'Acting the Bible'

The Four Parishes 'Acting the Bible' team (previously known as 'Open the Book') has just completed a second term of leading collective worship (assembly) once a fortnight in Beckley School.

The team members take stories fresh from the pages of the Bible, and make them into mini dramas, to be acted out by themselves, together with Beckley schoolchildren. Through this, it is hoped that the Bible stories are brought alive, and remembered by the children, especially as they too are involved in the acting.

The team is led by Licensed Lay Reader Betty Dye, and consists of two members from Forest Hill and two from Beckley. They meet for an hour once a fortnight to write the script for the following week, with the aim of adhering as closely as possible to the original Bible texts. This often involves comparing different Bible translations and even reading the New Testament in the original Greek! The challenge is always to find a way of presenting the story that will engage several different age groups at the same time, and discussions during the meetings are often very lively!

On the morning of the school assembly, the 'Acting the Bible' team arrives in the school hall at 8.30am with the final version of the script, together with costumes and specially made props provided by Betty, or occasionally by other members of the team. The school usually sends out a reminder to parents earlier in the week to invite some of the older children to join in the drama and they start to arrive one by one as the rehearsal progresses! There is usually just enough time to run through the script twice before all the rest of the school arrives to watch. The children who volunteer to take part in the drama have to read the script and work out what they need to do in an amazingly short time and we are constantly amazed by how quickly they pick up the story and start acting it out.

The 'Acting the Bible' team also creates scripts for the Children's Church at St Nicolas, Forest Hill (1st Sunday of the month. 4-4.30pm) and Messy Church at Stanton St John Village Hall (2nd Sunday of the month, 4-5pm). 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Dame Elizabeth Holford's Charity News of Recent Bursaries

The Trustees have invited some of the young people who have received bursaries from the Charity to write a paragraph for inclusion in this magazine.

This month we have two reports, both from people who live in Forest Hill.

"Back in April 2019, the Holford Trust gave me a grant which enabled me to attend a rowing camp in France. I spent a week there, over the school Easter holidays. We rowed for many hours a day, did yoga in the mornings, raced against each other, rowed at sunrise and sunset, and had a lot of fun!

The intensity of the course meant we all greatly improved our rowing skills.

Not only did the trip improve my rowing, it also allowed me to embrace my love for sport, build on my relationships with my crew mates, and further develop my independence and my confidence. It was the first overseas trip I had been on without my parents. When I was younger, I struggled a lot with the anxiety of being away from my parents. Even sleepovers at other peoples houses were a struggle when I was very young. I slowly built up the confidence to go on this rowing trip. It has really stuck with me since then and now I love adventures



with friends. I'm currently on a gap year and in a year I'll have visited 16 countries all around the world, all without my parents!

Although I don't row anymore, I still carry with me many life skills that rowing taught me. Organisation, resilience, determination and most of all, confidence.

The Holford Trust gave me the opportunity to experience such an incredible week. Due to the generosity of the trust, I was able to do something that has hugely impacted my life in so many ways."

"Hi, I'm Annabel and I have been playing piano since I was 6 and I really enjoy it. So my mum could pay for piano lessons the Holford Trust kindly donated money every year for about 5 years. This helps with stuff like books, exams, and concerts which I need regularly to progress my music skills. I am now at Grade 6 which is equivalent to music GCSE.

My piano teacher lives in Wheatley so I can walk to hers after school which is super convenient (except when it rains!). Mostly I play classical but I also enjoy playing other Genres like pop, rock and hip hop. At my school I play in a band with my friends, it's so much fun to be part of a musical environment at School as well as at my lessons. I listen to music a lot as well as playing, one of my favourites is Taylor Swift. Wagtails by Lyn Ebbs

My guess is that you won't have any problem working out the key feature of the wagtail family. I'm going to tell you a bit more on the three species that breed in Britain, where and when you might be able to see them locally, and some of the theories of why they wag their tails. They belong to a genus of elegant small birds that are rarely motionless. When perched their stance is almost horizontal to counter-balance their long tails. They don't hop or walk, they run in short dashes and their flight is characteristically bouncy, accompanied by chirruping calls.



Of our three native species the commonest and most familiar is the Pied Wagtail. It's particularly easy to spot in winter as they often form roosts in town centre trees. I frequently see them on the roof of the church and other buildings in Stanton St John at any time of the year. They have a white face

with a black bib and crown. The undersides are white, and the back and sides dark grey. Young birds sometimes cause confusion in identification as the black areas are greyer and the white areas yellowish cream. It likes wetlands but is adaptable to a broad range of habitats and is happy to take advantage of human association. Like robins they can be found nesting in some odd locations (usually at ground level) like old tyres or abandoned agricultural machinery.

The Grey Wagtail was previously associated more with upland streams but is now widespread in the south of England. It still has a liking for fast-flowing water but is happy with man-made structures such as weirs and mill streams. It has the longest tail of our three species and is a particularly slim, lithe bird. It's not a full migrant but will move to



lower altitudes and latitudes in the winter, so you may have more chance of seeing them in winter or while on the move in spring and autumn. And I have seen them with young on the River Thame at nearby Waterstock Mill, so they are local breeders. The word 'grey' doesn't do them justice as the eye-catching colour in their plumage is the bright yellow rump and chest.



The Yellow Wagtail, however, is unapologetically yellow, softening to olive green on the back. With the shortest tail of the three, it also wags it the least. It is a true summer migrant so is more noticeable on passage, feeding at the feet of grazing livestock. This is when and where you can find them on Otmoor. They nest on the

ground in clumps of grass, further away from human contact than their cousins. It's a bird of wet meadows and damp pastures so a combination of habitat loss and the perils of migration means that it is now listed 'red' among birds of conservation concern.

All three are insectivorous, darting to pick up prey, or fly-catching, taking insects in the air. Yellow Wagtails will also take blood sucking insects from the backs of their cattle companions, while Grey Wagtails will wade into shallow water to take insects and even small tadpoles.

So back to the question, why do wagtails wag their tails? There is a totally

different Australian bird with a similar name, the Willie Wagtail, which belongs to a family called fantails, and which wags its tail from side-to-side. Close observation at different light levels and times of day has shown that this is a feeding strategy that helps to flush out insects. But ours wag their tails even



when preening, so a feeding technique seems unlikely. Also, a mating signal can be ruled out as males, females and juveniles all wag. A third theory is it's a signal to potential predators: "I'm alert, you can't catch me!" Next time you watch a wagtail, see if the wagging rate increases as you get nearer and you could have the answer.

Our Biennial Beckley Open Day (often called Beckley Open Gardens), organised by the Parochial Church Council to raise funds for the fabric of our ancient church, will take place this year on Sunday 23 June.

For those new to the village, it's a lovely event that brings us all together. A number of people – the more the merrier – open their gardens for visitors, and this is the main attraction. There are teas in the school hall, a plant stall, a cake stall, home-made ice creams, an art show in the church, and a raffle. Last time we also had some marvellous buskers. We advertise it widely, and some people come back every time, sometimes from quite a distance.

This all requires a lot of organisation and helpers. Nearer the time we shall need plants for the plant stall and on the day, cakes for the cake stall and teas. We also need raffle prizes with a few substantial top prizes (perhaps something like a garden token or a bottle of champagne).

Marion Weinstein 1935 - 2024

Marion Weinstein, who died at the age of 89 on 18 January 2024, lived 40



years of her long and interesting life in Beckley, and contributed hugely to it. She was loved for the twinkle in her eye and her slightly wicked sense of humour.

Marion was born in 1935 in Lisbon, Portugal, because her father was working in British Intelligence, where he was setting up lines of communication in a neutral country in the event

of war. When war broke out in 1939, Marion moved to Brussels where she was in the care of a French governess. When she arrived in London without the governess, age 5 or 6, she remembers having little or NO English!

In her own words (taken from her account in a Newsletter of the 90's), her childhood in London was frightening at times: "It was noisy at night: air raids, bombs, ack-ack guns going off in the Park. During the day we picked up shrapnel, sailed boats in the Round Pond and fed the ducks under the shadow of a large barrage balloon. But we lost our home in Kensington to a doodle-bug bomb one lunch time, and my father was caught by another walking back from work ten days later and he died."

Marion's spinal injury, which became more pronounced with old age, was caused by that lunch-time doodle bug, when she had sheltered under a table beneath a doorway, which nevertheless did not withstand the weight of the masonry of the collapsing house.

Her widowed mother went to work as a civil servant in Holborn and Marion seems to have been left to her own devices as a 9 year-old, in charge of doing the shopping if she could find food, and playing with other feral children in the parks and streets, visiting museums and galleries too. Having from a young age navigated her way around her neighbourhood, striking up her own friendships with children and grown-ups without adult supervision, and making her own happiness, perhaps accounts for Marion's straight-talking communication and open nature.

To go back to her account, "Schooling was on and off. I was 12 before going regularly. Teaching infants or nursing was the choice offered to me at 16. I did help in a junior school but chose nursing. I trained at the

Whittington Hospital. We had many chronically ill patients: ex-service men and women, and the civilian population which had lack of care and little health education. The assumption was that in a few years the newly founded NHS would eradicate many of these problems. A lot has been achieved over the past 50 years or so, yet it seems to have taken a long time...."

After working in Edinburgh and Galashiels, Marion moved to Oxford for a Staff Nurse job at 24 as a fully qualified Midwife. While she was travelling on a train with her mother, she met Bill. They all chatted briefly – and as she and her mother left the train, Bill felt a little piece of paper pushed into his hands. It was Marion's phone number – and the rest is history!

Until Marion met Bill, she had never known real stability in a home life or had unconditional love, and the security he gave her made it possible for her to be anchored for her subsequent activities and activism.

Marion was an activist and fundraiser. Midwifery had led her to campaign for better housing and housing rights, working for the charity Shelter and then doing casework at the Housing Aid Centre in Oxford. She also fundraised with Oxfam for 25 years, campaigned with the National Council of Women, and worked with the Red Cross as a 'good companion'. With the WI there were many fundraising campaigns too including for the installation of benches that you can still see in Beckley today.

Aptly at Marion's funeral on 22 February, the family asked for donations for benches for the playing fields at Beckley Village School where Marion hugely enjoyed her involvement and clearly was valued and respected as her School Governorship kept on being extended.

Marion appreciated the joy you get from small things in daily life, magnified after her difficult early years. Her warmth was punctuated by her humour and keen sense of mischief!

Above all she valued loving friendships with her friends and neighbours. As she wrote in the Newsletter after ten years or so here: "Beckley is basically a friendly community, in spite of the busy lives led by most who live here. Neighbourliness is important and it would be sad if this were lost".

Horton-cum-Studley Parish Council News

The village spring clean will take place over the week-end of 20-21 April, later than normal to avoid the Easter holiday period. This is a great opportunity to help maintain our lovely village by giving a little of your time at any time over that week-end. This year, bags, Hi-Viz jackets, gloves and litter picks will be available from the porch at St Barnabas Church to give greater visibility to and safer access for residents. Filled bags should be returned and will be collected by Cherwell District Council from the church.

The Parish Council met with OCC and SSE in February to discuss how best to minimise the effect on our community of a proposed road closure to install a new electricity supply to The Brambles in Church Lane. With the involvement of some local residents, it was agreed that the 'road closure' part of the work, involving excavating a trench across the road, would take place overnight on two consecutive nights, although SSE expected to be in Church Lane for up to 5 days. It was also agreed that access would continue although there could be delays if vehicles needed to cross (via steel plates) the trench work.

In our efforts to support the 20mph speed limit in the village, we have been changing the 'vehicle approach speed' (VAS) signs, with the support of the various suppliers of these. One has taken much longer to change as it required a special permit from Oxfordshire County Council to use certain machinery at the roadside. The changeover is currently planned for mid-April.

Parish Council meetings, open to all in the village, are normally held on the second Thursday of the month, the next meeting being on Thursday 11 April, 7.30pm in the Millennium Village Hall.
