Annual Parochial Church Meetings and Church Electoral Roll

The **Annual Parochial Church Meetings** (APCMs) for each church will be held separately again this year. See the individual village sections for details of dates and times, and please refer to the October magazine or our new website www.fourparishes.org.uk for the location, nearer the time.

The **Electoral Roll** is used to determine eligibility for participation in the APCM and for election to the Parochial Church Council (PCC), which is responsible for the financial affairs of the church, and the care and maintenance of the church building and its contents. If you are already on the roll for one of the churches in our four parishes, you do NOT need to complete a new form this year. If you would like your name to be added to the roll, you will need to complete a simple application form, which is available from the contacts specified in the individual village sections. To qualify for membership, you must be over sixteen, and a resident of the parish or a regular worshipper at the church concerned.

Church Services for Children and Families

Covid-19 lockdown has presented particular challenges for children and families and, although Laura Mermet-Burnet (initially with support from Jo Allen) has managed to ensure that some families can still meet fortnightly for Family Church via Zoom, we have completely missed out on our monthly Family Services at Beckley or Stanton St John.

At last, having completed all the necessary risk assessments, we are able to meet up again as families in church. Our first Family Service is on 13 September at 9.30am in Stanton St John Church and, if it is warm and dry enough, we will hold the service outside in the churchyard. Bring a mini picnic and a rug to sit on; grown-ups should also bring a face covering in case we have to move inside.

Dame Elizabeth Holford's Charity: Applications for Bursaries welcomed

The Charity was set up in 1720 when Dame Elizabeth Holford left £500 to establish a school for the children of Stanton St John and Forest Hill. The Charity came into being in 1988, following the closure of the school at what is now the Holford Centre, in Stanton St John. There were to be two Trustees appointed by Stanton St John Parish Council and two appointed by Forest Hill Village Council and the Charity invited applications for grants from school aged children and young people up to the age of 25 who are or who have parents resident in either village, for help in their educational needs.

Dame Elizabeth Holford's Charity has now been able to extend its area of benefit to include Stanton St John, Forest Hill with Shotover and now also Beckley, Horton-cum Studley and the ecclesiastical Parish of Elsfield. The Trustees hope to reach more young people from school age to under the age of 25 who might benefit from the Charity.

In the past bursaries have been granted for computer software, sporting equipment, residential courses, text books, laptops and other electronic equipment, college courses not funded by Student Finance, and music lessons. Applications are not means tested and funding is granted on a case-by-case basis.

Letter to John Howell MP from Ann A Henman, Beckley Dear John,

Thank you for your article in the Four Parishes News Magazine July/August of this year. As editor of our four times a year Beckley and Stowood Newsletter, I fully appreciate both the effort involved - and the need for reporting and conversation with our representatives in government.

Following through with information I found in your article, I went to your website to understand more about your history and current stands. As an American now residing in England (with dual citizenship) there is always much to learn about British history and politics. I might also mention, that having reached the age of 82, I fully understand the need to represent all in your constituency, and the fact that sometimes choices have to be made using all the relevant information you can gather.

The issues that I spend my time and energy working on are:

- 1) Opposing any form of the Oxford/Cambridge Expressway.
- 2) Inclusion of land in the southern part of our Parish now in the Greenbelt included in South Oxford Local Plan 2034 that is about to go before the inspector.

I have written letters, and even spoken, before the "authorities" on both issues - but people far better informed than me have also written and spoken, and the concern of so many has all too often been brushed off, buried, and with terse brevity, been labeled "nimbyism" - which for most of the public has come to mean "not in my back yard".

It is not nimbyism to know that plans for new roads and expressways will increase pollution and damage needed flood plains and special areas of archeological and ecological resource. It is not nimbyism to know that just building more houses will not automatically produce housing for those who need it - in the right place - and at the right price. It is not nimbyism to recognise that if everything is left to private business (or, to colleges that now claim their reason for being is to raise the highest amount of money from sale and use of their property) - decisions based on a desire for the public good will not be made.

You are in my thoughts and prayers, Please let me know if there is anything I can do to continue with conversation and communication.

Reply from John Howell OBE MP

Dear Ann

Thank you for your recent letter concerning planning issues.



Let me start with the Green Belt. You may know that I have long been a keen defender of the Green Belt. I have made my concerns on the issues within the emerging Local Plan in relation to this clear to successive administrations at SODC. However in the end it is for those proposing development on Green Belt sites to demonstrate that there are exceptional circumstances why this should be permitted. This would need to be in line with National Planning Policy as set out in the National Planning Policy Framework. I think it is right that this goes to the independent Planning Inspector for an objective view of the issues and am content to trust their judgement on the matter.

On the proposed Oxford-Cambridge Expressway. This was always about connectivity in the East West links in the economic programme under the umbrella of England's Economic Heartland. The reality is that the Oxford-Cambridge Expressway was only a problem at the Oxfordshire end. At the other end it formed part of much needed improvements to existing road systems which are either already underway or are coming forward in short term planning. The objections at the Oxfordshire end have been heard loud and clear and indeed the studies showed that finding a route at this end was problematic due to environmental and landscape considerations. Hence planning at this end has stopped as it has been realised that it cannot go ahead. There will be a need to look at connectivity, but greater emphasis has now been put on the rail links and the needs around existing roads such as the A34. Although I have been continually pushing for the announcement of cancellation, the net result is the same even if we have not heard that magic word. I struggle to understand why some local politicians are still going on about this, other than for their own ends.

I note your comments on nimbyism and this is precisely why we need a current Local Plan in place. Only with this will we have an overall strategy for housing, infrastructure, protection of green spaces and all the other strategic planning issues. Without it we are at the mercy of developers and we are already seeing that happen.

SODC Local Plan – Examination in Public

All the local parishes have been working very hard together to oppose the SODC Local Plan with 6 of its 7 strategic development sites in the Green Belt including Land north of Bayswater Brook (LnBB). This site spans the parishes of Elsfield, Beckley, Stanton St John and Forest Hill and abuts Sandhills and Barton. It is proposed to build 1,100 houses on two sites - Lower Elsfield and Wick Farm combined, owned by Christ Church, and Bayswater Farm owned by the Buswells and Aubrey Fletchers. This will particularly affect many parishioners who live in or next to LnBB who will have views across Green Belt fields replaced by dense housing development. All local parishioners will be affected by this development. The site is next to the important and fragile SSSI Sydlings Copse and College Pond, and it also contains important archaeology. It is supposed to include new transport infrastructure to alleviate severe traffic congestion on the ring road and Headington roundabout, either reconfiguration of the Headington roundabout or a 'Link Road/Headington roundabout bypass' running from the Elsfield/Marston junction with the ring road through the site to the A40 between Sandhills and Forest Hill. This prompted Lincoln and New Colleges to put in a proposal to 'safeguard' for future development all the land along this route with 4,500 homes proposed, destroying more Green Belt.

The Examination in Public started on Tuesday 14 July using Microsoft Teams and was streamed on the SODC YouTube channel. The Inspector, Mr Bore, also examined Oxford City's Local Plan. Members of our Group with the help of a planning consultant prepared 'Hearing Statements' on many of the 'Matters and Issues' the inspector highlighted. We also spoke at a number of hearings including LnBB. Between us we worked very well together and covered all the points.

On the morning of Friday 7 August Mr Bore gave his summing up. Although it may not be his final recommendation, he is going ahead with the whole Plan with very few modifications.

He was not going to reduce the housing numbers despite these being inflated by 5-8,000, as we need more houses. All the strategic sites are to go ahead, even though legislation to protect the Green Belt was strengthened last year. CPRE, who gave evidence said 'exceptional circumstances' for developing in the Green Belt are becoming the norm. The Inspector was convinced that all the sites in the Green Belt around Oxford were needed to meet Oxford's 'unmet' housing need, even though this is where the Green Belt is most precious and important.

For LnBB Oxfordshire County Council and SODC had not reached any decision about the transport infrastructure to alleviate gridlock on the ring road and Headington roundabout. OCC suggested a third option to assume success of Connecting Oxford with cycle, bus and walking reducing cars with no traffic alleviation. The Inspector grabbed this idea and said it was 'the go to' option, a sustainable transport solution for LnBB. This idea has not been assessed at all and will not work. The developer was very enthusiastic as the transport infrastructure costs were so high the site was probably not viable. Current congestion at peak times has queues half way up the Bayswater Road to the Headington Roundabout and on the Elsfield Road backing up from New Marston nearly to the village and similarly for the Woodeaton Road. It is likely that local roads will become rat runs. For local residents this is the worst possible scenario.

We are investigating what action we can take against adoption of this Local Plan, since it has no democratic mandate and the current SODC administration want to revise it completely. We would ask you to sign the petition and pass this onto others - 'Stop Green Belt Destruction in Oxfordshire' https://you.38degrees.org.uk/petitions/stop-green-belt-destruction-in-oxfordshire

We will get some legal advice when the Inspector's report is published.

Oxford-Cambridge Expressway Update NO EXPRESSWAY Ox-Cam Arc post Covid-19



In July, England's Economic Heartland (EEH) launched for public consultation its Draft Transport Strategy, with responses due by 6 October 2020. Its key aims are net zero carbon transport emissions by 2050, an inclusive transport system, emphasising sustainable and active transport, and support for the regional economy by connecting people, businesses, markets and opportunities. The Oxford-Cambridge Arc remains central to these ambitions, with both new roads and railways across the region. The zero carbon aim of both these new developments, and all the already existing transport links, relies heavily on the electrification of both rail and road connections.

Kris Krasnowski, Deputy Director of the Ox-Cam Arc Unit of the Ministry of Housing Communities and Local Government (MHCLG), wrote personal letters in July to the Leaders of every Local Authority across the Arc, asking them to support the delivery of the infrastructure needed "to boost connectivity and the homes of the right type in the right places ... in the Arc over the coming decades". Working with so many different Local Authorities, each of which is already delivering a Local Plan for more houses, is a far cry from what major developers have asked for across the Arc - a Ministerial-level appointment to determine, co-ordinate and direct all Arc activities.

In June, the RSPB, Wildlife and Woodland Trusts launched a much-criticised '100 Miles Wilder' campaign, offering to work with developers across the Ox-Cam Arc to save and extend wild places. "Without proper assessment", the announcement said, "government cannot know whether the area could support the current proposals and stay within environmental limits for nature, carbon and water." Unfortunately, the Wildlife Trusts themselves did not give such assessments, so it appeared that they were prepared to green-wash the Ox-Cam Arc proposals in full. There was much negative feedback from Trust members, and each website changed rather dramatically as a result!

Finally the Government's Planning White Paper in August, open for consultation until the 29 October, promises to tear up 70 years of planning legislation by introducing a three tier zoning system for land; for growth, renewal or protection, with automatic outline planning approval in designated growth areas. The implications go far beyond the Ox-Cam Arc.

Spotlight on Local Government

Editors' Note: councillors from all political parties have been invited to contribute to this new feature. This month we hear from **Conservative County Councillor Dan Sames**, who represents the Otmoor ward, which includes Horton-cum-Studley.

From Cllr Dan Sames



Since becoming the County Councillor for the Otmoor Division back in 2017 this is my first foray into the Four Parishes Magazine. The Otmoor Division covers most of the parishes surrounding Otmoor but only Horton-cum-Studley falls within the 'Four Parishes' so readers will hopefully forgive the focus on Horton-cum-Studley.

We are living in strange times at present with the ever-looming threat of Covid-19 hanging over us all. As councillors we've all had to adapt to new ways of carrying out our roles in representing the community. The biggest change has come through switching from face to face County Council and Parish Council meetings to virtual meetings. In some cases, this has made meetings much more efficient and accessible although I do miss actually talking to residents face to face. Regularly attending Parish Council meetings is an Important part of my role and if you have issues that you would like to raise, then I'm only too happy to deal with them.

Much of my work as a County Councillor involves dealing with the plethora of issues regarding our roads. Over the past 3 years I have worked closely with the Parish Council to push for road repairs and maintenance throughout the village. Together, we have ensured that Horton Hill and the Straight Mile have undergone resurfacing work. It is now time to turn our sights on the Brill Road and the Oakley Road which are both in need of fixing. Unfortunately, with better roads there are often incidents of excessive speeds from users passing through our villages. To combat this, I have used some of my Councillor Priority Fund to put towards projects to reduce incidents of speeding. Hopefully, once the impact of Covid-19 is reduced we can take action to reduce speeding.

Talking of the Priority Fund, I was really pleased that the fund was extended for another year. The fund gives councillors the opportunity to allocate funds to local projects that otherwise might not get a look in. Over the previous two years, I've been able to contribute towards many schemes within the Otmoor parishes including Horton-cum-Studley. I've also been able to contribute to wider Oxfordshire projects such as the Invicta Summer Schools and Cherwell Larder amongst other. Going forward, I hope that this fund can continue but with growing financial pressures on local government arising out of Covid and other factors it might not be sustainable.

Times are certainly going to be challenging for local authorities going forward. There is talk about reorganisation which could have significant impacts for people in Oxfordshire and financial pressures given the current economic climate could grow. I think tough decisions might need to be made by all parties at County Hall to ensure that the Council are still able to protect the most vulnerable.

All in all, though, I will continue to represent everyone and work hard for the community while I am still in office. Even though meetings are virtual, rest assured that I still make sure that I visit the parish to pick up any issues for myself. "Knowing our Neighbours": Rowan Reavley

Rowan Reavley has run the village shop in Stanton St John for just over 4 years and during that time, has become a familiar face to many throughout Otmoor.

Before moving to Stanton Rowan's work was centred around law, having worked as a solicitor for a number of years. However, during this time she was having thoughts about other career options.

'I did care work and thought I wanted to become a nurse, then I decided that probably wasn't a good idea as I didn't like wounds of any sort. I came back to law but I knew I was really just doing it for the money'.

Moving to Stanton St. John for Rowan was as much about a change of career, as it was about finding an ideal place to live. 'Stanton was exactly where we wanted to live, plus there was this really nice shop!'.



It was on her many early school runs to Ickford, that she first became familiar with the Stanton St John and Otmoor area. Having Lived in Risinghurst for many years prior, Rowan has long been an Oxfordshire resident. She also lived in Bicester before that but decided the distance from Oxford city centre was too inconvenient for her family's needs.

Living close to Oxford was important for Richard, Rowan's partner, who runs a bicycle sales business with an established local customer base. He also offers repairs.

Recently, they have combined their businesses so they both operate out of the Stanton village shop. 'I was doing most of Richard's accounts anyway', she explains.

Above all, Rowan values the informal and relaxed nature of running a village shop. 'I like the fact that I don't have to be very serious', she says. 'In my previous job you were expected to be serious and naturally I'm quite silly, so I was having to be this other person most of my waking hours whereas now I genuinely am me'.

She also takes great satisfaction from being able to supply people with things they regularly need. This includes daily newspapers, freshly made pastries and large varieties of essential foodstuffs. Though this can be a type of double-edged sword, as Rowan sometimes feels the pressure that comes with a high demand for her products. 'I didn't realise that actually it is quite stressful if you run out of beans if you've got somebody standing in front of you who really wants those beans and they have beans every Wednesday'.

While running the shop is a task that occupies Rowan seven days a week, the spare time she does have is largely taken up being a mother to her 8 year old daughter Hazel and her 6 month old puppy called Wilson. It's unclear which is the more demanding of the two, although Rowan says she finds Wilson can at least be well entertained by cardboard boxes and other packaging.

Otherwise, Rowan likes to relax by going on walks around the local area, usually with Wilson, and reading. The family also have a 7 year old rescue cat called Tilly.

Rowan's plans for the future of the shop include the return of indoor seating, as well as the continued expansion of the shop's range of fresh fruit and vegetables.



Additionally, Rowan is keen to keep offering a delivery service for high risk and/or cautious shoppers, which is available throughout the four parishes. The Stanton shop operated solely as a delivery service for the 2 months of lockdown between March and May.

'The beauty of this shop is that, while I have a few people for help, other than that it is just me. I wouldn't say that it was always my dream to run a village shop but I do think that I'm very lucky to be doing something where I can genuinely be me all day.'

"Notes on the Rural Landscape": Bringing in the Harvest

Over the last few weeks I am sure many of you have either heard the low hum of the Combines, seen them driving slowly to the fields or even caught the distinctive smell of cut grain.

Our Combine is a New Holland, (yellow and blue) 350hp, with a cutter (the knife) 25 feet or 7.640 metres wide, and it can cut 50 acres in a day so we can complete harvest in days rather than weeks. Before Combines it would

take a man a day to scythe an acre of wheat. Our 1950's Combine was a Ransome with an 8ft cutter, no cab, no air conditioning, no computers and no radio.

So why is it called a combine harvester and what does it do? It combines the processes of reaping (cutting) winnowing (separating the grain from the stem) and threshing



(removing the seed from the husks). The early machines started appearing in the late 19th C, but before then the corn was cut by hand with scythes, as Aidan Turner did in *Poldark*, and then it was gathered into stooks by everyone in the village to dry before being taken back to the barns to be threshed. Later the manual cutting was taken over by horse drawn cutters, but it still needed to be stooked before tractors appeared. Steam driven



threshing machines appeared earlier, and would travel from farm to farm. Thomas Hardy features threshing machines in several of his novels as threats to rural life and the industrialisation of agriculture. However, threshing was not a job to be missed by many, as it was hard, dusty,

repetitive, physically demanding work that went on until the Spring.

In 1793, when there was fire in Stanton St John, one of the reasons cited for the destruction of 21 homes and 5 barns was that everyone in the village was out in the fields helping with the harvest. Nowadays it takes one person to drive the combine, one person on corn cart (tractor and 14 tonnes trailer),

taking everything back to the barns, and someone to push up the grain in the barn. These people all still live in the village; we also enlist the help of our farming neighbours to help with the baling, as they have invested in the specialist machinery to do the job.



We have a route around the farm for harvesting, depending on the soil. We start in the field "Stanton Road", which is next to the B4027, between Stanton St John and Forest Hill, because this has the lightest soil. Its old recorded name has always been The Stone Field but now it has the old school, two houses, a car park and the recreation ground on it, we call the Forest Hill side "Stanton Road" and the field overlooked by the Talkhouse car park "Talkhouse".

The last fields to be cut are the two at the bottom of the village beyond Stanton Great Wood, where the land is very heavy. These used to be made up of several smaller fields until the demands of modern farming led to bigger fields. One is called, logically enough, Menmarsh and the other Chandlers Bottom, now shortened to just Chandlers. Tom Chandler was a farmer who lived at Mill Farm where he kept dairy cows providing milk to the village and had some of the fields "down the bottom there." When he retired and gave up his tenancy, his fields became part of Rectory Farm and the new field was called Chandlers Bottom.

We often used to start harvest in the middle of July but over the last thirty



years it has got earlier. Traditionally harvest should finish on Lammas Day (1 August) and bread would be made from the new corn which was blessed and divided into quarters, each left in a corner of the barn to ward off evil spirits and protect the grain. Sometimes the last sheaf was left standing

and later hung up in the church for similar reasons. These traditions have now evolved into the making of corn dollies and Harvest Festival, which is widely celebrated in churches and schools every Autumn.

Memories [or How parishioners aided an organ transplant]

Recently I found a small notebook which contained 40 year old records of the building by parishoners of the organ now in St Barnabas, Horton.

By the late 1970s the old organ in Horton was showing its age. It was built around 1880 for a private house in Eastbourne by the firm of Bryceson Bros & Ellis and moved to Horton sometime before 1918. Some of this history is preserved in the present organ where the original address label can be found on one of the large wooden pipes at the back of the instrument and inside where the maker's plate is stored. Although suitable for a private house, it was never ideal for a church since the requirements for accompanying worship are totally different to those for a domestic music room. Moreover, its situation in what was designed as a vestry (see photo), did not allow the sound to reach the congregation. Of immediate

concern was the wear and tear of the years which resulted in very noisy action. The cost of a new instrument was prohibitive so an alternative had to be found. About this time I attended a recital on the reconstructed organ at St Mary's Kidlington which had been built by the organist, Richard Vendome,



and Paul Hale with help from parishioners. This seemed a way forward and, when a redundant organ was offered by the church at Nettlebed, Richard and I went to see it. They had just bought an electronic instrument and wanted the old organ gone - quickly! For £200 and a promise to remove it within a week we became possessors of the instrument. There followed a frantic effort to move the organ, complicated by its situation in a gallery and the need to get two very heavy windchests lowered to the ground using only a mountaineering rope and a ladder. In mid-February 1980 all the pipes and other parts were transported to Horton in a hired van and stored in the church.

After approval by the Diocesan Organs Advisor, Simon Preston, the work began. The involvement of over 50 people is recorded in the notebook. Not all were from the parish and many have gone to their rest or left the area. Less than ten remain as residents. The work, confined mostly to evenings, continued over many years as it was necessary to leave the church clear for worship on Sundays. Some high spots will be remembered by those who gave unstintingly of their time and talents. My own particular favourites are of Richard balancing on a ladder and steadying a windchest as it swayed precariously on its descent from the gallery, and the late John Morrow, the village postmaster and a giant Ulsterman, standing in the middle of the building frame and supporting the same chest on his back whilst adjustments were made to the supports. These were heady days when volunteers helped in many ways including ladies who sat patiently sorting screws into sizes for reuse. The work became more technical as it progressed and the tonal finishing was done entirely by Richard. Once 'finished' the organ was opened

by the late James Dalton, organist of The Queen's College, and received a good notice in the Oxford Mail. Later work has enhanced the appearance by the provision of carved panels by John Bye. There remains the need to replace the temporary shutters below the metal case pipes with a matching carved panel (see photo for how this might appear).



We were very fortunate to have the services of Richard Vendome who masterminded all the technical detail doing most of the work himself and providing contacts with professional organ builders who also gave freely of their advice. Inevitably, as time wore on and the pile of wood and metal in the church seemed to grow rather than diminish, we wondered if we could complete the task which we had set ourselves. However, the support of the Vicar, Fr Anthony de Vere, and Churchwardens, with the regular congregation and not a few prayers, got us through the hard times and a project involving over 50 volunteers, mostly from the parish, produced for around £2000 a worthwhile instrument which is only now requiring some work after 40 year's service.

The Covid-19 crisis resulted in the closure of our Hall following Government legislation requiring us to do so. We have worked closely with Community First, the Oxfordshire arm of the national charity ACRE (Action with Communities in Rural England) to develop what is considered to be a sensible basis for re-opening, following evolving Government guidelines. This has involved the Hall Committee carrying out our own risk assessment; putting in place the associated measures ourselves; providing an addendum to our hire terms to require hirers to take additional measure in relation to the nature of their own planned activities and ensuring that none of this breaches our insurance terms. We have run pilot hires with trusted hirers to test the procedures and, as a result, we are opening the Hall for general hire from 1 September.

We are all going through a learning process in how to deal with this virus and we will continue to adapt our procedures and potentially our hire terms in the light of further experience and of any changes to Government regulations. These measures have increased our costs and dictated a one-hour time gap between paid hires in order to allow for cleaning and to avoid overlap between departing and arriving hirers. However, we have for the moment decided to keep our hire charges unchanged. We would encourage potential hirers to take advantage of what remains a very attractive and award-winning Hall in the knowledge that the Trust has taken great care to seek to ensure a Covid free environment. Village Hall Car Park and Playground

The village hall car park and playground are both now open. Please observe the notice on the entrance to the playground and follow the guidance given. Also note that width restriction bollards have been installed at the entrance to the village hall car park: just be a little careful when entering and exiting.

Building work

Summer is the time when much building work takes place. We ask those carrying out such work to be considerate to others likely to be affected by their activities. Reproduced below is SODC's current guidance on the subject:

Businesses and construction sites can be the source of noise problems for residents, but we recognise that certain activities will generate noise and that there are often no other reasonable alternatives

Construction workers should follow a code of practice that details measures to help keep noise to a minimum. Noisy construction activities should only be carried out during reasonable hours, which we broadly define as:

07:30 to 18:00 from Monday to Friday

08:00 to 13:00 on Saturdays

no noisy works on Sundays and Bank Holidays.

It is important to note that construction work is usually only temporary, and it will eventually stop. However, in some cases the council can impose restrictions on the way which work is carried out, including controlling hours on site and setting noise limits.
