A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



Hands up those who do not like the clocks changing. Do not worry - I am not about to seek support for a campaign against it! I must admit, that in the autumn, I like the extra hour we gain, but I am definitely not keen on the 'spring forward' and the loss of an hour. It takes my body quite a while to catch up - even though it is such a small change. It must be my age!!

I think the real reason I do not like the clocks changing

Advent challenge and beyond

I hope those of you still running with this project enjoyed the break last month! Having completed the New Testament I have been toying with what we do next - we obviously need to delve into the Old Testament now. I thought we might tackle the prophetic books. These are the books that prophets are traditionally attributed as the authors, rather than the only books where prophets are mentioned. There are 18 such books: the first six are known as the major prophets (simply based on their length); the next 12 are known as the minor prophets (as generally they are shorter books!) I thought we would start with reading Isaiah which is a lengthy 66 chapters, although it is not dense prose, so my hope is that two chapters a day during the week, and an extra one for each day at the weekend for three of the four weekends should help to see us through it in November. Happy reading! I look forward to hearing how you get on.

The preacher was the Reverend Mike Rayner, Professor of Population Health at Oxford University and a fellow Minister in Secular Employment with Hugh.

Derek Jewell on the organ ably accompanied the hymns, which were chosen by Hugh and Anne and included a hymn about God in our workplaces, "We seek your kingdom throughout every sphere" written in 2016 and sung to the tune of 'Abide with me'. Stop the Arc Group by David Rogers

STOP THE ARC GROUP

Between July and October, the Government ran a public consultation on the Oxford-Cambridge Arc proposals, the first time we have ever been invited to comment on plans that have been developed over at least the last six years for the five Arc counties (Beds, Bucks, Cambs & Peterborough, Northants and Oxon). But, instead of plans, we got vacuous enquiries about whether or not we want clean water, fresh air, jobs, green spaces etc. etc., questions to which only an idiot would say 'No'. This lack of any detail was widely criticised by individuals, Councillors, Mayors and many MPs.

So concerned were we at this lack of detail that Stop the Arc, the Oxford POETS (Planning Oxfordshire's Environment and Future Sustainably) and others put together an alternative questionnaire in which we laid out some of the difficult choices ahead. Where should growth be - in the Arc or elsewhere? If in the Arc, how much growth should there be? We also asked if responders agreed with the Arc Environment Group's claim that "sustainable economic growth and the enhancement of the environment are compatible and achievable."

We closed our alternative survey on the same date as the official one. Despite our late start, we had 31% more responses than the Government's survey (3,843 vs 2,933). Given the chance to vote today, 93% of people would vote 'No' to the Arc, 4% would vote 'Yes' and 3% are still 'Don't know'. 92% of responders felt that it was 'probably..' or 'definitely impossible' to develop the Arc AND improve the environment at the same time.

People are prepared to accept a level of economic growth, but 92% want it to be no more than the national average rate. They want decisions to be taken locally, by elected representatives or referenda (63% and 67% in a multiple choice question), not by unelected bodies such as Local Enterprise Partnerships (3%) and not by those such as landowners and Universities who will profit from Arc development (1%). David Rogers has lived in Horton-cum-Studley since the 1970s. He is a retired Professor of Ecology from Oxford University and was a key campaigner against the Expressway, which the Government has now cancelled.

'What's in a (bird's) name: myths, legends and symbols' by Lyn Ebbs

We have had a close connection with birds from ancient times, so it is not surprising that, along with giving them names, we attached extra meanings to these names, then added more symbolism on top. Take as an example

the eagle: have you ever wondered why the bible rests on the back of a golden eagle as a church lectern? Multi-layered symbolism is at work here. In the New Testament, the apostle, St John, has a key role in spreading the gospel the word. The four gospel writers were each symbolised by a different animal and St John's symbol is the eagle. St John represents the word of God; the eagle represents St John and the eagle carries the word on its back out to the congregation.



You might think that this symbolism, as well as its physical size and power, would mean that the golden eagle would merit the title King of the Birds. But according to a Greek legend, when the birds were choosing who



deserved the title, they decided that it should go to whichever could fly the highest. The eagle soared high into the sky, as far as it could go, but a tricky little wren had hidden in its back feathers; it flew even higher and claimed the title. The other birds were annoyed and ordered another contest: who could go lowest. This time the wren crept into a mouse's hole and won again. As a bird that can be seen exploring holes

and crevices, this seems a fairer result. Its scientific name, beloved of pub quizzers, draws from this: Troglodytes troglodytes means "cave dweller".

The bird with the most royal name must surely be Regulus regulus, the scientific name for the goldcrest. This name is a diminutive, meaning "kinglet" or "prince", and refers to the little gold "crown" that its crest becomes during the breeding season. The goldcrest is the smallest British bird weighing in at 4.5 -7 g, which is less than a 20p coin. Perhaps the most

surprising fact about goldcrests is that large numbers of them migrate to Britain in the autumn across the North Sea from Scandinavia. People found it hard to believe that these tiny birds could make this journey unaided and, as their arrival coincided with that of woodcocks, they decided that goldcrests were hitching a ride on the woodcocks' backs, which earned them the name of "Woodcock's Pilot".



Some of you will no doubt remember Reverend Brenda Knight, who died in 2016, and was a great source of information about Stanton St John, where she lived for nearly 90 years. Among the stories that she told me was that Cox Lane in Stanton was originally Cock's Lane and referred to woodcocks carrying out their twilight flight displays, or roding, there. However, there was a Stanton family called Cox, some of whom were churchwardens, so you must decide for yourself the most likely derivation.

One last double-barrelled name, Milvus milvus, just means "kite" in Latin



and is the scientific name of fairly recent local resident, the red kite. One of Shakespeare's characters, Autolycus, in *The Winter's Tale* warned "when the kite builds, look to lesser linen". Autolycus himself was a "snapper-up of unconsidered trifles" and admitted to stealing bedlinen, so was he maligning the kites' reputation? Following their reintroduction in the

Chilterns in the 1990s, many red kite nests were monitored and chicks tagged to track the movement of the species. These checks revealed that kites did indeed have a habit of collecting strange trophies. Items discovered included socks, gloves, tea towels and handkerchiefs. These random items are used as a form of decoration, perhaps to advertise to other kites in the area that the nest is in use. In Shakespeare's day, washing was left on hedges to dry, from where it was easy for red kites to steal; so, this is one myth that is actually a true story.

'Knowing our Neighbours': Tim Dixon

"I'm naturally an optimist: it's still possible to stop the most damaging effects of climate change, but we haven't got long - only 10 years to turn things round - and Carbon Capture is one way we can do it".

Tim Dixon has lived in Horton-cum-Studley for over 20 years and for most of that time has been working as a capture carbon (or CO2) expert. That is finding ways of burying CO2 back underground where it came from and so helping alleviate the worst effects of climate change. Until recently most people had never heard of carbon capture, but now it has become one of several innovative plans to save the planet from overheating and Tim Dixon is at the vanguard of this internationally important work.

Tim studied physics at Hull University followed by an MBA at Oxford Brookes.



In 2002 he began work with the UK government (seconded from AEA Technology at Harwell) just when Carbon Capture was starting up. "I was at the right place at the right time, but after AEA Technology was privatised I wanted to stay in the 'not for profit sector' and have the freedom to work on things that need to be

worked and not just to make money." Now Tim works with a wide spectrum of organisations from oil companies to Greenpeace.

Tim is now General Manager of IEAGHG, an international research organisation focussed on carbon capture. "I am just an expert in knowing experts and joining them up", he says. This month he's going to COP26 in Glasgow. "We are funded by 36 countries and companies and my job will be to provide information to other countries, particularly in the developing world, who want to investigate whether they can do carbon capture. "The beauty is they often have the right geology to store CO2, it is their own natural resource to use, and my personal motivation is to help them get moving."

As Tim says: "The world's climate is getting warmer because we have been pumping billions of tons of CO2 into the atmosphere mostly from burning fossil fuels. A warming planet brings more extreme weather with floods, fires and rising sea levels on the increase. We have all seen this happening over the last 12 months both here in the UK and across the world in Australia and America. The more CO2 emitted into the atmosphere the worst it's going to get".

Carbon Capture is one of many solutions to tackle climate change but is not without its critics. Some environmental campaigners see it as 'greenwashing', enabling the fossil fuel industry to keep burning fossil fuels whilst pretending to do something about CO2. Tim thinks differently: "What matters is not what is coming out of the ground but what is going into the atmosphere. If we can capture CO2 before it gets into the air it minimises the harm."

Tim has been attending COP conferences for 21 years, since COP5. "I feel my biggest achievement was as the EU negotiator at COP17 in Durban, South Africa in 2011 where we got carbon capture recognised. "Across the world there are now 27 large-scale carbon capture projects but it's not yet enough to make a big difference to climate change. "Hydrogen and renewable energy, such as wind and sun are coming online faster than ever, but they can't do it all, particularly for heavy industry, and to stop the worst effects of global warming the world will need 3000 Carbon Capture plants by 2035." In October 2021 the UK Government selected two carbon capture sites in the north of England as part of its fast-track scheme to cut 20-30 million tonnes of CO2 a year from heavy industry by 2030. A clear acknowledgement that the importance of Tim's work is being recognised, but much more needs to be done.

In his downtime Tim loves birdwatching on Otmoor and running, sometimes doing both at the same time. "I think people think I'm a bit eccentric running with binoculars but that's nothing compared to my 26 year old son Guy who



recently broke the world record for the fastest 'six person costume' at the London Marathon this year. Dressed as a huge caterpillar his team beat the record by 1 hour 25 minutes doing it in 4 hours 34 minutes." Tim didn't mention how more CO2 would

need to be captured from all their puffing and panting.

Alex Wood 1947-2021

Alex was born in Rugby in 1947, and she went to Dame Allan's School, in



Newcastle on Tyne. After leaving school, she started nursing training at Paddington Hospital, London before making a career change, moving to St. Cross Hospital, Rugby and becoming a haematology student.

After qualifying, she enjoyed a long and successful career in the NHS. Rugby is also where she began a long and successful relationship, with Adrian. Adrian had the staff transport contract for Rugby hospital. Alex was often on call at night, in case of emergency, and

so she was supplied with a 'bleeper' to alert her at home.

Those of us here today who are over the age of forty will know that technology in the 1970s was not always so great. And this is where we reach the Romeo and Juliet moment in Alex and Adrian's story.

On nights when Adrian arrived to collect Alex for an emergency call, if the bleeper hadn't worked properly, he would have to throw gravel at her window to wake her. Only when a sleepy Alex raised the sash window to reassure Adrian that she was awake, would Adrian be able to relax.

I recently asked Adrian if his gravel throwing skills had improved over many months. He replied that they never did; by that time, he and Alex were a couple and, more importantly, he was usually on the inside of that sash window.

In 1983 they fulfilled a dream of driving a Land Rover across the Sahara Desert in Africa. They lived in the Land Rover for eight weeks and had many adventures on their journey.

When they returned to Rugby, Alex won a senior position at The Radcliffe Infirmary, Oxford, and moved from there to the John Radcliffe hospital. Adrian and Alex moved to Horton-cum-Studley, where they would realise another dream by building a new house in 1996.

If Adrian was Alex's first love, her garden was certainly her second especially the flowers she grew, which she even knew by their Latin names. She was a founder member of the village gardening club, and part of the team who won a silver medal at the Chelsea Flower Show in 1994.

Anyone who accompanied Alex on a walk through the village will know that she always kept a pair of secateurs in her pocket. Any branch or bramble that had the audacity to loom across the pavement would be swiftly dealt with!

Everyone in the village knows just how involved Alex was in village life, taking on many voluntary positions over the years. She served for three years as booking secretary for the village hall, arranged church flowers on a rota, and completed the central altar-rail kneeler tapestry, which bears her name.

She was a member of a flower arranging club with Leigh and Lyn. She loved the weekly Pilates class at Pauline's and missed it terribly during the lockdowns. She also came to craft weekly and completed beautiful embroideries which were later to be framed.

Many elderly people in the village have good cause to thank her for her thoughtful visits. I know that she visited Anneka once a week after she became frail, so her husband Basil could go out to play bridge.

Alex never tired of finding new ways to enjoy the world around her. Recently she became intrigued by the International Space Station. She discovered that she could receive a notification from NASA that told her when the space station would be visible in the night sky from our village. So late one evening, she decided to venture to the bottom of her long garden, where she could get the very best view, and was thrilled to spot it passing over, a glimmering light crossing the dark sky above.

We were all so sad to hear of her passing. She died suddenly on 14 September, of an aneurism of the aorta; she was in her own home, with Adrian by her side. We will all miss Alex terribly, but will remember her as the happy, helpful, and kind person that we were all privileged to know so well.

May she rest in peace - preferably in a beautiful garden.

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



