#### A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



I do not recall weather quite like that which we have encountered this last week or so, despite vivid memories of storms over the years: those of October 1987, when Sevenoaks in Kent lost six of its seven famous oak trees; the flooding of Boscastle, Cornwall in 2004 when I was camping a few miles up the coast; and various other camping trips where we were either nearly washed, or blown, away!

First, we had Storm Dudley, then Storm Eunice and just as we were recovering, along came Storm Franklin! As is always the case with these things, some areas were affected more badly than others, and tragically both people and animals lost their lives.

I love watching wild seas - from a safe distance - not like mad people (in my view!) who stand right at the water's edge, putting themselves in danger of being washed into the sea by the huge breaking waves that come along. But I am not keen on strong winds. I do not like hearing or watching strong winds, as they are wild, powerful, and uncontrollable. We are fortunate in this country that hurricanes and tornadoes are phenomena we barely encounter.

Today I went for a walk along the River Severn at the tail end of Storm Franklin as the incoming tide raced up the river. I watched huge pieces of

fallen tree being pulled along by the current, and then be caught in an eddy, and begin floating back in the opposite direction - a marvel of nature. The water was muddy brown, and choppy. Later in the evening as I returned to the same spot, whilst the water was still muddy, it was calm and inviting, and had a sense of stillness about it - the contrast from earlier in the day was incredible. A walk up into the woods above the river showed signs of the winds that has passed through - fallen trees and debris from trees all over the path.



It was interesting that these storms happened around the Sunday where we heard Luke 8:22-25 read in our churches which is about Jesus and his disciples being caught in a storm on the Sea of Galilee. Jesus sleeps peacefully as the storm rages around them. Having been woken by his terrified disciples as they feared for their lives, Jesus calms the storm, then rebukes them asking 'where is your faith?' After all, he was with them, so what was the problem?

Our faith is often tested as storms rage around us, whether from the weather as we have just encountered, or storms of ill health, the loss of a loved one, a broken relationship, the loss of a job, financial worries, or anything else that knocks us off an even keel. It can be hard to trust Jesus is with us in the storm; in the boat with us, as we are being battered by the waves around us.

How might we strengthen our faith to help us through these storms? What might help us sense Jesus in the boat with us, calming the storm? By being in close relationship with him: by spending time in prayer and reading the Bible - sources of strength and encouragement.

Lent, which start on 2 March, would be a good time to put time aside to do this. Jesus promises to be with us, and to send us the Holy Spirit. When the storms of life threaten to drown us, we need to seek his presence, by spending time with him.

Please do get in touch if life is tough and you need someone to talk to. Take great care, keep safe and God bless you and your loved ones.

#### 'The tit family' by Lyn Ebbs

Spring has moved up a gear in the past few weeks; bird song is more evident, especially at the start of the day, as birds are able to take some time from feeding and turn their attention to attracting a mate and nest building. This month's article focuses on some related birds that you might have seen on your feeders and which are now planning to use your nest boxes: the tit family. They are similar in size and shape, and several have similar markings: dark greenish upper sides, pale yellowish undersides, white cheeks and dark caps.

The biggest, and easiest to distinguish by song, is the great tit. Its song is

easy to pick out at this time of year - it's written as *teacher-teacher* and is a repetitive, two-note squeaky call. Great tits tend to dominate bird feeders because of their size, and you can spot the dominant males by the broad, black stripe down the middle of their pale lemon fronts - the bigger and bolder the stripe the higher the status of the bird. The white cheek is very obvious, too, at one time giving them the name of ox-eyed tits.



The coal tit is a bit like a diminutive version of the great tit, both smaller



in size and more subdued in colouring. Its call is also very similar, but higher pitched and more rapid. The surest way to distinguish them from their larger cousins is by the white stripe at the back of the head. Coal tits rarely stay at the feeders to eat; they fly off with the seeds and return so rapidly it's clear that they have a cache

somewhere. It's a good strategy to avoid harassment by the larger tits when moving through gardens in mixed flocks. In fact, coal tits have been shown to remember where they had hidden food items for up to four weeks. In the wider landscape, coal tits prefer conifer rather than the deciduous woodland frequented by their blue and great cousins. You may also see them in churchyard yew trees and Leylandii hedges.

Similar in size to the coal tit, but much more colourful, is the blue tit: its back



is a dark, blue-green; its front pale yellow and its cap a subtle blue. To each other, the birds appear even more colourful. Like all birds, blue tits can see in four colours to our three, the extra one being ultra-violet (UV). The human-perceived blueness is just the tail of a peak of UVness that the blue tits see and by which they can tell the

sexes apart (males are brighter-coloured). It's likely that they use colour intensity as a way of selecting a mate, using it as an indicator of general health and fitness.

Though colour-wise a little bit subdued, one of my favourite garden visitors

during the cooler months is the marsh tit. It is light brown above and off-white below with a glossy black cap and a neat little black bib. It has a distinctive call, often described as a 'sneezing' pitchou. They also have a rattling, scolding call to warn of danger and are just smart little birds to have around. They favour natural nest holes over nest boxes, so we assume they head back to the nearby woods in the spring.



Last, smallest, but definitely not least is the long-tailed tit. It belongs in a



separate family to other tits but is closely related to them. It also ignores our nest boxes and builds exquisite little nests made of moss and lichens held together by cobwebs and lined with other birds' feathers. During the winter long-tails move around in family groups, separating into pairs in the spring. Their urgent high-pitched *tsee-tsee-*

tsee calls help to keep them all in contact as they flit through the hedgerows looking like a party of flying lollipops. Superficially they are black and white, but with a flush of brownish pink on the shoulders and flanks.

These closely-related small birds provide us with a lot of entertainment in return for a supply of food and some nesting opportunities. Then we have the fledglings to look forward to!

Prints are limited numbered signed editions on good art paper with colourfast inks unframed, size 12 ins x 16 ins. The cost is £30 each of which £15 will be donated to the funds of the relevant church.

The original paintings are for sale at a cost of £120, unframed, of which £50 is donated to the church.

#### 'Wandering Life Together' - a new anthology

Some of us in the Four Parishes have been recipients of Toddy's weekly Lockdown email 'Out & About', with poem collections to amuse and distract during the 2020 - 2021 Lockdown.

It contains thoughts, experiences and reflections, both spiritual and historical, as an ongoing journey which was shared with others when Covid had rendered the going as a rather muddy patch to cross!

The aim is to print a limited run of this collection and anyone interested is invited to subscribe beforehand to enable the cost to be calculated. Starting prices are £10 - £12 per copy + P&P. However if there is a preference for a more collectable hardback, it would be marginally more.

The book will include 140 poems and 20 illustrations over 200 pages.

JCVI advises the UK government on vaccine policy, including the current Covid-19 vaccination programme.

#### Candlemas, 30 January

The St Nicolas Candlemas Service marks the end of Christmas by celebrating the Presentation of Christ in the Temple at Jerusalem. It is normally a feast of music for choir and congregation alike but due to the continuing Covid situation, we decided on a candlelit service of Holy Communion with congregational hymns instead - a wonderful peaceful way to end the Christmas celebrations.

As many of you know, our much-loved village playground is in need of repair. The HCS Village Playground Committee is now developing a plan for necessary repairs and, if possible, adding to the range of play equipment. We were very grateful to all those who responded to our survey. It was clear that families value and appreciate the playground as it is but would appreciate additional spaces and equipment for older children. We are taking this as our brief going forwards.

We have sought advice from the Oxfordshire Playing Fields Association who suggest we may be able to repair key elements of the existing playground without wholesale replacement. We hope to organise a consultation event for children and young people, to hear first-hand what play equipment they would like, to narrow down the options.

Whatever we do, we will need some money to do it. There are grants available that we will be pursuing further, but many grant-givers expect communities to do their own fundraising too.

To support our fundraising efforts, we have registered the Horton-cum-Studley Millennium Village Hall charity as a charitable organisation on **AmazonSmile**. 


