A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



As is quite usual, I 'wrote' my letter in my head as I walked Bertie around our beautiful countryside during Holy Week. I didn't want to put fingertips to keyboard until after I and we had experienced the Easter weekend, as so much happens over that period and it is such an important and profound time in the Christian calendar.

As I walked around, I marvelled at the 'next batch'

of flowers and shrubs that were coming into fresh life and colour for this season of their lives. Amongst the beauty, I marvelled at the bank of white in the hedgerows - see more on this in Lyn Ebbs' wonderful article on pages 12-13, and the fritillarias which seemed to me to be very early – it was interesting to have my thoughts on this confirmed by the Horton-



cum-Studley Gardening Club comment (see page 27). I noted the hue of the blue of the bluebells coming into flower in the woodlands, but didn't yet sense the beautiful aroma of them. As ever the gorgeous flowers and smell of the gorse brought back fond memories of my childhood.

Despite my forward thinking and planning, my initial thoughts for this letter have been completely overshadowed by the news of the death of Pope Francis. Whether we might be people of faith or not, Catholic or not, I would have thought that in him we might all have seen a man of great humility, of service, of love and care for the marginalised; and a man who was not scared of speaking truth to power. A man indeed of great faith, and an example to us all.

As one person said to me "He has reminded us of the best of men": another said "Would that our world had more leaders, and citizens, with such peace of heart, mind and spirit. Long may his legacy continue", and another said "...a truly great man. A truly massive loss not just for our Catholic friends and Catholic people in the world but a massive loss for every good individual around the world".

It seemed so appropriate that Pope Francis died on Easter Monday, having

just celebrated his final Easter here with us. How incredible that just hours before his death, he once more, and for one last time, gave his Easter blessing to the crowds gathered in St Peter's Square. Despite his obvious frailty, and against doctors' orders, as I imagine he would have felt it his duty to do, he faithfully served his God and his people one last time.

Whilst especially thinking of Catholic friends across the Four Parishes and far beyond, I believe we have all lost a great man, and the world is a poorer place for it. May I offer my prayers, as the Catholic Church looks to appoint the next Pope, interestingly at the same time as the Church of England continues its process to find a successor to Archbishop Justin Welby. Looking at the attributes of Pope Francis might be a good model for both!

Before moving away from Easter, I would like to give my huge thanks to

all who did so much across the Four Parishes to help us journey through the Easter story once more. This may have been through decorating our churches, taking part in a concert, the Passion Play or other activities, providing music, leading services or being

part of them, coming to services and activities, providing and serving refreshments, cleaning, making the churchyards look neat and tidy, hiding easter eggs, and on I can go. Thank you so much everyone. I have once more loved taking this journey with you, and hope that in the many and various different ways, you too have enjoyed the journey.

Commemorating the 80th anniversary of VE (Victory in Europe) Day

8 May 1945 is known as Victory in Europe Day, commemorating the formal acceptance by the World War II Allies of Germany's unconditional surrender of its armed forces. 8 May 2025 marks the 80th anniversary.

In many conversations I have been having across the Four Parishes in more recent times, there seems a sense of concern that the peace – and light – that came to Europe on 8 May 1945 is under threat again in ways that we have not seen in 80 years.

Beckley Church is offering an opportunity to everyone in the Four Parishes, of all faiths and none, to visit the Church any time from 4-11pm on Thursday 8 May, for a personal time of quiet and reflection, and to light a candle for peace, if helpful. For more information, please see page 17.

Prayers for Peace

As the situation in the Holy Land and the Middle East continues to move further and further away from the tentative peace of the now crumpled ceasefire, with discussions for peace in Ukraine seemingly making little progress, and continuing news of unrest in Yemen and Sudan, it is clear that God's peace is not present throughout the world, so we continue to pray for peace. 

A Thorny Subject by Lyn Ebbs

You probably know the old saying: "Ne'er cast a clout till May be out". Rather than advising waiting until the month of May is over before shedding extra layers of clothes, it is really referring to the flowering of May (Hawthorn). Having seen hedgerows in full bloom in mid-April, you might already have been tempted to cast some clouts – some days were



certainly warm enough. But that would have been too hasty: that hedgerow blossom belongs to the Blackthorn – Prunus spinosa. Though superficially similar to Hawthorn (they both belong to the rose family), there is one obvious difference; Blackthorn blooms before its leaves emerge, while Hawthorn's leaves and flowers come out at the same time.

Another difference, if you look more closely, is that Blackthorn flowers are almost pure white, whereas May blossom has a hint of pink. The stamens are strongly tipped with pink, and some trees actually have pink flowers. (The deep pink version is often sold as an ornamental tree.) Although it is

pretty, and was used in Maytime festivities, there was a superstition that it was unlucky to bring May blossom into the house, as death or illness would follow. It has been shown in recent years that trimethylamine, which is formed when animal tissues decay, is given off by freshly gathered Hawthorn flowers. As it was once much more



common that people died in their own homes, and their bodies were buried from there, too, a flower with a scent reminiscent of death would certainly not have been welcome.

The reason we see so much Hawthorn in hedgerows is as a direct result of the evolution of farming methods from open to enclosed fields. At first these were just informal boundaries, but then the Enclosure Act of 1773 required the owners of land to physically enclose it. Hedging plants could be dug up from woods but, as an alternative name for Hawthorn suggests, Quickthorn was easily grown in nurseries and would soon develop into straight-line impenetrable hedges. Both Blackthorn and Hawthorn are good subjects for the maintenance technique of hedge-laying, but Hawthorn is not as inclined to put out suckers, so maintains a neater boundary.

The UK has two native species of May and both can be found in our local

hedges, Common Hawthorn (Cratagus monogyna) and Midland Hawthorn (Cratagus laevigata), though they do also hybridise. Hawthorns are hermaphrodite, meaning both male and female reproductive parts are contained within each flower. The May flowers merit close examination



because of this. The male parts (stamens) are similar in both species. The difference lies in the female parts, and the clue is in the name. C monogyna flowers each have a single stigma and go on to produce fruits containing



a single seed. C laevigata has two stigmas and its fruits contain two seeds. If you don't have a lens, it becomes much easier in autumn, as you can more easily see the bigger, elongated haws of Midland Hawthorn and squash them to reveal two seeds inside.

There are other differences between them; 'laevigata' means smooth and the leaves of Midland Hawthorn are not as downy or as deeply lobed as those of Common Hawthorn.

Both species of Hawthorn, and Blackthorn provide valuable resources for wildlife. Their dense thorny growth provides nesting places and shelter for small birds and mammals. Hawthorn fruit, haws, is important for birds, especially thrushes, in autumn and winter. Blackthorn fruit, sloes, is also a food source for birds and mammals.

Hawthorn's flowers and leaves are a good food source for insects. Blackthorn also provides food for over 100 insect species including Black and Brown Hairstreak butterflies and many moths including Lackey, Magpie and Swallowtail. Because it flowers so early in the year, it's a good source of nectar for solitary bees and other pollinators. Hedges don't just mark boundaries, they support wildlife.

Local Government Reorganisation - Update

In his letter of 16 December to two tier authorities (those with county and district councils) the Minister Jim McMahon asked for proposals for unitary authorities to make local government more efficient. In addition, there is a proposal for a higher level regional mayoral authority, in our case probably for the Thames Valley.

The Minister set out the criteria for new unitary authorities, the main ones being that they should have a population of 500,000+ and that the current district council boundaries should be used as building blocks.

Currently the county council is responsible for 85% of services, including transport management, highways maintenance, education, adult and children's social care, Special Education Needs and Disabilities (SEND) provision, libraries, museums and waste disposal. District councils are responsible for the other 15% including planning, waste collection, parking, council tax collection and elections.

There are currently 4 competing proposals on the table for unitary authorities for Oxfordshire:

- 1. A county-wide unitary authority (population 750,200).
- 2. 'Ridgeway' SODC and Vale with West Berks (population 462,767).
- **3.** 'North Oxfordshire' West Oxon and Cherwell and possibly Oxford (population without Oxford 285,600 with Oxford 450,800)
- 4. 'Greater Oxford' Oxford City Council and undefined surrounding rural parishes (population Oxford City 165,2000)

The county-wide unitary authority is the only one that meets the minister's population targets, and the County Council already delivers services across the county. For comparison, Bucks became a single tier authority on 1 April 2020.

The 'Ridgeway' and 'North Oxfordshire' proposals together would cover the whole county, but only if Oxford was willing to become part of 'North Oxfordshire'. SODC and Vale have no shared services with West Berks.

The City of Oxford has no shared services with SODC and Vale, and the proposal does not meet the criterion of using current district boundaries as building blocks. The 'Greater Oxford' proposal is also not compatible

with any of the others.

Kidlington Parish Council has also written a letter opposing becoming part of Greater Oxford, similar to the one which was reproduced on page 20 of the April Four Parishes Magazine. The response to this from the Ministry of Housing, Communities & Local Government was:

"It is for councils to develop robust and sustainable proposals that are in the best interests of their whole area. They should engage with residents and local MPs in working through options. Following submission of these proposals to government, we will consider proposals carefully before taking decisions on how to proceed."

There will be a consultation process for each proposal, although this is more likely to be informing us of their intentions than seeking our opinions. In the end the minister will decide, and it is questionable whether there will be any democracy involved.

There are also two main proposals for a Thames Valley mayoral authority, namely Bucks, Berks and Oxfordshire with or without Swindon. It would be sensible if the same boundaries were used as other supra-county authorities. The Police and Crime Commissioner for Thames Valley covers Bucks, Berks and Oxon. BOB ICS (Bucks, Oxon and West Berks NHS Integrated Care System) covers all of Bucks and Oxfordshire and West Berkshire – mainly Reading, Wokingham, Newbury and Thatcham. South Central Ambulance covers Berkshire, Buckinghamshire, Hampshire and Oxfordshire.

The Minister has asked for one proposal for each area for a single tier of local Government to be submitted by 28 November 2025.

Report from Sophie from Forest Hill about her experience volunteering in Cambodia, with help from Dame Elizabeth Holford's Charity

In November 2024, I had the incredible opportunity to volunteer at a



school in rural Cambodia, an experience made possible by the generous support of the Dame Elizabeth Holford's Charity. Over four weeks, I ran classes for children aged 4 to 16, helped organise playtime for the younger ones, and fully immersed myself in the daily life of the school.

Other than volunteering at the school we did trips to the local town and one particular day involved visiting the five poorest families in the rural village. We donated funds to the local food bank to provide essential supplies such as food, hygiene products, and clothing for them.

This experience was truly rewarding, and I am so grateful to Dame Elizabeth Holford's Charity for making it possible. It's an experience I will cherish forever.

The Charity grants educational bursaries for school aged children and young people up to the age of 25 who are or who have parents resident in Stanton St John, Forest Hill with Shotover, Beckley, Horton-cum-Studley and the ecclesiastical Parish of Elsfield. Applications are not means tested and funding is granted on a case-by-case basis.

Stanton St John Parish Council

The Parish Council met on 17 March in the Village Hall, with twelve residents in attendance. The meeting covered a range of issues affecting the village.

- **Concerns Over Tree Planting:** Residents raised concerns about new trees planted along Middle Road without local consultation. The Parish Council will follow up with relevant authorities to seek clarity.
- **Public Transport Access:** Changes to the 108 bus route, which now bypasses the Village Shop, were discussed. Elderly residents noted the increased difficulty of accessing the new stop on the B4027. The Council will write to Oxford City Council requesting a review of the route to restore access to the shop.
- **Cycleway and Green Infrastructure:** Questions were raised about the proposed Oxford Greenways Cycleway potentially passing through Shepherds Pit. Cllr Tim Bearder confirmed that no final decisions had been made and committed to keeping the Council informed.
- Local Litter Pick: A recent community litter pick was praised, with 25 volunteers collecting around 40 bags of rubbish. The Council will send a formal letter of thanks to the organiser.
- **Planning Matters:** Several planning applications and appeals were discussed, including a proposal to convert a barn at Breach Farm into residential dwellings and the ongoing Star Inn and Bayswater developments.
- **Governance and Policy:** The Council approved a number of governance documents and reviewed internal controls.

The next Parish Council meeting will take place on **Tuesday 22 April at 7pm**, followed by the **Annual Parish Meeting at 7.30pm**.


Oxfordshire Artweeks in Stanton St John

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
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The Otmoor Challenge, 31 May 2025
