Oxford-Cambridge Expressway Update

The Horton-cum-Studley Expressway Group have been reviewing the Government's preferred corridor announcement of 12 September in greater detail and talking with other groups (including Cherwell District Council, Expressway Action Group, North Otmoor Expressway Group, No Expressway Alliance and CPRE) about the implications.

The HcSE Group has identified the following threats:

- There is likely to be an Expressway somewhere
- The Otmoor basin & Bernwood Forest ecosystems are still at risk
- It is likely new route proposals will include a new M40 junction near Arncott
- Ongoing plans for an additional 300,000 new homes in Oxfordshire by 2050 with all associated infrastructure/services requiring development also
- Huge risk that Green Belt land will be lost to the Expressway and associated development
- Highways England has confirmed in writing to the HcSE Group that they could choose a route for the Expressway outside the boundaries of their preferred Corridor B

Following the Government's announcement, Highways England's next steps are to:

- Identify possible routes within the preferred corridor between now and Autumn 2019
- Conduct a non-statutory consultation on these routes (members of the public will be invited to comment on the alternative routes)
- Announce the preferred route in Autumn 2019

Hence the HcSE group will be continuing to campaign to raise awareness (including new unified messages for all campaign materials), working with other groups and preparing for the Public Inquiry on the selected route.

On 27 September, BBOWT and the Wildlife Trust for Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire and Northamptonshire launched a legal challenge to Highways England on the process for corridor selection. This could lead to a Judicial Review over the lack of a Strategic Environmental Assessment of expressway corridor choice. The HcSE Group are delighted that they have taken to the next stage the legal work started by the group with the Environmental Law Foundation and FTB Chambers.

On 8 October the HcSE Group held an Expressway Update in the Millennium hall. The group's campaign so far was widely praised by most members of our community. Useful contacts were made and ideas raised during the Q&A session. Thank you to everyone from HcS and other local villages who took time out from their busy schedules to come to this meeting. 100 years on... Forest Hill remembers and celebrates

We have had some encouraging responses to our appeal for material about men from Forest Hill and Shotover who fought in the First World War. Here is an example:



Owen Mortimer, whose picture is featured here, was born in Wheatley in 1896 and is listed on the 1901 census as living in Stanton St John. His father, also called Owen, was a Postman. By 1911 the family had moved to Forest Hill and Owen was a Stable Boy. This lovely picture has been provided by the family, along with some other memorabilia which will feature in our planned exhibition in November. Owen Mortimer became a Private in the Royal Munster Fusiliers and he died on 4 October 1918, aged 22. He is buried at Templeux-Le-Guerard Cemetery.

We are still collecting information about the other names listed on the Forest Hill Roll of Honour so if you can help in any way, please don't hesitate to contact us. All the material will be used to put together a small exhibition in the church from 11 November.

POSTSCRIPT: Curiouser and Curiouser!

Do you know?

Do you know the connection between a pillar in a field in Horton, Stanton Church tower, Forest Hill Church east front, and Napoleon Bonaparte? Of course you do - the Ordnance Survey. In case you don't - the pillar is a triangulation point, and the churches have bench marks, all part of the former system for mapping the country and establishing heights.

But where does Napoleon fit in? 'The agency's [Ordnance Survey] name indicates its original military purpose ... which was to map Scotland in the wake of the Jacobite rising of 1745. There was also a more general and nationwide need in light of the potential threat of invasion during the Napoleonic War.' [1] So I could have included the Jacobite rising too.

The Stanton mark is at the base of the tower on the south side and the Forest Hill one is at low level to the south of the east window. I would have expected Beckley Church to feature a bench mark but I have not located one. You will find the Horton triangulation point plotted on the OS map. It is on private land.

Triangulation stations [pillars] are part of a country-wide triangular grid and the location co-ordinates and elevation are accurately measured. Originally at least two other stations would have been in view from them. The top of



the pillar provides a mounting point for a theodolite and on the side is a bench mark. They provide highly accurate reference points covering the entire country.

'The term benchmark originates from the chiseled horizontal marks that surveyors made ..., into which an angle-iron could be placed to form a "bench" for a leveling rod ... These marks were usually indicated with a chiseled arrow below the horizontal line.' [1] The height of a benchmark is calculated relative a known datum. In Britain this is mean sea level at Newlyn.

This system has now been mostly overtaken by aerial and satellite mapping - Google maps and GPS etc. Do you still take a paper OS map with you when you go to a strange place? [2]






