush, flannel etc.

OTHER ITEMS: Hat, gloves, scarf, sunglasses, cap, socks, T-shirt, flip-flops, hair accessories, jewellery set, watch, wind-up torch etc.

There will be drop off locations in all the parishes from 13-20 November and more information will be in next month's newsletter.



Horton-cum-Studley Parish Council News

Looking after our village environment is an important part of the role of the Parish Council. Residents are encouraged to report any concerns. Recently we have responded to several concerns including a report about hornets at the foot of the tree next to Jilly's Gate and another about overgrown hedges causing pathway obstruction, particularly roadside paths.

The hornets' nest was reported promptly to Oxfordshire County Council since it was at a public footpath. OCC has the responsibility (and resources) for dealing with this and we have followed up with them to expedite the issue. In the case of overgrown hedges, where these form the boundaries of residents' properties, we ask that the resident addresses the issue. In other cases where ownership is not clear, the Parish Council may act to get the obstruction removed.

Speeding vehicles continue to be a concern despite the introduction of the 20-mph speed limit. The Parish Council has invested in new Vehicle Approach Signs (VAS) with additional messages about the 20-mph limit, in an effort to deter drivers from excessive speeding. Unfortunately, the new signs are not expected until October, such is the demand for them with the county wide increase of rural villages with 20-mph limits.




