Editor's Note:

The office of Churchwarden was established in the 13th Century. Their original function was care of the church building and its contents, but they also have responsibilities in connection with the Sunday services and for keeping order in the church: in the unlikely event of a major disturbance within (or immediately outside) the church, the Churchwardens have the power to arrest anyone or escort them off the premises if necessary!

Churchwardens are the legal guardians of the church's moveable goods, and are required to keep an accurate, up-to-date inventory of these items, as well as maintaining records of all professional inspections, alterations and repairs. Churchwardens are elected annually and, despite the huge responsibility, the position is wholly voluntary.

A letter from Anthea

Hi everyone,



For many people, we are coming towards the time of summer holidays. As I sat thinking about this season, I remembered finishing last month's letter speaking of 'refreshment' as we were looking forward in early June to celebrating Pentecost in our churches around the Four Parishes. I reminded us that in the Christian calendar, this is the time when we especially think of being refreshed by the Holy Spirit, and I said I hoped that all of us, whether Christian or someone of another faith, or no faith, may be refreshed by whatever brings us refreshment.

The thought of the summer holiday season has kept me on the theme of refreshment, as this period should hopefully be a time of relaxation and refreshment – a break from the constant treadmill that many end up on – of rushing to get ourselves and our families up and out of the house in time for work, school, college etc.; the constant pressure of deadlines from wherever they come; the 'to-do' list, that seems to get ever longer, however much we jam into each day, whatever our situation.



Even if the holiday is adventurous and active, or involves busily rushing from one sightseeing adventure to another, we should hopefully, even if physically tired, find refreshment in the change of routine and environment.



I find a change in 'place', even if only for a short while, extremely refreshing in itself – the different surroundings, experiences, sights, smells, help to recharge my batteries and reset me, ready for the start of new challenges and experiences on my return.

Refreshment comes in many guises for both people and for nature. Different people find different things refreshing. On several occasions recently, as I have been lying in bed trying to sleep in the summer heat, I have been aware of torrential rain. Local Government Reorganisation: proposal for 'Greater Oxford'

Following my article in the May Four Parishes Magazine, we now have more details of the rival proposals for local government reorganisation in Oxfordshire and part of Berkshire, including Oxford City Council's proposals for a 'Greater Oxford Unitary Authority'. In his two letters and recent statement to parliament the minister stated his main criteria - that existing district council boundaries should be used as building blocks for the new unitary authorities, and that the population should be 500,000+.


a. **Oxfordshire County Council has put forward plans for a single unitary authority.**

b. **Five councils have a plan for two unitary authorities, namely:**

- an "Oxford and Shires Council" replacing Cherwell District Council, Oxford City Council and West Oxfordshire District Council.
- a "Ridgeway Council" made up of West Berkshire Council's area, along with South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse.

c. **Oxford City Council proposes three unitary authorities, namely:**

- a "Greater Oxford Council", made up of Oxford City and surrounding Green Belt parishes (see map).
- a "Northern Oxfordshire Council" covering most of the existing Cherwell and West Oxfordshire districts.
- a "Ridgeway Council", covering most of the existing South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse districts combined with existing West Berkshire, but with those villages within the Green Belt closest to the city becoming part of Greater Oxford.



Oxford City Council's proposal for 'Greater Oxford' involves the annexation of 48 rural parishes in the Green Belt surrounding Oxford,

including all our local parishes. It extends from Wendlebury and Weston-on-the-Green in the north to Dorchester and Shillingford in the south, Appleton and Farmoor in the west to Waterperry and Milton Common in the east. It does not meet the minister's main criteria on population or comply with the requirement to use current district council boundaries as building block.

Oxford City Council states (in blue):

“Greater Oxford would cover a region with a population of about 240,000 people today, rising to about 345,000 by 2040.” Oxford's current population is 165,200 so it would maintain numerical superiority and control over the annexed parishes and Green Belt.

“A greater Oxford council would enable the creation of an additional 43,000-67,000 new homes by 2040.” This is substantially higher than local demand and would see significant amounts of Green Belt countryside, especially on the edge of Oxford, given up for development. LnBB (1,450 dwellings), Northfields (3,000) and Grenoble Road (1,800) are already being developed to meet Oxford's 'unmet need' with nearly 2,000 acres of former Green Belt countryside.

“This would create between 17,900 and 29,100 new jobs in Greater Oxford, which would generate up to £2bn a year for the UK's economy.” Oxford has a much lower unemployment than the national average and workers would need to be imported to fill these new jobs. However, the City Council has not solved the substantial problem of how these commuters could travel into Oxford.

All the proposals compete with one another and only the County Council's proposal meets the criterion of a population of 500,000+. The County Council currently provides 80% of services - notably social services (the largest budget) education, highways, fire and rescue etc. The competing proposals must satisfy us how they would provide these services, how much it would cost to set them up and whether they have the skills, competence and experience to provide them. The Five Councils have stated that the County Council would continue to provide social services, but if their proposals went ahead the County Council would no longer exist. Currently District Councils provide planning and rubbish collection, but not across the new boundaries they propose.

Our local parish councils and community groups have already written to the minister saying we don't want to be part of 'Greater Oxford' (see copy of letter in April Four Parishes Magazine) and Kidlington Parish Council has done the same. We are working with Kidlington Parish Council and writing to all the 48 Parish Councils which would be annexed asking them to campaign together against 'Greater Oxford'. Beckley Parish C will be organising a public meeting in September and inviting each of the proposed unitary authorities to present their plans and answer questions. Local residents will be invited.

The minister said in his letter of 16 December 2024 that he wants one proposal from each area/county. He reiterated this in his recent statement of 3 June <https://questions-statements.parliament.uk/written-statements/detail/2025-06-03/hcws676>.

Damselfs and Dragons

This article isn't about Medieval myths but about some of our most charismatic insects. Assuming that we get more warm, sunny days over the next two months, now is a good time to look out for dragonflies and damselfies. The group of insects that includes dragonflies and damselfies is called Odonata. The name derives from the Greek word for teeth and refers to their carnivorous lifestyle. These insects have relatively large, rounded heads with well-developed, compound eyes, which provide good vision, two pairs of long, transparent wings that move independently, and elongated abdomens.

Both dragonflies and damselfies have aquatic larvae called nymphs. While the adults are almost entirely insectivorous, in their larval stage they will eat anything that they can overpower, including small fish, tadpoles, and even adult newts. The adults are superb aerial hunters, and use their legs for catching prey in flight.

There are 57 British species of Odonata. Some are very localised and require specialised habitats that we don't have in Oxfordshire, so in our neighbourhood you are unlikely to come across more than 20. With a good field guide such as Steve Brooks's 'Dragonflies and Damselfies of Great Britain and Ireland', with Richard Lewington's superb illustrations, you should be able to identify most that you find.

As their name implies, damselfies are delicate-looking insects, with long slender bodies and two pairs of wings that are the same shape. Their flight looks weak and fluttering and when they are at rest, their wings are usually held close to the abdomen.

In many species of damselfly, the males are more brightly coloured, while the females are plainer, cryptically coloured. This is true in the case of two of the most striking species you can see locally, Beautiful Demoiselle and Banded Demoiselle. These demoiselles are more sturdy than other damselfies, with broad, heavily-veined wings. If you find a stream or pool

that they favour, you can often observe lekking behaviour, where several males gather to carry out elaborate courtship displays, and compete for the attention of females.

Dragonflies are built on a larger scale than damselflies, with noticeably larger eyes – the largest among insects. The eyes surround the head and dragonflies are able to see in front, to the side and behind all at the same time. They also have excellent colour vision, which is not surprising when you note their vibrant colours and markings. The front and back wings are dissimilar in shape, the back pair being broader. Dragonflies also hold their wings outstretched when they are perched. The wings are attached directly to the thorax by a narrow flexible joint and each wing is capable of moving independently. In fact, one of the most fascinating features of dragonfly watching is to see their manoeuvrability in flight. As well as forwards, dragonflies are able to fly sideways and backwards, change direction, vary their speed and even hover. Some tropical species even undertake long migratory flights.



Our locally-seen dragonflies all fall into the different groups that are named for their hunting styles, and they also differ in appearance. While hawkers have long slim abdomens with parallel sides, those of chasers and skimmers are broader and taper towards the tip. Darters are the reverse, being slim in the middle and broadening at the tip.



In spite of the name, Odonata, damsels and dragons are not harmful to humans and won't bite, however, humans can be harmful to both. They like clean, unpolluted water with an abundance of insect life in which to lay their eggs and over which to hunt their prey. For abundance, species variety and number of records, Otmoor is probably Oxfordshire's premier dragonfly site. Whitecross Green Wood is also a rich dragonfly site. Early in the day, before their flight muscles have warmed up is the best time to see them perched but to watch them in flight a still, sunny day is best.

Beckley Park's history in the time of the Feilding Family by Helen Weinstein

As we mark the sad passing of Amanda Feilding, who has died aged 82, a loving custodian of Beckley Park, I've been asked to write up some of my historical discoveries about her home, the unique hunting lodge and garden, and to give an insight into Amanda Feilding's guardianship of this heritage site and the special place that Beckley Park had in her heart.

Beckley Park is of special historical significance because the present brick edifice was built as a royal hunting lodge in Tudor times by Sir John Williams, who became Lord Williams of Thame. The house has been remarkably untouched since, partly because the descendants of Lord Williams, the Earls of Abingdon, were always absentee landlords, renting out the house and farmland on short leases to local farmers, who had no commercial interest in altering and modernising the farmhouse itself.



In 1919 the Earl of Abingdon, Viscount Bertie of Thame, put up for sale his entire estate in and around Beckley and Horton-cum-Studley dividing it into many sale lots. It was therefore from this estate sale that "Lower Park Farm" was purchased by Amanda Feilding's grandparents, Percy and Clotilde. When I met up with Amanda Feilding to show her the 1919 sale documents, she reminisced about the early days of the Feilding family stewardship of the estate, whilst we sat on an elegant bench in the late summer sunshine, haphazard hollyhocks splendidly flowering amidst the stone path bridge over the moat leading to the south front door.

Amanda told me that her grandparents purchased the property because they fell in love with it "for the romance of the place". Growing up at Beckley Park, Amanda described how the estate was a working farm because her memories from childhood were of playing out in nature in the surrounding fields but also in the farm buildings.



Amanda explained to me that Beckley Park was built on a kind of island

of 3 old moats, and because it was a working farm, these moats were left in poor repair and surrounded by lots of old stonework and sheds, and therefore there was no accompanying decorative garden surrounding the house. Clotilde and Percy had the imagination and experience, Amanda said, to mirror the architecture of the house with sculptural forms in a structured garden. They created the magical character of the gardens making a series of rooms out of yew tree hedges, which were only 18 inches high when planted in the early 1920s. This planting has made for a fairy-tale garden that Amanda has so cherished, where the tiny hedges grew speedily, nurtured by the rich clay soil of Otmoor.

It was her Grandfather Percy Feilding and her Father Basil Percy Feilding who spent hours dutifully shaping the structures for the topiary in the gardens, but it was her Grandmother Clotilde's inspirational influence that Amanda Feilding drew on to create her own landscape extensions to the property. Just over ten years ago Amanda added a new body of water, a small lake, with an island adorned with stone plinths, just visible through the reeds and bull-rushes from the parkland bench by the moat. With the spoil heap from the lake, Amanda had a viewing mound created beyond the hunting lodge, offering a fantastic new vista of the topiary gardens and the house within, the lake and mound a tribute to Amanda's spiritual connection to the place.

We can end this history feature with Amanda Feilding's own words, showing that Beckley is special because the combination of heritage and landscape and wildlife is what deeply connects us and makes us love this place we call our home. Amanda Feilding had a long and wonderful life, embracing the qualities that Beckley had to offer: "I've always felt that Beckley is part of my soul. I know every sound, every creek, every note of birdsong. I have a spiritual connection with this place and the garden is very much part of that. It nourishes and embraces me."



Celebrating the Organ at St Barnabas, Sunday 26 October

Forty years after the organ was installed in our village church the final piece of carved casework has been fitted. The organ, which replaced an earlier defunct instrument, was designed by Richard Vendome and built by villagers under the direction of Gordon Curtis (late of H-c-S). The new carved panel will be dedicated during the morning church service at 10am, and Richard Vendome and friends will give a concert at 3pm.

Horton-cum-Studley Gardening Club

Our gardens look particularly beautiful at this time of year but the combination of rain (very welcome) and sun has kept gardeners busy with all the weeding, clipping and dead-heading. There is much to celebrate in June with old favourites such as roses, peonies, alliums, geraniums (cranesbills), aquilegias (granny's bonnet) and foxgloves all in bloom. Rapidly growing herbaceous plants need supporting - woven hazel looks particularly lovely. Look out for lily beetles (bright red) and the rather smart rosemary beetles (shiny metallic green, with longitudinal bronze stripes) and do destroy them before they do too much damage. Evenings are a good time for therapeutic squashing of these pests.

But don't be too tidy. Please leave some of your lawn unmown and include a patch of nettles and other plants (weeds) for caterpillars and pollinators.

Garden club members are looking forward to outings, our summer social and a great autumn programme of talks starting in October. New members are very welcome. If you are interested in learning more, please contact the chairman, Sue Burge (01865 351310).

Restricted Byway



Immediately after the houses on Ragnalls Lane, it then becomes a Restricted Byway.

A Restricted Byway is a type of public right of way where the public has a right to travel on foot, horseback, bicycle or horse drawn carriage. There is no access for motorised vehicles such as motorbikes or cars no matter how they are they are powered, (petrol, diesel electric vehicles are all banned as are quad bikes).

After this sign the only vehicular access to this Restricted Byway is for the owners of the land beyond that sign, and their access is to their own property and not onwards down the lane. Being a resident of the village does not mean that access is allowed.

There is a sign posted at the end of Ragnalls Lane to notify that there is a Restricted Byway ahead, with a further sign at the start of the restricted area.

Please respect this road sign.

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
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
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Changes to stopping arrangements in Stanton St John
