Oxford-Cambridge Expressway Update



The summer has been incredibly busy for the No Expressway Group (NEG), with 10 village fetes and 4 village meetings. Brill and Marsh Gibbon meetings attracted close to 300 people each. NEG is also working closely with other local groups, sharing information, resources and skills, for a stronger campaign.

Our environment is a national asset. The proposed expressway and major development along the "Arc" are significant for all. **Our next critical step for the NEG campaign**, which has been gaining traction locally, is to try to influence decision makers in Westminster.

To take this big step, *NEG needs to raise funds* to pay for running the campaign, political consultants and planning experts. A very enjoyable and successful Mexican themed fundraising dinner was held in the gardens of Grove House, Beckley on 1st August. *Huge thanks* go to José Ramón and Mantina López-Portillo for holding such a wonderful event. You are also able to donate to the campaign on NEG's website, noexpessway.org. *Or, could you host a fundraising event?*

NEG met with Highways England's (HE) Matt Stafford, Project Director for Ox-Cam Expressway project & members of his team on 30th July. Key points from the meeting:

1. Highways England confirmed that anyone or group can register as a stakeholder, simply email

OxfordtoCambridgeExpressway@highwaysengland.co.uk. This means HE will send any new information it is sharing, directly to you; e.g. when HE announces timing and details of the consultation process later this year. It's also a great way of demonstrating how interested our communities, groups and individuals are. We urge you all to register as stakeholders!

2. Highways England confirmed it has asked some stakeholders to sign NDAs so it could discuss if possible routes are "viable and buildable". This revelation is in stark contrast to HE's refusal even to confirm their existence in response to NEG's Freedom of Information request, despite this having been in the media. Oxon County Council, South Oxon DC,

Vale of White Horse DC and Milton Keynes Council have all signed NDAs. Bucks County Council and Aylesbury Vale DC refused.

HE said it asks Local Authorities to sign NDAs to be "responsible" about any impact on land values.

HE has not asked environmental experts, such as RSPB and BBOWT, to sign NDAs, nor has it spoken with them in confidence about potential routes. Matt Stafford said that submissions provided by BBOWT/RSPB early last year gave enough information to HE, so that no further follow up was required whilst developing route options. The RSPB told NEG that it has had no contact from HE since it made its initial submission regarding preference of corridor in April 2018.

NEG's questions are - what about anything new discovered since last year, or consideration of wildlife corridors and living landscapes? *Can HE assess that on its own? Why not contact the experts?*

3. HE confirmed its announcement of 6/7 route options, currently scheduled for Autumn 2019, will start a 10 week consultation period.

HE said the project is on track, but exact dates of this are not yet known, due to government reshuffle.

HE expects us all to provide feedback on routes based on our local knowledge, information on wildlife and heritage sites. *You will be able to say your preference is "no expressway"* by filling in "is there anything else we should know" box, there won't be a specific 'No expressway' tick box. Further information will be shared on our website.

John Howell MP writes...

August 2019

By the time this newsletter is published the summer break will have ended and we will be back to normal - whatever that is these days. When Parliament returns it is anybody's guess what will happen and in the vacuum of the silly season the media are promulgating all sorts of scenarios.

During the recess I spent quite a bit of time knocking on doors in a number of streets in a range of towns and villages across the constituency. I took a random selecting of streets so that I could get a spread of views and a feel for the national, international and local issues that were on people's minds. It is good to talk to people at times other than when campaigning for an election. It gives an opportunity for me to find out what really matters to people and to discuss issues.

I know that many people are disenchanted with politics and that the behaviour of some politicians over the months has led to a low view of all. Let me assure you that some politicians, including me, are as fed up with colleagues as the public are. I share many of the frustrations of recent times especially what seems to be constant jockeying for opportunities for self-promotion rather than a willingness to tackle the tasks in hand. I am also frustrated at efforts to interfere with democratic process to achieve what sometimes seems to be personal views. And, although the choice of our new Prime Minister and process of selection were not favoured by all, now that he is in post I believe we should give him a chance. We are in difficult times, but it is clear to me that people are fed up with the current uncertainty. I very much agree with this. Uncertainty can be very debilitating, and most situations are much easier to deal with once you know just what you are dealing with.

When Parliament returns after the recess I will be much more limited in the time I have to knock on doors, however I will continue to do so when I can. I will also continue to make time to meet with constituents who want to discuss something with me. If you have an issue or concern relating to Parliament which you would like to discuss please email or phone my office. The Parish Council would like residents with children who have bicycles to ask them please, when they are cycling on the footpaths, to be careful not to get too close to parked cars because of the damage they could do to the paintwork of cars if they knock into them. We know children have to be able to stay safe by riding on the paths but they also need to be thoughtful of other residents.

The Council is working to address the issue of parked cars on Stanton Road, too close to the exit of Mickle Way, causing a danger to drivers leaving Mickle Way who are unable to see oncoming cars in either direction. If you feel road safety is being breached you can report the matter to the Police by calling 101.

On a sunny day at the start of July, the Green was transformed into Horton-cum-Studley's very own village market. At 10 o'clock in the morning, the Chair of the Parish Council, Sarah Foxcroft, opened the event and got us off to a good start with a brief but rousing speech.

With 17 stalls to choose from, there was an amazing selection of locally sourced food and drink, beautiful art and crafts work, fabulous renovated furniture and lovely plants from our very own gardening group. The GT's did an excellent job of providing refreshments and created a lovely café area where people could meet and relax over a nice cuppa and cake! There were also useful information points about local village facilities/services, the current status of the proposed Expressway, the Mali elephant project and even a place where you could relax and have a face or hand massage.

The market worked so well due to the considerable contribution of a lot of unsung heroes. To all those who drew up plans, posters and invitations, contacted and brought in stall holders, put up tents, helped people unload their cars and move all the stock to the right pitch, slaved away to make cakes and other comestibles and to many others - we say: "THANK YOU" we could not have done it without you!

Safari Lunch

As always, the Safari Lunch on 11 August proved to be a very jolly occasion. Parish Council

Oxfordshire Highways completed traffic volume and speed surveys between 19th and 26th June, and the results are now available. They will be presented and discussed at the next Parish Council meeting.

As villagers are aware, the Parish Council has experimented with not cutting grass verges this year, this is partly a cost reduction exercise as well as an attempt to stop the decline of pollinating insects, which is now a national issue. POSTSCRIPT: Curiouser and Curiouser!

Do you know?

Do you know why Stanton St John has a 'Middle Road'? Chatting the other day to a friend about street names we discovered what seems to be an anomaly. Way back street names reflected the local topography like Mill Lane, Church Hill, and Pound Lane, where they lead to such as Horton Hill, Wheatley Road, Woodperry Road or the land occupier like Cox's Lane.

With recent development names have been chosen by the highway authority with the help of the local cou

by the highway authority with the help of the local councils. These usually have some local significance. So we have the poets of Forest Hill: Milton Crescent and Mickle Way, and Powell Close named after Milton's father in-law who lived in the manor house: the field names of Stanton St John: Courtfield Road and Hillcraft Road, and Chequers Close called after the pub which once occupied the site.

In towns this is often not the case. There may be no local connection. For example, in Oxford there is an area of architects, Wren, Jackson and Scott in Sunnymead, of towns, Northampton, Lincoln and Monmouth in New Hinksey and of plants, Juniper, Comfrey and Sorrell in Blackbird Leys. But there are quite a few long-forgotten city councillors too.

But to come back to Middle Road, from the name you would expect there to be an Upper Road and a Lower Road or at least something which the road can be the middle of. Most settlements which have a Middle Road also have an Upper and a Lower Road or Lane, often service roads. So where are they in Stanton?

There is a long established footpath which runs from what is now the village hall car park to Hillcraft Road which might be considered to be a lower road, and old maps suggest that there may have been a footway behind the houses on the west side of Middle Road, an upper road? Or is the Wheatley Road, the B4027, the upper road?

However, things are actually even more complicated. In a catalogue of my photographs of the village from about 1970 Middle Road is called Main Road and Mill Street is Menmarsh Road suggesting that the current names are more recent than that. So, were the street names 'rationalised' at some time, may-be when post codes were introduced [1], and our anomaly is due to some bureaucratic confusion?


