As we look ahead, we wonder how we will celebrate All Souls, Remembrance Sunday, and Christmas, as things are currently. And as I write, there are hints that we are on the cusp of a second wave of Covid-19, and the possibility of further lockdown, as has already happened in other parts of the country. However, we should not spend hours worrying about such things. We will find a way to celebrate and mark these occasions, even if not as we would normally wish. And the Bible is clear, that we should not worry. 'Do not let your hearts be troubled' we hear in the well-known passage from John 14, and my harvest sermon relates the words of Jesus from Matthew 20: 'do not worry about your life, what you will eat, or about your body, what you will wear. "Knowing our Neighbours": Susan Canney

Susan Canney lives in Horton cum Studley and is Director of the Mali

Elephant Project. Located in West Africa, on the southern edge of the Sahara Desert, Mali has one of the last two remaining 'desert-adapted' elephant populations in the world. Their survival is under constant threat as the country has been ravaged by environmental degradation, poverty, poaching and more recently conflict and jihadist insurgency (but



produces some wonderful music!). For a western conservationist like Susan it is one of the most dangerous places in the world to work.

Susan studied Natural Sciences and Zoology at Cambridge University and has worked on conservation projects all over the world. In 2003 she started working in Mali with Save the Elephants and WILD Foundation on a project tracking the elephants by GPS. This showed that a herd of about 500 travelled across an area 12 times the size of Oxfordshire, migrating to find



the food, water and refuge through the year. But their survival was getting increasingly

precarious. Susan explains: "the problem was expanding human activity and anarchic land use management. Unless action was taken fast Mali's 'desert' elephant population faced extinction but after 3 years of study, it was difficult to know what to do given the vast populated area and lack of resources."

Then Susan had a chance conversation with a local villager - would he mind if the elephants disappeared? His reply took her by surprise: 'if elephants

disappear it means the environment is no longer good for us'. In a simple sentence it was clear he understood that elephants are a vital indicator of the overall ecosystem's health which benefits all life; a view that was confirmed by subsequent attitude surveys of the wider population.



These surveys also revealed that a common attitude was that every species has a right to exist and that it contributes something to the ecosystem that is unique to it, a notion that was described as being encapsulated in the word baraka or 'blessing'. Each species has its own baraka, and if a species is lost, the ecosystem is irretrievably diminished, and poorer in its ability to sustain life.



The local people also understood that human impact must occur within the physical limits of nature, but while different clans and ethnicities had similar governance systems of managing their pasture, forests, game and water sustainably, they were reluctant to respect the systems of others. The result was anarchic land use, environmental degradation and impoverishment.

The project's work is to bring everyone together to discuss the issues that concern them most including the issue of elephants. Once united in a common perception of the problems, they establish land management systems that also protect elephant habitat. A representative management



committee of elders is elected to make the rules and elected teams of young "ecoguards" ensure that the rules are respected. They also conduct environmental protection activities such as building fire-breaks and planting trees, watch out for elephant killings and monitor elephant whereabouts. Although the ecoguards only receive "recognition payments" they have resisted joining armed groups, despite much greater financial rewards, because they believe their work is more 'noble' and has status in the community.

"My life has been learning about the relationship between humans and nature, and this project is finding out more about the principles that are required for humans and wildlife to thrive together. We must protect and restore the living world's magnificence, abundance and evolutionary power. Diverse wildlife is an indicator of healthy ecosystems, and healthy ecosystems are the bedrock of human well-being."

Save Sydlings and Bayswater Brook Green Belt Update SODC Local Plan

Inspector Jonathan Bore's 'letter' issued on 28 August, contains his *'preliminary conclusions on the key matters that arose during this examination'* can be found on SODC Local Plan Examination web page - IC12. It is felt strongly by the Group opposing development of Land north of Bayswater Brook (LnBB) that the objective from the outset was to find the whole Plan 'sound', despite any evidence to the contrary. In the 'letter' paragraph 24 concerns LnBB there are 3 main issues - 1. Sydlings Copse and College Pond SSSI; 2. The Green Belt and 3. The Transport Infrastructure.

1. SSSI - Contrary to the Inspector's comments no evidence-based mitigation policies to ensure that the SSSI is not damaged have been proposed or agreed with Natural England. It cannot be said that the SSSI will be protected and this is of great concern. We are starting a campaign to defend it and will inform local residents of dates and events.

2. The Green Belt - The Inspector states that the development of the Green Belt sites around Oxford will not cause urban sprawl from Oxford. Many feel the opposite is true. The Inspector did agree that the countryside would be encroached. For LnBB specifically there is no new defensible boundary and no mitigation, both are required under Green Belt regulations.

3. The Transport Infrastructure - There is a significant question mark about the financial viability for LnBB as the transport infrastructure costs for the schemes to alleviate the ring road and Headington roundabout are high. Non-viability would prevent the site going forward. The Inspector pounced on a third new solution, not included in the Local Plan. This proposes using "Oxford City's planning policies concerning reduced car use and sustainable transport priorities". This has not been assessed or modelled at all and it will not address the congestion on the ring road and Headington roundabout. It will make commuting into Oxford or around the ring road for current residents even more difficult and lengthy. 'Connecting Oxford' and the Oxford City bus gate scheme will also both increase traffic on the ring road and Headington roundabout and their effects have not been assessed either. The letter states *"The suggested wording has been agreed with the County Council and site promoters and can be taken forward for consultation as a*

main modification." Communication directly with Oxfordshire County Council shows that no such wording has been agreed to date.

The consultation on the "Main Modifications" of which the 'reduced car use scheme' is one, runs from 21 September until midnight on 2 November 2020. More information is available on the Beckley website.

Community Action Now

There is an opportunity before the Inspector's final report is published to influence the outcome by writing to Robert Jenrick, Secretary of State, Communities, Housing and Local Government, other members of his department and copying John Howell MP.

Points worth making on the SODC Local Plan -

- The Green Belt is not protected under current legislation 6 out of 7 sites are in the Green Belt - 'exceptional circumstances' for developing the Green Belt 'are the norm'
- There is no democratic mandate for the SODC Local Plan; there is a democratic mandate for a new revised Local Plan which values the Green Belt, the environment and climate change policies
- SODC already has a current Local Plan to 2027 with a 5-year land supply, so has time to develop a revised Plan instead
- There is little confidence in the current Examination system

III John Howell MP writes...

September 2020

As I write in the middle of September we are facing tighter measures to try to halt the recent rise in COVID cases. This is disappointing but not entirely unanticipated. There are, of course, many views on how the Government should respond to these issues and there will be some who are not happy with new measures either because they think they are not strong enough or because they find them too restrictive. Several very specific scenarios have been raised with me for guidance on what to do but it is impossible for the Government to set out the requirements in every individual situation. The key has to be in the distancing and hygiene measures that have been set out.

Reports of scams in relation to COVID Track and Trace are worrying particularly where people are trying to get money for supposed tests. Scams also risk undermining the genuine process which is important to help control the spread of the virus. There is no charge for Government COVID tests and NHS track and Trace will not ask for any sort of payment details, pin numbers or to download anything from the internet.

Now to a completely different issue that I know is dear to the hearts of many in the constituency - planning. The Government has published proposals on reforms to the planning system and the consultation is open until the end of October. I am pleased to see this as I think that radical reform of the planning system is necessary. The proposals, if accepted, will improve the way that councillors and local communities carry out an important local planning function - the production of a local plan. I mention local communities here because Neighbourhood Plans remain crucial for the future of the planning system and I am pleased that the Secretary of State has confirmed ongoing support for Neighbourhood Planning. I know will be welcomed by the many communities that have put a huge amount of effort into setting out their own vision for their future through a Neighbourhood Plan.

Whilst on the subject of planning many of you will know that I have long defended the Green Belt and look forward to being able to continue to do so under the new system. I was disappointed that the Planning Inspector

examining the South Oxfordshire Local Plan seems set to approve the release of sites within the Gren Belt for development. However it is the job of the Inspector to determine this against all the other aspects of the plan and it is good to see that the designation of the land as Green Belt has led to a requirement that if Green Belt land is released then there should be compensatory improvements to the environmental quality and accessibility of the remaining Green Belt land, with measures supported by evidence of landscape, biodiversity or recreational needs and opportunities. Things do change over time and we cannot preserve things in aspic when competing needs create opposing demands but these protections do ensure that mitigations are put in place.

Another important issue on the agenda at present is what has become known as the green recovery - that as we emerge out of COVID restrictions and get the economy going again we learn from the environmental benefits of lockdown. This is something that has to be reflected across Government Departments and I continue to work with colleagues to be mindful of this as any new proposals come forward.

Finally, I am pleased that we have reached agreement in principle for a free trade deal with Japan. The UK-Japan Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement was agreed in principle by Japan's Foreign Minister. This deepens the economic partnership between two democratic island nations who believe in the fundamental principle of free and fair trade and provides additional benefits for UK companies. It is also a sign that we will be able to make trade deals as I have always believed we would.

We were delighted to welcome children back to school in September, achieving 98% attendance by the end of the first week. In order to manage risk, things are a bit different at school. Some of our measures include staggered arrivals and departures, minimising contact and maintaining distance, ensuring everyone at school cleans their hands more regularly than usual and enhanced daytime cleaning.

We will continue to provide an ambitious and broad curriculum in all subjects. There have needed to be changes to some subjects - such as PE and music - to ensure they can be delivered as safely as possible. We are also making plans for the improved provision of home learning, including the use of new technologies such as Google Classroom, to ensure that children may continue to be educated at home if this provision is required.

Once we are confident that processes are working well, we hope to reintroduce many of the extra-curricular activities we have been able to provide in the past. This will also be kept under review as it is our ambition to restart such activities when it is safe to do so.

As the overall situation continues to be fluid, Beckley School will remain alert to both local and national developments and are prepared for further changes if they are needed.

Horton cum Studley Gardening Club

I hope you are enjoying the autumn colour as well as autumn fruit in both hedgerows and gardens. It is September as I write and the colchicums (naked ladies) have just put in an appearance. The large strappy leaves, which appear after the flowers (hence the naked), are untidy and take up quite a lot of space but I think the flowers may be worth the investment. I have Colchicum byzantinum "Innocence" (white) and Colchicum speciosum (purple) - just a few flowers of each as it is their first year but they hold promise, always provided the slugs leave them alone.

Helianthus salicifolius (willow-leaved sunflower) has produced small yellow daisies more than 6-foot up, far too high to see properly, but grown for architectural impact rather than colourful flowers. At the other end of the scale is the dainty Acis autumnalis, (autumn snowflake) in my gravel bed, no more than a foot in height, with tiny nodding, bell-shaped, white flowers.

Sadly, our autumn programme has had to be cancelled but we hope to start up again in 2021 and will meet remotely if not in person.

Stanton St John Parish Traffic Management Survey

In September SSJ councillors will be posting a questionnaire through your letterbox for completion and return to the Village Shop. We hope that you will take the time to consider the questions and to communicate your thoughts to us. Below is a copy of our covering letter which explains the reasons why we need some feedback on the subject from you:

Dear Parishioner,

By the time you get this letter you may have read the September Parish Newsletter and in particular Ginette Camps Walsh comments regarding future housing development in our locality. Already, we are increasingly being made aware of issues concerning traffic management and these will undoubtedly increase as time goes by.

We are circulating the attached questionnaire to every household in the parish. We wish to make sure that we get views from all parts of the parish in order to achieve a coordinated and inclusive approach to various traffic problems emerging in the parish. We have chosen to issue paper questionnaires. This is because we have a very limited number of parishioners email addresses and not all in our parish have access to modern technology.

Although we have limited powers and financial resources we feel there are some areas where we could make a difference particularly those relating to traffic volumes, verges, pedestrian safety and parking. We need to point out that this consultation process will take time. We will need to gather data, analyse, publicise, discuss and consult with parishioners; we will also require the involvement of The Highways Agency or other agencies.

As you all know Covid 19 has made access to public meetings such as the Parish Council challenging, especially for those with limited access to technology. Please consider providing us with an up to date email address or phone number so that we can do our best to keep you informed. We hope that you will complete the form and return it to us. Rowan in the village shop has kindly agreed to act as a central collection point for us.

Please remember that smoke and odours travel well beyond physical boundaries and may be causing discomfort and distress to those with breathing issues, washing on the line or simply trying to enjoy a day in the garden.

Building work. Summer is the time when much building work takes place. We ask those carrying out such work to be considerate to others likely to be affected by their activities.
